Credentials at the end of Stage 6 (Year 12)

Higher School Certificate (HSC)

administered by the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA)

Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) - which is optional

administered by the University Admission Centre (UAC)

Requirements for the award of the HSC

To qualify for an HSC, students must complete:

- The **HSC: All My Own Work Program** (Year 10)
- Preliminary HSC Course (Year 11)
- Crossroads (Year 11)
- Sport (2 hours per week)
- HSC Course (Year 12)

HSC courses

All HSC courses have **unit value**Most courses are 2 Units
Some courses are 1 Unit

Requirements for the HSC

An HSC Program of Study must include:

- 2 units of English
- At least four subjects (including English)
- At most, six units of courses in Science in Year 11 (towards Higher School Certificate eligibility)
- Only one Industrial Technology course

Unit Requirements

Preliminary Course – 12 Units

HSC Course – 10 Units minimum

Types of HSC Courses

- Board Developed Courses
- Board Endorsed Courses
- VET Courses
- Content Endorsed Courses

Extension Courses

- Extension courses build on the corresponding 2 unit course
- English and Mathematics have a Preliminary 1 unit Extension Course (Extension 1) available in the Preliminary year
- English and Mathematics have a second 1 unit HSC extension course (Extension 2) available only in the HSC year
- Additional extension courses in the HSC year at Killara High School include: French, German, History, Japanese, Music, and Science (new for Year 12 2019)

Course completion criteria

To satisfactorily complete a Preliminary or HSC course a student must have:

- followed the course developed or endorsed by the NSW Educational Standards Authority – NESA (previously BOSTES)
- applied himself/herself with diligence and sustained effort to set tasks and experiences in the course
- achieved some or all of the course outcomes

HSC Assessment

 The assessment and examination marks are recorded separately on the HSC testamur

 School based assessment tasks will contribute 50% of the HSC mark; the other 50% will come from the HSC examinations.

Key considerations for course choice

- Abilities
- Interests
- Motivation
- Career aspirations and needs

Best advice for students: they should choose pattern of study carefully, as most courses extend over two years

The continuum

Prior-to-school learning

The details

- Deeper study of texts across all levels with a focus on quality literature
- Year 11 standard and advanced courses now have a mandatory first module, Reading to Write, that focuses on developing essential skills required for senior study and to refine writing skills
- Focus on digital literacy skills in Year 11 English: standard module Contemporary Possibilities
- The Year 12 common module areas of study including Journeys, Discovery, and Belonging —have been removed
- A new module, The Craft of Writing, is now mandatory in standard and advanced courses

A mandatory multimodal presentation in each course

 Assessment of the Common Module in Standard and Advanced must integrate student selected related material

Assessment tasks focus on the process of composition

English Studies

English Studies is now a Board Developed course

Students will continue to submit a collection of their work for assessment

Choosing a course

It is very important that each student is placed in an English course appropriate to their skill level.

Before courses are selected, students will be given detailed information and guidance regarding the content and focus of the courses available to them.

Class teachers will also make recommendations regarding the course that is most suited to the student's **demonstrated** level of ability. Perceived effort in the future is not a basis for sensible choices.

Choosing a course

It is important that students demonstrate the requisite skills **throughout Year 10**.

If students are genuine in their desire to study at the more demanding levels, they need to engage in practice from the beginning of the year that will convince their teacher of their suitability for these courses.

Students seeking ways to improve their skills in order to meet these expectations, should seek advice from their English teacher.

Choosing a course


Advanced English, for example, is not a course that is suited to all students.

In the English Advanced course, students continue to explore opportunities that are offered by challenging texts to investigate complex and evocative ideas, to evaluate, emulate and employ powerful, creative and sophisticated ways to use language to make meaning, and to find enjoyment in literature.


In general, students should achieve consistently in the A and high B range in assessments and examinations.

- All students have their choices signed off by the HT Mathematics before entering their courses on Web Choices



Standard Mathematics: all students



VET Courses (Vocational Education and Training)

- VET courses are competency-based courses, which relate to the development of skills
- Students can obtain a nationally accredited Certificate II qualification for employment in the workforce
- Hospitality (ATAR eligible) is an example of a VET subject at Killara High School

TVET – TaFE Delivered VET Courses

- These are exactly the same as VET courses but are delivered onsite at TaFE Colleges
- Certain courses <u>can</u> contribute to an ATAR (see NESA website or School Handbook)
- Students are required to transport themselves to and from TaFE
- Most TaFE courses run Tuesday afternoons from 2 –
 6 pm
- Independent adult learning environment: TaFE Teachers deliver content
- TaFE Colleges include Hornsby, Meadowbank, Ryde, St Leonards, Ultimo

Choosing your HSC courses

It's important to consider:

- What you are good at
- What you are interested in
- What you think you might want to do when you leave school

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ATAR facts

Your ATAR:

- allows you to be compared with other students who have completed different combinations of HSC courses
- shows your POSITION, or where you are ranked amongst all other HSC students
- is a RANK, not a mark
- is provided by UAC

To be eligible for an ATAR

- To get an ATAR you need at least ten units of Board Developed courses – these are HSC courses that are examined by NESA. Your teachers will tell you which courses will count.
- Your ATAR is based on your best two units of English and the best eight units from your remaining courses.

The ATAR and scaling

- Different HSC courses have very different groups of students studying them. To create an even playing field, actual marks need to be adjusted before they are added. This is called scaling.
- What scaling does is to calculate what your mark and your position would be if all courses were studied by all students.

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Why scaling?

So no student is neither advantaged or disadvantaged because of their subject choice.

So we can compare fairly all the different courses and combinations of courses.

Remember that a student's position in a course depends on:

- how well they did in that course, and
- the strength of the competition in the course

The percentile column tells us the story of the ATAR as it tells us where these students are position in each course

Myths

Don't choose a VET course such as Human Services or Hospitality – you won't get a good ATAR.

FALSE – it doesn't matter what course you do ... it is still possible to get a good **ATAR**. But remember – you can only include two units from Category B (VET) courses.

Myths

I can only get a good ATAR if I study hard subjects (ie Physics, Extension Maths).

FALSE – what is a hard subject any way?

And what if you're not good at these subjects? We advise students to choose subjects they are good at and that they will do well in, as this is the only way to maximise your ATAR.

Things to consider in terms of tertiary education

- Assumed knowledge
 - this means the institutions assume you know this subject
- Recommended studies
 - It is recommended that a course is taken in Year 12 so that you are prepared for uni study
- Course prerequisites
 - You must have studied an HSC subject for a specific uni course to be considered for entry

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Course selection process

- Student Information sessions
- Parent Information Evening
- Home Group discussions
- Year Adviser and Career Adviser input

Students then complete:

- the Expression of Interest form which requires signatures from Head Teachers indicating approval to enter subjects chosen
- Their selection online, on edval.com, with courses entered in order of preference, by midnight Thursday 22 June
- A printout of the online selection, signed by a parent/carer

Both these forms are to be submitted to the A Block Accounts Office no later than Friday 23 June 2017

### YEAR 10 2017 - STAGE 5 INTO 6 SUBJECT SELECTION HOW TO COMPLETE WEBCHOICES ONLINE EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST

It is important when indicating your expressions of interest that you prioritise all the subjects that you nominate. It is important that you choose your courses carefully. Check with the Careers Adviser to see if there are pre-requisites for post school courses – don't assume so. Choose courses that interest you the most – this way you will be committed to doing your best.

The elective subjects that will become your pattern of study for Year 11 2018 will be formed on the basis of what expressions of interest we receive. The school will endeavour to accommodate a student's choices using the reserve preference only when required.

#### Steps to use when selecting courses for Year 11,

- You must choose your subjects in priority order
- The first 12 units of preferences are your preferred choice for your courses (i.e. the courses you would like most to do).
- 3. The Reserve Preferences will only be used if necessary.
- Reserve Preference 1 is your first reserve subject. Reserve Preference 3 is the one you least wish to do
- Webchoices will open on Friday 9 June, 2017.
- You can go on web site <a href="https://web.edval.com.au/mysubjects">https://web.edval.com.au/mysubjects</a> and change your selections as many times as you wish until midnight Thursday 22 June, 2017. After the cut off time all expressions of interest are final and they cannot be altered by you.
- When you have made your final selections on the web choices page you must print off a copy. This
  final copy <u>MUST</u> be signed and dated by both you and a parent/caregiver.

  Office in A block on or before Friday 23 June, 2017.
