#### **Keeping Students Safe in the Bus Area**

Many parents will be aware of a recent accident in the bus area where one of our students was struck by a car. Fortunately the student was not seriously injured, although he was conveyed to hospital and the Police were called. This accident highlights the very real concerns that we have for the safety of students in the bus area immediately at the end of the school day.

I again remind parents, students and the community of the continued care that we all need to take when driving in the vicinity of the school. All students are to use the marked crossing. Staff currently monitor the bus area and crossing at lunchtimes when Koola Park is in use. I also remind all drivers that the **unbroken centre line** outside the school makes **it illegal to undertake a U-turn** in this busy and dangerous area. The police officers in attendance have drawn this to my attentionand we can expect Police monitoring of this area. In addition, there are "**No Stopping**" zones adjacent to the crossing that will be strictly enforced. These zones are to allow for drivers' unrestricted vision of the pedestrian crossing. These "**No stopping**" zones are **not** to be used for dropping off or picking up students. There is a marked drop off or pick up zone opposite the school adjacent to Koola Park for this purpose. Our **Council Ranger** also reminds us that he is on duty in this area to enforce these regulations for the safety of our students. Please take great care in this area,

The school will address these areas of concern with students at assemblies. Students also need to exercise greater care around the crossing, the buses and outside the school and take responsibility for their safety.

#### **Swine Flu Vaccination**

Swine flu infections have dropped significantly in NSW over recent months, but it continues to have a heavy impact in many Northern Hemisphere countries. It remains to be seen what the impact in Australia will be as we move into next winte. Higher rates of infection are possible.

A vaccine is now available to protect adults and children over the age of six months from swine flu. The vaccine, called Panvax®, has been approved by Therapeutic Goods Administration.

NSW Health is encouraging everyone to obtain a free vaccination against this potentially life threatening illness. The Panvax® vaccine is available free from most general practitioners and Aboriginal Medical Services. Some community health centres and council immunisation clinics are also offering the vaccine free of charge. Call ahead to confirm the health service is vaccinating on the day you wish to visit.

Haiti Week is to raise funds for Red Cross Australia for their current Haiti Relief project.

The Student Leaders Council (SLC) have organized "Haiti Week" to raise funds for the earthquake that hit Haiti on 12<sup>th</sup> January earlier this year. Since then, over 500 Red Cross and Red Crescent aid workers from around 22 countries have been sent to the region, providing relief supplies to more than 122,000 people. However, 1,200,000 are still homeless and it has been estimated that the recovery process could take a whole generation to be completed.

Our money will be focused towards providing shelters and improving sanitation for the distressed population as the hurricane season approaches. It will also provide further funds for the distribution of medical supplies to the region.

On **Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> March**, the Sports Council will be holding a Bompo Dompo competition in the hall at lunchtime. Players are asked to donate \$2 and spectators \$1 to the KHS Haiti Relief fund.

On **Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> March**, the Student Representative Council (SRC) are organizing a sausage sizzle in the quadrangle and an Arts Council band will be playing.

So make sure you bring your \$2 for a sausage and get good seats for the amazing band!



Finally, on **Friday 5<sup>th</sup> March**, the Social Justice Committee (SJC) has organized a mufti day. Money will be collected in home groups, so don't forget to bring your gold coin donation, as well as some extra pocket money to buy some prefects from the 2010 prefect auction at lunchtime.
