Australia Remembers

Last Friday student leaders represented Killara at a ceremony in remembrance of those servicemen who lost their lives on the night of 31st May 1942 during the mini submarine attack in Sydney Harbour. The service, held at North Head, was also attended by representatives from many other schools, the former head of the Australian Army General Leahy and special guest, Trooper Mark Donaldson VC. Trooper Donaldson is the first Australian to be awarded the Victoria Cross in 40 years. He joins a select group of men who showed extraordinary service and duty in the face of extreme danger. General Leahy observed that Trooper Donaldson is an exceptional soldier, but one, who in particular circumstances, performed extraordinary feats. Trooper Donaldson, who made no pretence to be a public speaker, quietly answered several questions put to him by students. His manner of response reinforced his own perspective on his actions when he humbly observed that he was an ordinary person. His response in the time of crisis he attributed to his training and a little instinct about doing what was right. When questioned about heroism he regarded those to whom he looked up to for the example of service they set in their everyday deeds as the real heroes we ought to recognize and acknowledge. The sincerity, economy and humility of responses from Trooper Donaldson VC left a lasting impression on all those who attended the ceremony. As someone observed quietly at the end of the ceremony, that while he might not wish it, Trooper Donaldson VC will remain in the eyes of most other Australians an example for us all – an ordinary person capable of extraordinary things.

This is the next installment from Matt Scollay (Year 10) in Costa Rica.



Family Life: My house is a lovely little building in a beautiful country setting with Brahma cows, monkeys, geckos, spiders, ants and scorpions in and around the house. 1000 something ants had colonised my money shoe and after a tin of Raid we didn't have an ant problem in Chino's and my bedroom but all my money is covered in ant poo. The monkeys are both fantastic and horrible because not only do they jump and have a good time in the trees but they also wake me up at four in the morning. And after they have finished their gurgling chorus, the chickens and turkeys across the road start up. I can't wait for Thanksgiving.

I've extensively explored the hills and paddocks around my house and have some great views of Hojancha (pronounced 'ohancha'), Nicoya and the Pacific Ocean. The food is fantastic here. Marielos is a great cook. Both parents attend university or school

(Marielos is studying law (is third in the University of Nicoya) and Wilmar is learning about computers but wags class. Both work a lot. Marielos at the Diria Coffee tour down the road and Wilmar on his two properties (cattle farm, hard wood and Coffee plantations). Chino is great company around the house and we play video games (he has a Nintendo 64, Gamecube and PS2), explore, visit the internet café, listen to music and exercise together from 6-7:00 every night. Television here is interesting as I've watched Happy Gilmore, Van Helsing, Family Guy, The Simpsons, Futurama and How I Met Your Mother all in Spanish. My Swiss exchange student neighbour, Stephanie is also great company and we talk about stuff and play with the puppy that her parents gave her as a welcome gift. Shana is both adorable and killer at the same time and attacks anything that moves.



There have been many social events including the fund raiser for the soccer clubhouse across the road,

where Stephanie, Chino and I all helped make Tamales - Costa Rica's traditional dish, ground corn, carrots, cooked and marinated beef all boiled in a banana leaf. We made them at the community centre down the road which was a hygienic nightmare. Dust and cockroaches were on everything, the water ran out of the taps deep red at first and a stocking was put on the main tap to stop chunks of rust falling in the food. Knives were passed around like hot potatoes and could cut any thing from red meat to vegies to fingers all in one circuit. A cockroach that fell in the food was picked out and crushed under foot or whacked with the stirring spoon. The Tamales were sold at the fund raiser the next day and all the spectators were happily munching on 'Fresh Tamales' all day - no one died!

Travels: I've visited the surrounding towns and communities around Hojancha- Nicoya, Socorro and Guanacaste's capitol Liberia. Been in San Jose twice now and explored a bit the second time. The farm was one of my most enjoyable trips and I rode a horse for the first time, then it ran me in to a barb wire fence and lacerated my knee. But I made it gallop which was so awesome and made it pay in litres of sweat for injuring me. It was one very tired horse. The farm house was a little wind damaged but was still usable. But the trip to Playa de Carrillo was the highlight of this month. We rode there in the tray of Wilmar's ute for an hour before we arrived at my new North Curl Curl. It was the most perfect tropical scene I've ever laid eyes on. Coconut trees lined the beaches white sand the water was like a bath and a barrier reef enveloped the beach from head to head. Every girl wears a bikini which is great but even the grandma's do as well which is not great. Stephanie's family came down as well and Shana too who provided great entertainment by chasing tourists and burning her paws on the hot sand. I got majorly sunburnt and peeled like banana all over my face.

The People: Someone told me Ticos were small they're not! Some boys tower over me and they all shake my hand in the corridors. The boys all look like hedgehogs or cockatoos because of the amount of gel in their hair. They don't wear helmets when they ride bikes, they don't need too. Their hair will protect them from any cranial injury. The girls are not all the stuff of legend either - most are and stand out like nuns in a rock concert but others have moustaches to rival Chopper Reid's or beards to rival Santa's or both. But the girls who don't are awesome.
