To the Student Leaders of Killara High from your Representative in Jakarta

Dear Drew and Zoe, (if there are others involved well done too)

Congratulations on the initiative that was ‘published’ on the web. My daughter sent it to me. Well done and I’m really pleased you are doing such great things and showing such initiative (“The Feast to End the Famine”).

And a very special message and thank you to Ed, Saskia, Maggie, Maddy, Amelia, Desmond, Will, Jennifer, Elyse, Serrah, and Charlotte. I still have the farewell card you signed and Ed gave me on the day I left in May. It’s on my desk along with a picture of my family. I keep it there to remind me where my main job is located.

I’m still working on the teacher development program for the Indonesian Ministry of National Education and the World Bank. It is fascinating work but living away from home, family and the people I know and whose company I enjoy and value, is a bit of a downside after a while. I’m now half way through my engagement here.

I’ve spent most of my time working in the Indonesian Ministry of National Education (otherwise known as MoNE or Depdiknas) offices in an area of Jakarta called Senayan. It’s about 10 minutes’ taxi ride from where I live. That’s when there’s no traffic. When there is traffic (about 18 hours of the day) the journey can take 60 minutes.

My daughter is coming to visit me in a few weeks time and the airport is about 25kms away along a multilane toll road. I will allow five hours to get there, pick her up and return to the city. Sometimes it takes 40 minutes to get to the airport. Sometimes it takes 3hrs. You ain’t seen traffic until you’ve seen Jakarta traffic. And white lines on roads don’t have a lot of meaning. If there’s a space, fill it. There appears to be one major traffic rule. If you’re in front then you’ve got right of way, whether you drive a truck or you push a cart. Car horns are rarely used in malice, rather as warnings that “I’m coming up beside or behind you, be careful”. Remember, there are no such things as traffic lanes, even though the paint is on the road. If you like 2 stroke motor bikes then Jakarta is heaven.

There are 5 million motor bikes in Jakarta. And it’s common to find four on a bike. Last week I saw three plus a brand new single bed mattress. Beat that at 30kms per hour in traffic!

I’ve visited several junior high and one senior high school here. I have to say, even though the facilities at KHS leave a lot to be desired, they are light years ahead of what your peers have in most schools here. One school I visited starts at 7am and goes until midday, then the second shift arrives and it goes from midday until 5pm. Two shifts because there aren’t

sufficient classrooms to have everyone on the site at the same time.

At another school I visited in the afternoon, I was surprised to see so many children playing around in the carpark at the front of the school entry well after the school day had concluded. It’s because there is no where else to play. Once you’re outside the gate its wall to wall traffic, housing of all descriptions, buildings, etc. There are few if any open spaces like Killara or Koola Parks in the metropolis of Jakarta. The tiny bit of playground at school is a haven for children. In a way it’s what a school should be. A place where children want to be and where they can enjoy their lives together.

Every bit of space is used with a priority on space that can earn you a living. There is no such thing as ‘free parking’ in Jakarta. Every bit of kerbside has it’s ‘manager’ who will direct you in to a place to park and then risk life and limb to walk out into relentless passing traffic to allow you to back out into the flow and resume your journey. Total cost 1000 (or 2000 rupiah if you’re staying for a bit). This is a nation where about \$12 per day is considered an average middle class income and there are no welfare or unemployment benefits.

Life in Australia is beyond ‘comfortable’. It is by contrast, paradise.

It’s Ramadan here for a month, and most of those who follow Islam are fasting between sunrise and sunset – nil by mouth as they say in hospitals. School goes home a bit earlier during Ramadan because every one gets a bit tired. At the end of Ramadan, about 22nd September, people will return to their villages and towns and celebrate with their extended families. Much like Christmas is for a Christian culture.

This is a world where tradition is strong and respect for those who are older or those in positions perceived to have status, eg Australian principals and advisers, is shown in ways that can be awkward if not prepared. When I’m greeted in a school by a young girl she will take my hand, silently bow her face and raise the back of my hand to her forehead or cheek, and give a shy smile. It is a disarmingly simple gesture.

My very best wishes to you all. Enjoy what you are doing. Take every opportunity your education provides at Killara (then that’s why you are one of the student leaders – you already are!).

And thank you again for the card you gave me on my departure. For the record, I complied with the instructions and didn’t open it until I got on the plane.

Your P&C

Every year the school benefits from the generosity of parents who contribute to the P&C building fund. This is an update on how and where this money is spent.

At P&C meetings, members of the P&C vote on how building funds are spent based on the recommendations of the P&C Building Committee. The building committee is a group of parent volunteers who investigate, recommend and manage projects that improve the school buildings and grounds to the benefit of the students.

This building fund is a critical addition to the limited funding provided by the State and Federal governments and is designed to allow the Killara school community to provide better facilities to the students to improve learning outcomes that would not be possible if we relied on government funding alone.

Over recent years the P&C through the Building Committee has used parent contributions to provide:

- Five COLAs (Covered Outdoor Learning Areas)
- The studios above the canteen (music rooms and student conference room)
- The environmentally friendly evaporative cooling system for the hall
- Interactive White boards
- Exemplar Classrooms
- New school Lockers
- Enhancements to the sound and lighting in the theatre

Unbeknown to most parents, these projects involve considerable time and effort of volunteers in consultation with the school executive, teachers,

students and parents and in some cases, take years to plan and implement.

This year the P&C has approved the recommendations of the building committee to embark on a program to refresh all the school classrooms. This project is called the Exemplar Classrooms program and as the name suggests, the goal is to turn our classrooms into spaces where our students feel more motivated to learn and which help to build a sense of pride in the school.

The Exemplar Classrooms program starts in October with an update to 6 classrooms in E Block. These rooms will get new carpets, better lighting, new fans, blinds and furniture, bars on the windows will be removed and the brick walls will be covered with a vibrant floor to wall pin board display. Each classroom will also get a new storage unit. Designs are based on successful solutions at other schools but of course we are limited by funds and the need to keep the classrooms operational.

The toilet upgrades which was initially to be funded by the P&C and parent contributions will now be funded by the Federal Government under the "National School Pride" program.

As the first classrooms are completed we will publish some pictures and invite you to come and take a look and see the improvements.

If you are interested in the P&C activities, want to keep in touch with changes being planned around the school, come along to the next P&C meeting and hear about it first hand.

Betty Lockyer's mother was heavy with child and on the last truck out. It was WWII and families were being evacuated from Broome to Beagle Bay Mission in the NW of Western Australia. Betty was born two weeks later. Growing up in the mission and the pearling town of Broome, Betty Lockyer was influenced by a mix of culture, religion and strict government policy. Having an Aboriginal mother and an Asian father, she felt both the heart-wrenching effects of family forcibly removed from country and the

protective authority of the Catholic nuns and brothers. Yet Lockyer tells of the carefree time she shared with friends and family. With candour and humour, she captures the universal resilience of children to live in the moment as she remembers the heady days of her

childhood among the mangroves and gambling houses.
