# Haiti and Chile Relief Week at Killara High School

2<sup>nd</sup> March to 5<sup>th</sup> March was "Haiti and Chile Relief Week", a week full of fun, entertainment, food and the auctioning of personal assistants. It was a great week, only made possible by the combined efforts of the five Student Leadership groups and the participation of the students and our community. The aim of the week was to raise money for the survivors of the recent earthquakes in Haiti and Chile, helping to provide them with crucial funds which will help them rebuild their families, homes and community, as a large number of people has been affected by these earthquakes. In times like these we all must remember how fortunate we are to live in Australia and to have the ability to gather funds and support those in less fortunate situations.

**Tuesday:** To start off the week on Tuesday, students participated in a game of Bompo Dompo which was organized by the Sports Council. This event was a great way to kick off the week at KHS with many staff and students thinking that it was fantastic to see the younger years mixing with the older years, in a friendly game which was able to raise close to \$100.

**Wednesday:** Bands and a barbeque in the Quad. The sausage sizzle went off with a bang, with many students queuing up to get a sausage sandwich and a drink, and at the same time supporting a really great cause. The entertainment was provided by talented student bands which was coordinated by the SRC and Arts Council. In total from the day's activities we were able to raise \$530!

There have been many Prefect Auctions at Killara High School and the Prefects decided to revive the tradition this year after a long dry spell of no auctions. ### **Student Progress Review Evenings 2010**

Three of these evenings have been scheduled for next term to give parents and teachers an opportunity to meet and discuss students' progress so far this year.

Interviews can be scheduled between the hours of 3.30pm and 8.00pm. However, please be aware that teachers will not be available for the entire period of 4.5 hours. They need a break at some stage during the evening or may not be available for the entire time.

As Year 12 Semester 1 reports are not issued until after the second evening, Year 12 parents are asked to make appointments to meet teachers at the 25<sup>th</sup> May Student Progress Review evening.

Please have your son, daughter or ward book your appointments as soon as possible.

#### Please note -

Booking sheets will be issued early in Term 2 for the 17<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> May evenings. Booking sheets for Years 7 and 8 students have already been issued. In the meantime, it would be helpful if you could establish with your child which of the evenings you prefer and an approximate block of time that would be convenient to you on that night. With this information your child can start booking interviews for you as soon as the sheet is issued.

Parents are asked to bring the appointment sheet with them to these meetings. The appointment sheet highlights the names of the teachers, courses taught by them and appointment times.

The venue for all interviews will be the Kerrabee Centre hall. Signs around the walls of the hall will indicate course/ faculty locations and signs on tables will indicate locations of individual teachers.

Interviews are of five minutes duration. Parents and teachers are asked to restrict their discussion to that time in fairness to all families seeking interviews. If teachers and/or parents feel the need to discuss matters further, another mutually convenient time should be arranged.

Interviews must be prearranged. To drop in on the off chance of speaking to a teacher can prove very frustrating to those with appointments. Please give consideration to the needs of other parents and the staff during these evenings.

Please take advantage of this opportunity to meet with the school staff to discuss your child's progress. Year Advisers, a School Counsellor, Careers Adviser and the Support Teacher Learning Assistance will also be present. A translation service can also be made available through the school.

# Physics Lecture by an Outstanding Scientist

Our Year 11 science students were provided with an exceptional opportunity when Dr Cathy Foley spoke to them on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> March. Dr Foley sits on the Prime Minister's Science Council, she has been awarded a prize as an outstanding Science communicator and the Sydney Morning Herald nominated her as one of Australia's 100 most influential people. We are fortunate that Dr Foley is associated with Killara High School.

She spoke of the importance of basic physics concepts that the students are studying now. She cited that it was a physicist who solved the mystery of Caroline Byrne's death by using projectile motion equations.

The importance of seat belts was demonstrated using a trolley and an egg. Dr Foley showed how this relies

# Stage Head Teachers' Report

How the time has flown this term with everything from camps, carnivals and course work!!!! As we approach the end of first term, it is timely to remind parents and students of the upcoming Student Progress Review Evenings. The first one is next Monday and is specifically for parents of Stage 4 (Year 7 and 8) students. Students have been reminded that it is their responsibility to arrange appointment times and record these on their booking sheet. Booking back-to-back appointments should be avoided as parents need time to find each teacher. For those attending for the first time, there will be a map of the hall showing the position of each faculty. Please ensure that you know which faculties your child's teachers are from. There will be people available to assist you in locating the area of the hall. If you require the assistance of an interpreter, contact the school on 9498 3722.

**Year 8 students** will be given their new classes for the remainder of the year. With the introduction of an extra class, most children will have some new teachers as well as new classmates.

**Year 9 students** have recently completed a survey about Preferred Learning Styles (PLS). The purpose of this is to inform their teachers and, hence, the teaching and learning programs for individual students who have significant preferences. The majority of learners will have more than one preferred on Newton's Laws of Motion. Newton's Third Law was shown using teams of students pulling in a tug of war.

This was a wonderful lecture as it made concrete, concepts often seen as abstract by our students and explained the everyday importance of the work these young physicists are doing right now.

Dr Foley also spoke of her own background, how she became a research scientist and the excitement and variety that her profession provides her.

- 1. Educate yourself about their on line activity. Be curious and interested when you talk to your children about technology and what it means in their lives.
- 2. Try to have the computer in a public space so that there is a transparency about their on line activity.

casino in the world and a 5 star hotel, as a performing artist for live entertainment. The Venetian is 10.5 million square feet, twice the size of the Las Vegas original.

This was my first ever audition in the professional entertainment industry and I remember I was so nervous! I was pulled aside after the third round by the audition panel.
