Remembrance Day Ceremony

The following is a speech by **Imogen Faulds (Year 11),** Prefect, given at the Roseville RSL Remembrance Day Ceremony on 11th November 2009. **Maddie Ellis (Year 11),** Prefect, also attended and **Matthew Bruck (Year 10)** played the trumpet.

The 11th November 1918 is one of the most significant days in the history of the modern world. The signing of the armistice to end the war that was to end all wars. A war so huge that the firing of guns could be heard kilometers away. A war so horrific, that the bodies of thousands of young men, fighting for their countries, lie unmarked in graves in foreign lands. A war so ferocious, that the glory that soldiers anticipated, was overshadowed by fear and horrifying stories from the trenches.

An so, when the end of the First World War was announced on this day, 91 years ago, naturally everyone took to the streets to celebrate the end of the worst war ever experienced by mankind. That day was a time to rejoice and celebrate. But in 1919, when the first Remembrance Day Ceremony was held in London, we did not celebrate, but paid homage to the hundreds of thousands of men who died fighting for their countries. Generations joined together to show respect for those who gave their lives to protect their countries and to stand against such an atrocity every happening again.

Even now, almost a century later, we still commemorate this day. Generations still join together to recognise the unbelievable efforts of the World War One soldiers, but now we include the efforts of those who fought in countless wars including the Second World War, the Korean War, the Vietnam War and the Gulf War, those who served and continue to serve in regions of dispute, including the Kashmir region, East Timor and Papua New Guinea and those currently serving in Afghanistan and Iraq. All these soldiers served to make our world a better place, and we commemorate their achievements and their sufferings, their victories and their losses, their advances and their retreats. But most of all, we commemorate their spirit. We still hear stories of the ANZAC spirit, of the courage, strength and loyalty that those soldiers showed under unimaginable pressure.

And I think that this is what Remembrance Day means to the youth of today. These wards have touched few of the youths of today. Youths living in a time of technology, we cannot imagine being in so much danger that you can barely move and being separated from your home, family, pets and friends by such long distances that communication takes weeks. But we can understand the spirit. We admire the bravery and selflessness that any soldier shows when fighting for their nation. We admire the sacrifices that they made so that we can live the lives we lead today. We aspire to have the same qualities that all soldiers show – courage, strength, loyalty, discipline and morality. They are our role models.

And so Remembrance Day, to the youth of today, is a time not only to show respect to those who served for us, but also to remind us of the qualities that we should possess.

We will remember them.

Jane highlighted: the potential acquisition of land opposite the school in Koola Avenue; the business case for a new building for Killara High; a separate business case for acquisition and development of the UTS site, including upgrades to other schools including Killara High; establishment of a joint Killara High School Community/DET working party with the DET regional Asset Manager, Steve Martens.

Cameron Carmody (School Captain) and parents spoke to and asked questions of Jane and Louise Yeomans, School Education Director, DET North Shore Network.

The main concern from the school community was the time it may take to fund, plan and build new facilities. The P&C will keep the school community informed of progress, but welcomes parents to join the P&C and become more active to support

continued work to improve the education outcomes from Killara High.

The Exodus Foundation Food Can Drive at Killara High School

Every day, over 400 people receive a free meal at the Loaves and Fishes Free Restaurant and every week night another 300 meals are served to homeless and disadvantaged people in the city. All the food that is served at this restaurant is provided by the generosity of people, who have

donated their time, money or food.

This service is provided by the Exodus Foundation. However there is another key service that many people are not aware of. Each week the Exodus Foundation distributes food parcels to the disadvantaged all over Sydney, all the way from Brookvale to Campbelltown. These food parcels contain the basics, which help the disadvantaged and needy people survive each day. Without these food parcels many people and families wouldn't be able to survive every week.

This term the Killara High Social Justice Committee is aiming to help the Exodus Foundation continue their crucial programs by organising a whole school can drive. Students, teachers, families and members of our community are all being asked to bring in a can or two of food to school. Student leaders will be collecting tins and non-perishable foods (including tinned fruits and vegetables, long life milk, soup, rice,



pasta, coffee/tea or cereals) during Home Group each day, with all the donations being placed under a Christmas tree in A Block reception.

This is a fantastic way to show that every member of Killara High School's community cares about somebody else, who may not be as lucky as they are. We hope that you will be able to support us in this endeavour.

Representatives from Roseville College, Ravenswood School for Girls and Killara High School formed a panel to discuss the various novels nominated.

The panel consisted of six students from these schools, with an audience primarily from Roseville College. Paul McDonald, from the Children's Bookshop at Beecroft, adjudicated the forum - allowing for robust discussion and debate about the novels, the authors that wrote them, and the character and plots. It was a great morning!

Here's what the students said about the Forum...

"The book forum held at Roseville College was a great way to meet other people who shared an equal love and interest of books, before having a panel discussion on the novels short-listed for the Older Readers Book of the Year.
