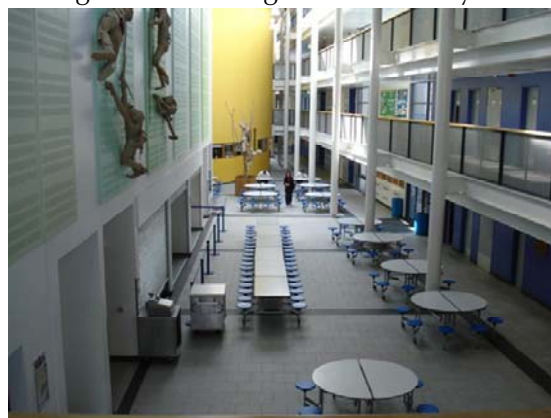
What Makes a Successful School?

Effective education is complex and many of its outcomes are not neatly quantifiable as test scores. Before we reach for simple quantitative 'solutions' to the matters of transparency and accountability, consider how we might shed light on the qualitative aspects of education that cannot be summarised as a number.

The recent public debate about testing and data gives me cause to reflect on my recent visit to a school in the electorate of Barking and Dagenham in East London – a less than advantaged community by any definition. I visited this school the day before the British parliamentary elections. This school had been identified as high performing by Ofsted the body that investigates school performance across the UK. Killara HS it was not. But this East London school was successful in doing great things with young people from backgrounds and with expectations more than a world away from the North Shore of Sydney.



After several years of value added achievement its performance on national tests in 2009 slipped 5% points below the magic benchmark. Its status became that of 'failing school'. The principal, a highly regarded school leader, said that the previous 12 months had been the most difficult of his career. He'd hounded and cajoled the staff and students over the last year, through 'tears, tantrums and frustrations', to pursue performance benchmarks in the national tests in 2010. A second year of 'failure' would bring closer the ogre of 'special measures'. He felt his professional future, let alone the school's, lay in the August publication of testing data. Regardless of this tension, he'd pursued the testing benchmark agenda in literacy and numeracy relentlessly. As a result he



knew that there were students who had not read a novel in two years, as part of their curriculum. He was compelled to narrow the curriculum and compromise the essence of the programs that made the school successful - the intangible development of young people and their aspirations as well as their traditional learning outcomes. As a former English teacher and an

acknowledged specialist in managing and educating the most marginalised youth, it didn't sit comfortably with him. The frustrations we face in education on the North Shore of Sydney pale into insignificance compared to those he encounters daily. National testing, the publication of school performance data, and the consequent league tables did little, in his view, to improve the learning opportunities and outcomes of his students.

I walked back to the tube station and reflected on my earlier encounter at the station exit with a man in an ill fitting suit from whom I had asked directions to the school. He'd been handing out how to vote cards in the electorate where he was standing as a BNP candidate - the electorate he viewed as the most fertile ground for his alarming and extreme political views that include segregated education. I couldn't help feeling that the real value of the school I had just visited and the work of its principal and teachers, wasn't readily summarised or assessed through national testing and the publication of attendant league tables – now the norm in the UK.

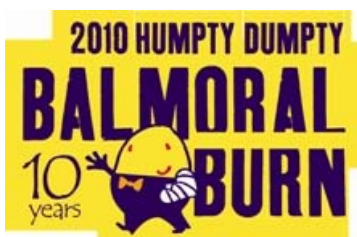

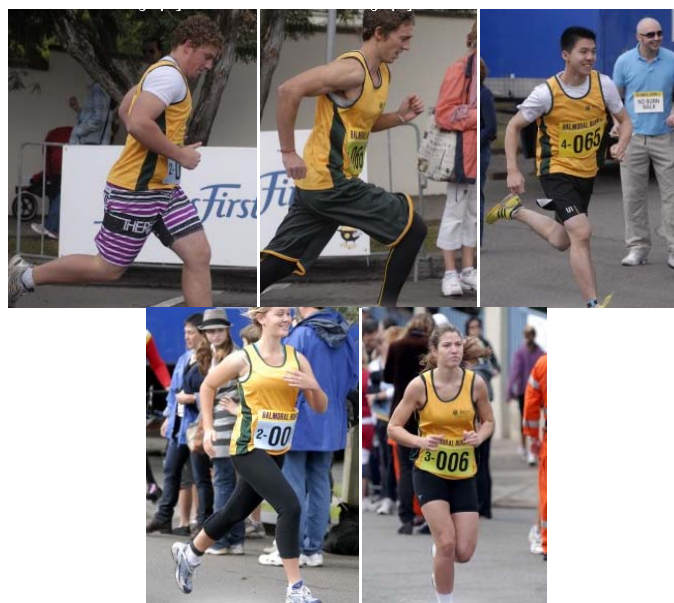

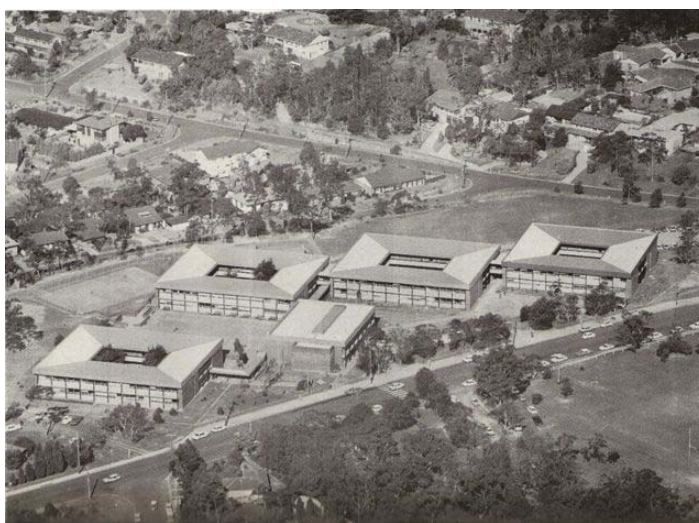
During 2010, the SRC has a number of events planned to enable our school community to be part of Killara High's 40th celebrations. It will be a year to remember!

This year, for the first time, Year 11 students may nominate for Prefect positions (maximum of 4) in the Arts and Sports Councils, SJC and SRC.

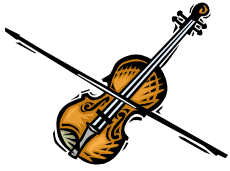

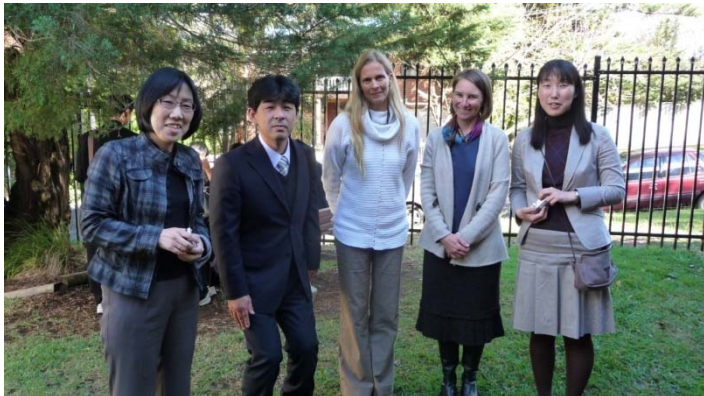

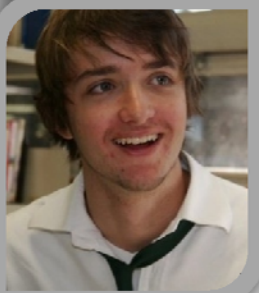

Burton, Tim and Woolverton, Linda. *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland*

From Walt Disney Pictures and director Tim Burton comes a re-imagining of 'Alice in Wonderland'. In this story, Mia Wasikowska stars as 19-year-old Alice, who returns to the whimsical world she first encountered as a young girl, reuniting with her childhood friends - the White Rabbit, Tweedledee and Tweedledum, the Dormouse, the Caterpillar, the Cheshire Cat, and the Mad Hatter. Alice embarks on a journey to find her true destiny and end the Red Queen's reign of terror.

On the night of 31 May 1942, Sydney was doing what it does best: partying.
