ArtExpress: Leap of Faith

The video freezes as **Sam Margalit (Year 12 2009)** does a belly flop from a first floor roof to the road below. He appears to be falling through space. When the video starts up again, Sam doesn't smash into the asphalt - as seems inevitable - but lands on his feet and bounds off.

The viewer watching 'The Jump' - Sam's 2009 HSC body of work which is currently exhibited in ArtExpress at the Art Gallery of NSW - might imagine that some fancy post-production editing has been used in this stunt. Not so. Sam really did 'fall' to the ground - no props and no safety devices.



How the agile KHS student did it can be explained by Parcour, a discipline which Sam describes as 'using your body to overcome any obstacles as quickly as possible'. He's been learning Parkour for four years and has become an instructor.

The inspiration for his major work, which includes photographic images as well as the video sequence, came from his Visual Arts teacher, Ms Trenoweth, who introduced him to the famous black and white photo by French artist Yves Klein, 'Leap into the Void'. Klein's photo shows a man similarly frozen mid fall from a building.

'At the time, there was a controversy over whether that photo was real or a fake. It turned out to be a fake,' says Sam.

Scouting around for a location that looked similar to Klein's photo, Sam set about recreating the original artwork. He found just the right spot in Newtown. While the frozen frame in 'The Jump' pays homage to Klein, the subsequent video of the fall makes it clear that there is no fakery here. Sam achieves in reality what Klein could only do with artifice.

There are other references in 'The Jump' to Klein, in particular, the use of International Klein Blue (IKB). Yves Klein managed to retain the brilliance of ultramarine blue pigment by suspending it in synthetic resin and his name was given to the resultant hue. In fact, Klein famously painted many monochrome canvases in IKB alone.

'I'm fascinated by a person who could create a colour,' says Sam.

The Way Forward: A Principal's Perspective

Four decades of success at Killara HS have been founded upon the highest levels of commitment from staff and parents working in partnership. The partnership has focused on providing the best opportunities for all young people in this school.

Staff and parents continue to sustain this more than fruitful partnership that has spawned a culture of high expectation among our students. These characteristics distinguish this school from many others. They are not contrivances or products of principal's 'spin'. As a parent recently observed, ours is a unique school community that wrestles with the constraints of a large education system to which it must be accountable.

This school rightly 'tests the boundaries' in different areas in order to pursue improvement for young people, but it must also act within the bounds of public trust, policy and procedures that apply to all schools. A number of parents with children in the Performing Arts Ensembles (PAE) program have expressed discontent with changes to the management and organisation of the PAE program. The changes themselves are a product of emerging challenges that must be faced by staff and parents alike.

Staff and parents continue to work together to find solutions to these challenges. All parents may be assured that regardless of the challenges we jointly face, the staff involved remain committed to quality learning opportunities for young people, however, these must operate within the framework of policy and procedure mandated by the Department of Education and Training.

Some may not like the solutions. Unfortunately the way things were done a decade ago may no longer be appropriate today, but there is no reason to doubt the sincerity of the intention and the potential of partnership. Mr Watts, ESL teacher, has volunteered to attend evening rehearsals of the strings/ orchestra PAE until the departure of the conductor Mr Alex Pringle in August. Mr Watts gesture is an example of the goodwill that must underpin partnership. It is an interim solution to a problem of scheduling that I hope will be welcomed by all involved. On behalf of the school community I thank Mr Watts for his goodwill in support of the program. Goodwill underpins much of what this school does, and does well. It is not to be taken for granted.

The staff will continue to try to make things work but, as Winston Churchill remarked, just doing one's best and focusing on the way things are may not be sufficient. We must also do what is necessary and what is necessary in 2010 is sometimes not the same as what has been done in the past.

The challenges we face are significant. The school's three year development plan focuses particularly on improving classroom practice and infrastructure. These are significant challenges facing the school. We may not succeed immediately in all our goals but pursue them we will. Killara may be demonstrably successful as a school but it is not perfect; nor is it complacent about its success.

I thank the staff, the P&C Executive and all parents who have sought solutions to our shared challenges. My experience of this shared approach to meeting challenges over the last eight years informs my optimism that we can sustain fruitful partnerships in the future. It is, in fact, the only way forward for this school if its success is to be preserved and enhanced.

Last week I was invited to talk with a Year 11 Design and Technology class about the school's past and its future. In the course of the conversation I mentioned that one of the distinguishing features of the school in recent years has been its capacity to look forward and explore possibilities. I mentioned one such exploration was the co-location of the staff from two smaller staff rooms and the creation of a single larger and better appointed staff facility. I asked rhetorically why I'd be promoting this amalgamation and before I could ramble on further a student interjected without hesitation, 'Because you want them to work as a team.'

And later I asked if they'd considered why we'd introduced home groups, the Year 7 Village and created Stage Head Teacher positions and again without paus one student said, 'You're trying to set up more personal connections'. We try new things and explore ideas. Complacency is not an option if improvement is the goal. In the words of a scientist of some standing, "Life is like riding a bicycle. In order to maintain your balance you must keep moving." (Albert Einstein.) And (at the risk of tautology) I'd add the word 'forward'.


International Women's Day

40Km/h School Zones

Swine Flu Vaccination

Swine flu infections have dropped significantly in NSW over recent months, but it continues to have a heavy impact in many Northern Hemisphere countries. It remains to be seen what the impact in Australia will be as we move into next winter. Higher rates of infection are possible.

A vaccine is now available to protect adults and children over the age of six months from swine flu. The vaccine, called Panvax®, has been approved by Therapeutic Goods Administration.

NSW Health is encouraging everyone to obtain a free vaccination against this potentially life threatening illness. The Panvax® vaccine is available free from most general practitioners and Aboriginal Medical Services. Some community health centres and council immunisation clinics are also offering the vaccine free of charge. Phone to confirm the health service is vaccinating on the day you wish to visit.

2010 NSW Adolescent Vaccination Program

On Tuesday 9th March we had our first day of vaccinations for 2010. This involved Year 7 girls who received the first of three doses of Human Papilloma Virus (HPV). Dose two is scheduled for 8th June and dose three for 19th October. These vaccines must be administered at specified intervals.

Year 10 students received their Diptheria/Tetanus/ Pertussis vaccinations also on Tuesday. If any Year 10 student who wishes to be vaccinated missed out it may be possible to catch up later. The decision is in the hands of the vaccination team.

On Tuesday 23rd March, Year 7 students will receive Dose one of the Hepatitis B vaccination and the Diptheria/Tetanus / Pertussis vaccination.

Varicella (chickenpox) permission forms have NOT been issued as yet. That vaccination is due to take place on 8th June and permission forms will be issued closer to that date.

Killara HS does not retain records of vaccinations. The program is administered and managed by the NSW Health. Killara, like other schools, is used by the NSW Health as the most efficient point of access

to the target group, young people. All students who are vaccinated are given a form, provided by NSW Health, to take home and include with their families' medical records.

As part of the challenge, each entrant develops an animated character online that will travel around a

virtual world depending on how much physical activity they do.

Cerebral Palsy (CP) is the most common, physical disability in childhood. CP is a permanent disability that affects movement. CP results from damage to the developing brain, usually before birth. People with cerebral palsy may also have seizures, and sensory and intellectual impairments.

Where Are They Now?

"All right kids, that's it, pens down". These were the last words I remember hearing in my final HSC exam in November 2008, a feeling of excitement was present at the time as it was finally over but the anxious wait for the results was now underway. That final exam was Industrial Technology Multimedia, the subject I enjoyed most in my senior years at Killara High, the subject that put me in good stead for how I'm travelling today.

In Year 12 each student was required to construct a major work which contributed to half of the final grade in the HSC. For my major work I constructed a 10 minute presentational DVD on a local rugby league club. It involved the use of green screen for interviews, camerawork out in the field, hours and hours of editing in the classroom and how could I forget the 200 plus pages of paperwork for the folio. As it stands today I am currently studying a Bachelor of Creative Technology majoring in Digital Television Production at JMC Academy. I'm going into my second year of study and have already produced and

directed my own live multi-camera television show, a 10 minute documentary and just recently completed a short film which was entered into Tropfest last month.

At the beginning of Year 12 this was just a dream, a goal that I aimed to achieve at the end of my time at high school, but this is no longer a dream – it's reality, and my time at Killara High was the main contributing factor to making this dream come true.

To get into JMC Academy, you didn't only need a targeted UAI (ATAR) but an interview was also required. This is where my time at Killara really paid a dividend. I showed the recruitment team at JMC my Year 12 major work and folio and they were more than impressed. They couldn't believe the work that I had done as a high school student.

Just as I was leaving the building after the interview I was approached and offered a place at JMC even before the HSC results had come out.

There is one person to thank for this and it's my ITM teacher, Mr Telfer. He spent so much time helping us as students to achieve a major work we were proud of. He taught me how to use multiple programs which have really come in handy and he would come into school in the holidays and after school hours and on weekends to help us work on our major works. He gave up his Saturday to render a 3D max animation that after nearly 6 or so hours work, crashed his computer. The study lessons we had as a class and the one-on-one attention he gave us is the reason why I was able to get a Band 6 in ITM. Without Mr Telfer there pushing me to achieve my best I might not be doing what I love doing today. He was an inspirational teacher and he believed that my major work would be a success and he was right.

This is only the beginning for me, I have a lot more work ahead of me going into my second year of study

as we get to produce music videos, television commercials and host a live awards ceremony.

My time at Killara was an immense learning experience and it taught me a lot. One thing I'll always remember is don't count the days, make the days count.

Fleeing her abusive husband but stranded by the Gulf War, Zainab rebuilt her life in the States, and created an organisation to fight on behalf of female victims of war.

Verolme, Hetty E. Hetty: A True Story.

Hetty was just twelve years old in 1943 when her family was torn apart by the Nazis. Rounded up from her home in the Netherlands she was separated from her parents, not knowing if they were dead or alive. Hetty and her brothers were sent to the Children's House at Belsen concentration camp. There, Hetty, became the 'Little Mother', helping care for the babies, toddlers and children through those terrible years.

In her direct and powerful style, Hetty recalls one of the remarkable, largely untold stories of the Holocaust.
