On Friday 12th June, one of the Year 12 Community and Family Studies classes, were lucky enough to be visited by Mrs Clough's two young children. As our class is currently studying 'Groups in Context', specifically 'The Disabled', we were given a first hand look into the life of a family with a disabled child.

Ethan Clough is 5 years old and suffers from severe cerebral palsy. Despite his disability, Ethan is responsive and has a smile that lights up the entire room. Mrs Clough explained what her daily routine consisted of, often starting at 5am and finishing at 11pm (at the

earliest). We realised how much it takes to care fulltime for a child with a disability, with never ending expenses for costly equipment, accessing numerous specialty services and getting through what should be the most

basic of tasks such as eating, drinking, bathing and sleeping. Mrs Clough even let some of us hold Ethan to see just how hard it is to physically support a disabled child who has no control of his body.

Our class was very lucky to be given the opportunity to receive an honest and detailed look into the life of a family who not only has a child requiring 24 hour care, but also a lively 20 month old girl, Hayley. We now have some understanding of the responsibility involved and the degree of strength gained by such a responsibility.

Do you speak a language other than English?

A note about attendance in Australian schools

If you are new to Australia you need to be aware that attendance in Australian schools is compulsory. Students must be at school every day and if they have been absent because of illness or any other reason, they must bring a note signed by a parent or carer explaining the reason for their absence.

Similarly, once they are at school, students are not allowed to leave or miss classes. There have been occasions when new students have simply left the school grounds unaware that this is not acceptable. Whenever possible, appointments should be organised after school hours. However, if a student feels unwell or needs to leave school for any particular reason, they must be picked up by an adult and also present a signed note to the office explaining the reason for their leave.

Information for Students in Year 10 2009

Any Year 10 Formal, as may have been the case in previous years, is not an official school function. The Year 12 Formal at the conclusion of the Higher School Certificate, together with Ekuba held immediately prior to the HSC study vacation, are the only official functions marking the conclusion of students' education at Killara.

The school would suggest that any students organising an event for Year 10 students and others enlist the support of parents to advise their children in regard to responsibility and liability. Year 10 students are asked to organise the function after the official Final Year 10 Assembly, i.e., once the school year has ended for Year 10 students. This is so that any social function does not interfere with the running of school programs.

Given that any social event (Formal) is not an official school function, staff will not attend or be responsible for the supervision of students and other young people at such a function. It places teachers in an unnecessarily awkward position with respect to their professional duty of care. Year 10 students and their parent organisers will need to plan accordingly.

I am very aware of the importance that a Formal in Year 10 may have for many students. However, I must stress that such an event is a private function that is not organised by the school nor is an official school function and the school takes no responsibility for it.
