Remembrance Day Assembly - 11th November 2010

The following address to students and staff was delivered at the formal dedication of Memorial Boards listing students of St Leonards Superior Public Schoo, I who served in The Great War 1914-1918,

Killara High School inherited more than the Lion Library when it was established here 40 years ago. It inherited a tradition of public education in northern Sydney that goes back well into the 19th century. St Leonards Superior Public School was one of the first public secondary schools established in northern Sydney. It was the foundation school for North Sydney Technical High School and then Killara High School.



Between 1914 and 1918 many of the former students of Killara's foundation school enlisted in the 1st Australian Imperial Force (AIF). They grew up in this part of the world. They swam in the same harbour and on the same beaches as you do today. Two of these young men were Robert and Raymond Courtney of 16 Munro St North Sydney. They walked to school, just as many of you do today. Their mother Grace and father Edward sent them to school with expectations of a better life through education and work. They wanted the same success and fulfilment for their boys as your parents today wish for you. Both Mr and Mrs Courtney would have felt a real sense of achievement in getting both their boys through to the end of secondary education as it was in those days. Both boys were well on the way to a fruitful life having had the benefit of educational opportunities and achievements never known to their parents.

Robert started at St Leonards Superior Public School in about 1898 and finished in 1907. Private Robert Courtney of the 13th Battalion was a shipwright 23 yrs and 8 months. He had a florid complexion and brown eyes and was short in stature at 5 feet 3.5 inches. He joined the AIF on 30 August 1915.

Robert was a shipwright by trade having completed an apprenticeship over five years after leaving school. Living at 16 Munro St with his parents the harbour was literally his backyard.

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Younger brother Raymond had completed his schooling at St Leonards Superior School in about 1911. He had blue eyes and a dark complexion. He too was a ship builder and had served a 5 year apprenticeship at Brays Bay. He like the girls and was often in their company. On the 1st May 1916 Raymond Courtney aged 20 yrs and 8 months, joined the AIF. Because he was not 21 his parents had to give their permission for Raymond to enlist. In his Army file are two scraps of paper with the shaky hand writing of his father, 'I hereby give my consent to my son Raymond Courtney enlisting, signed Edward Courtney (father)' and the more precise handwriting of his mother again giving consent to enlist.

In 1916 Raymond was separated from his social life with the girls in North Sydney and underwent training at Holdsworthy Army Barracks.

In September 1916 he was admitted to Milson Island hospital with a serious illness that required hospitalisation for 104 days. His social life had caught up with him. Antibiotics were unheard of in those days. Elder brother Robert Courtney was killed in action on 11 August 1916. This would have been at the terrible battle of Pozieres that some historians regard as the worst sustained bombardment by artillery in the Great War. We don't know what impact this had on Raymond or his parents. But we can imagine.

In May 1917 Raymond had travelled by ship to England. He wasn't a model soldier and this may hint at some rebellion at school as well because shortly after arriving in England he was fined 10 days pay for using insubordinate language to a superior officer. The record doesn't show whether the officer was Australian or British. In June 1917 he signed his will in the presence of two witnesses, presumably his mates at the time, Pte Francis Corr a grocer from Penrith and Pte Reginald Hough a butter maker from Grafton on the NSW North Coast. The will bequeathed all Raymond's possessions to his mother, Mrs Grace Courtney of 16 Munro St North Sydney.

Elder son, Robert's personal effects were returned to his mother on 27th June 1917 having arrived in Sydney on the ship 'Beltana'. The package was small, comprising Robert's wallet, several letters, belt, knife, card, Testament and 4 coins.

Raymond was classified as wounded on 26th April 1918. The first his mother heard of this was a simply worded telegram she received at 16 Munro St on 14 May that said, 'I regret to advise you that Pte Raymond Courtney was gassed (classed as wounded). His postal address will be 19th Battalion Australian Imperial Force, Abroad.' He eventually recovered and returned to his Battalion on 3 August 1918.

On 15th August 1918 the sometimes insubordinate Raymond was involved in an incident that reveals more of his character. Raymond's service record reads,

"A man was leading a horse across a footbridge on the River Somme when half way across, the bridge collapsed and the horse, becoming unmanageable, kicked the man into the river, stunning him. Both horse and man were struggling in the water when Pte Courtney without divesting himself of any clothing, dived in and brought the unconscious man ashore. This prompt action, regardless of the swift flowing stream and struggling horse, undoubtedly saved the life of the drowning man.' Growing up as a boy by Sydney Harbour and becoming a strong swimmer had paid a dividend.



Two weeks later, on the 31st August 1918 Pte Courtney was killed in action while serving with the 19th Battalion. He was buried in an isolated grave approximately 1.5 miles wnw of Peronne, half a mile from the village of Biaches. There is no record of how his parents were informed or their reaction. History is as much about imagining as it is about facts. We can only imagine what the parents felt at the loss of both their sons in France.

The Great War ended on today's date 92 years ago. For Mr and Mrs Courtney it may never have ended. For the next seven years they experienced regular reminders of this terrible conflict and its intensely personal cost as service medals and memorial plaques and other official correspondence were delivered home by the Department of Defense. On each occasion the father signed an official receipt.

The Courtneys made up a regular family of modest means. The boys were hard working and probably sometimes hard living and keen on having a good time. They were similar to many here today. They were educated in their local public school, our foundation school. They walked to and from school in weather just like today. They knew the bushland and foreshores of northern Sydney just as many of you know the bush tracks and places of Middle Harbour. They would have entertained themselves and their friends with the same type of stories and the same games, dares and practical jokes as young people today.

They proved to be successful in their young lives having completed long apprenticeships in respectable trades. They had futures before them, as do the students here today. Tragically, their futures were not realised.

The National Archives website, where much of the information I've read today comes from, has a heading 'Your story, our history'. The Courtney boys were your predecessors. Their story is our history.

The grief of their mother and father at the loss of two children can barely be understood by us. The family paid a terrible price. On 61,720 occasions other Australian families that paid that price between 1914 and 1918. And sadly there are Australian families paying that price in 2010. Today we remember those who did not return from war and we remember their families with whom the grief stays for lifetimes.

On 11th November 2010 we formally dedicate the memorial boards to the memory of the 165 students of St Leonards Superior Public School, the foundation school for North Sydney Technical High School and Killara High School, who served in the Great War, 50 of whom lost their lives. Lest we forget.
