Amenities Upgrades and Capital Works at Killara High School

Building the Education Revolution Projects

The school has submitted a number of projects for funding under the Commonwealth Government's Building the Education Revolution (BER) program. Highest in the school's priority is the upgrade to student toilet facilities followed by an upgrade to the power supply throughout the school. While the P&C has budgeted for expenditure on student toilet upgrades in 2009 we will wait to see if the project can be funded instead through the BER program. A second round of projects is expected to be announced in the near future and hopefully Killara High School will be included.

Kerrabee Centre Repairs

There has been considerable delay to the commencement of repairs to the Kerrabee Centre. In the last week, following representations by local members of parliament and publicity of the delays in the Daily Telegraph, temporary fencing has been erected and a contractor has been engaged to commence work. No anticipated completion date has been provided. The school has no control over the process of tendering and related matters. The school community may be assured that representations have been made at every opportunity to get this project moving.

Capital Works Submission

In 2007 and 2008 the school, with the P&C Association, lodged major capital works submissions with the Department of Education and Training and a team of parents, staff and students met with the Director General and General Manager Assets in July last year to reinforce the case for action. A team of executive staff also made a presentation to the Director General and Deputy Director General in late February 2009 about the future needs of the school. The school understands the matter is being considered.

Science Laboratories Upgrade

In early April the school was advised that it had been placed on the State Government funded science laboratories upgrade program. Seven permanent laboratories in Blocks A, D and E will be upgraded in October and November 2009. Work is scheduled to commence at the start of the October vacation.

Upgrade to Sewer and Stormwater Services

As part of a separate program funded by the State Government, the sewer and storm water services throughout the school will be upgraded. Exploratory work has been undertaken by contractors in recent weeks to determine the scope of the repairs that will be required.

P&C Building Fund Projects

The upgrade of selected classroom facilities is planned for later this year. The amount of funding to be allocated to this and other projects is affected by the uncertainty surrounding the BER project nominations reported above. Hopefully, this uncertainty will be resolved shortly.

Special Religious Education (SRE)

The start of the new timetable in Term 2 requires some changes to SRE scheduling in Term 2 and for the rest of the year. SRE had been scheduled in **Week A** term 2 for Year 9/10 during Period 4 Wednesdays and Yr 7/8 during Period 2 Fridays. This means that there will be NO SRE in Week 4, and that SRE will resume in Week 5, then always in Week B. This will also require some changes to the Senior Seminar dates. These will be advised as soon as arrangements are made.

Where Are They Now?

Vive la différence!

Bonjour! J'espère que vous allez bien!

Well, so far my whole stay in France has gone so incredibly fast that sometimes it's hard to comprehend! After saying "cya later" to everyone at the airport, it finally hit me that I was off on this amazing journey! Quite a weird feeling...

Landing in Paris, all the exchange students realised that we were here for a year, about to meet new people, trying to communicate in a different language and frankly we all felt a bit scared. When I exited, I was looking for my host family, when I heard « Marcooooos » (My name here is *Mar* (with a French throaty R) *coos*) and saw Joël, my Rotary club

counsellor, Catherine, his wife, Ophélie and Violaine, their daughters.

We greeted each other with the « bisous » (the kiss on each cheek) and handshakes for the men. We had a quick café (kind of like espresso) and a croissant and got in the car. Instantly everything was in French and we spoke in French and I felt really included which was nice.

I first lived in a town called Vernon, halfway between Rouen (where Joan of Arc was burnt at the stake) and Paris. The town has roughly 24,000 people and the river Seine runs right through it.

It's right next to the little village of Giverny, where Monet lived and died, and painted « Waterlilies ».

My first day was very weird, as I was feeling so much and finding it so hard to express myself, but I woke the next day feeling much better and remembering I was in FRANCE!! Instantly, though, the family made me feel so at home and included.



Joël and Catherine have a house they are renovating in the countryside, in a little village called Aubigny. I've helped with gardening and laying down the wood flooring... I feel like "part of the family"!

I go to "lycée" which is Year 10, 11 and 12, (called Seconde, Première and Terminale). As my school is very big (14 hectares), there are facilities for disadvantaged students, boarding, adults taking the bac (HSC) and (like a TAFE) people learning trades etc.

The bac (HSC) is split into three levels; Literary, Scientific and Economic-Social. I do Economic-Social level: French, Economic and Social sciences, Science, History and Geography, English, Maths, German, and Civil and Justice Studies. The school offers us FLE which is French as a second language!



Anyway my first day of school was . . .interesting! I got to school pushing past the smokers (the students and staff all smoke outside the school gates, together which is really bizarre for me!!).

In class everyone was working really hard. Wednesday is a short day I went home! Quite easy

really! The next day was a strike (VERY French, haha) so I had no school.

I generally understand everything when I speak one on one with someone. I've even started adopting the little French expressions and movements which feels really nice.

Catherine has been so helpful and worked really hard to find something musical for me. She organised an audition with OCUP (Orchestra and Choir of the Universités of **Paris**). The standard is very, very good. I had an audition with the conductor in Paris: although it was scary and really difficult in French, it went well! I got into the orchestra and now I go every Monday! The website is www.ocup.fr/index.php?lang=en I have done so much that it's hard to write it all... I've been to Paris many times which I've loved, went to a petite soirée at my host sister's apartment in Paris. In Joel's forest I've fed the wild pigs and deer. It was really cool!



Then I moved to the home of the Ferrands, in a TINY little hamlet (about 10 houses) called Molincourt. Isolated, but extremely beautiful! There's Stéphane, the dad (a Rotarian), Sophie (the mum) and three children, Romain-11, Aubrée-13 and Caroline-15 (who is in the year below me at school). They are all so welcoming. I was sad to leave my first family, but I knew that changing families would feel like that! I feel less like a VIP here, due to the younger children, who treat me like an older brother which I like. I get up at 6am to catch the bus in the pitch dark at 7am and get back so late, sometimes 7pm!! However the family is moving to Vernon, so that will be great!

Soon I'm going on a mini eurotour through the south of France to Barcelona with some other exchange students and then on to Toulouse in the south, for a weekend with every single exchange student in France! Will write again!

Laptops for learning







All Year 9 students in NSW government schools will receive a Lenovo laptop starting from August 2009. This has been funded by the National Secondary School's Computer Fund component of the Federal Government's Digital Education Revolution.

All laptops will come with Microsoft and Adobe software, giving NSW students and teachers access to the largest and most comprehensive roll out of software in any education system worldwide. The Department of Education and Training is also investing in wireless networking and technical support for all secondary schools as well as professional learning for teachers.

Benefits

Laptops allow students to learn anytime, anywhere. The laptop weighs just over 1kg and fits easily into a school backpack.

Studies show the benefits of providing laptops to each student are:

- increased student motivation, engagement, interest,
- improved student organisation and improved self-directed learning,
- increased academic achievements and better work habits,
- improved communication and information skills.

Requirements

- Parents/carers and students will be required to sign a Laptop User Charter prior to issue of the laptop.
- To increase security, students will be asked to keep their laptops out of sight when travelling to and from school.
- The laptop can be used for school work at home – with or without internet access.
- Students will be able to access the Internet at home if there is Internet service at home. The Department's Internet filtering will work at home so students will not have access to inappropriate content.
- Students must charge their laptop overnight to ensure it is ready for each school day.
- Year 9 students may keep the laptop if they complete Year 12. Students who leave school or move out of the government school system must return their laptops.
