#### **Learning from the Past**

In March 1776 several months prior to adoption of the American Declaration of Independence, a man named John Adams published a pamphlet entitled Thoughts on Government that outlined his belief in the need for a bicameral legislature, separation of powers between the legislature and executive and an independent judiciary. His ideas came to fruition in the newly established republic. They have also become foundations of the Australian system of government. Adams eventually became the second President of the United States and while his is not a familiar character in history, the ideas to which he gave voice strongly influenced his world and ours. The second President's biographer noted that finally and emphatically in his Thoughts on Government, Adams urged the widest possible support for education. "Laws for the liberal education of youth, especially for the [most disadvantaged], are so extremely wise and useful that to a humane and generous mind, no expense for this purpose would be thought extravagant." For Adams an inclusive education system was as foundational to democracy as the principles of separation of powers and an independent judiciary.

Over the last 109 years the legislative and judicial pillars of Australia's democracy have proved robust and have been reinforced. Can we say the same for education? If the status quo in education does not suffice, how should it be reinforced or developed? Through transparency? Comparisons between schools? Choice/ competition between schools? 'Privatising' public schools? Principals' and teachers' accountability for results on national skills tests? Performance pay? The merits of some of these approaches to school development are hopefully being considered in the newly established review of the contentious Myschool website. Adams as an 18<sup>th</sup> century democrat would no doubt have applauded efforts in transparency but he and those who've inherited his ideals, would be looking to education for justice as well, not least social justice.

With 21<sup>st</sup> century elections looming there is every likelihood education will feature in public debate. Those in this school community voting for the first time, along with their parents and teachers, will be required to make informed decisions in the midst of often ill-informed argument and commentary. It is a perennial challenge facing citizens in a democracy. The following web address contains an interesting discussion of some of the aforementioned issues, albeit in different context. #### **Links with Fromelles**

Last week a dedication ceremony was held at the new Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery Fromelles, France where 250 Australian and British men who died at the battle of Fromelles on 19<sup>th</sup> July 1916 are now buried.

94 years ago two former pupils of Killara High's foundation school, St Leonards Superior Public School in North Sydney, went into battle with the 30<sup>th</sup> Battalion. Earnest Frank Welling was killed and Blair Wark was wounded. Blair Wark recovered, returned to 32<sup>nd</sup> Battalion and was awarded the DSO and VC for acts of bravery in 1918. Earnest Welling was listed as missing on the 20<sup>th</sup> July 1916 and following a court of enquiry in August 1917 he was pronounced 'killed in action'. His remains were not identified or recovered at the end of the war. They may be among the remains of 111 soldiers exhumed from an unmarked mass grave at Pheasant Wood last year and reburied at Fromelles with grave stones bearing the inscription "An Australian soldier of the Great War".

Another 94 bodies of Australian soldiers were also buried last week at Fromelles after being identified through DNA matching with living Australian relatives. Earnest Welling probably finished his formal schooling in North Sydney around 1898. His employment at the time of enlistment was recorded as 'warehouse duties'. He was 32 when he died. His only known living relative was his mother to whom were sent the Commonwealth Government's Memorial Plaque and Victory Medal in March 1923. Earnest Welling's name is located on panel 117 in the commemorative area of the Australian War Memorial and it is among 1200 names of Australian soldiers with no known grave who are listed on the VC Corner Australian Memorial near Fromelles France.

#### Girls Volleyball Team finishes 4th at State Carnival



Killara High School's all conquering girls volleyball team has achieved the accolade of fourth best team in the state after an excellent showing at the state carnival at Homebush on the 30<sup>th</sup> June and 1<sup>st</sup> July. Not a bad achievement for a group of girls who, for all but two, had played very little competition volleyball before the start of the year.

We arrived at the Indoor Playing Halls at Sydney Olympic Park to see the 15 other girls teams from around the state (some driving 10 hours to be there) who had progressed through their various area competitions. The atmosphere was vibrant, with the colours, chants, dances and warm up techniques of some of the other schools. It could have been off putting for others but our young women took it all in their stride as they prepared for their first up match against Kotara High School.



Despite being a little rusty in the first set, Killara claimed it 25-15 and then went on to win the second and third sets quite easily to claim a place in the final 8 of the state. A match which was played against Bomaderry High went a similar way to the first with a reasonably close first set, which was backed up with 2 clinical performances in the second and third to force our way to the semi finals of the competition.

We knew our semi final opponents, Blayney High School, were going to be hard to beat for a number of reasons; they had knocked out Baulkham Hills High out in the previous round who had won the State Championships for the last previous 11 years and reportedly they had been a 'team' and preparing for this event for the past 4 years.

Well we got exactly what we expected... a well drilled, keen and confident team. After the initial barrage by Blayney, our girls worked their way into the first set but it was too late to save it, going down 25-17. The second set went much like the first with Blayney getting away early and Killara having to fight for every point. Blayney claimed it 25-18 but we knew that if we could get a few early points in the third set that we were certainly still in the contest.

Killara got the good start we were looking for in the third set and lead it 23-19. Blayney, being the outstanding team they are, faught back to get it to 24-24, but thanks to some amazing blocking from a couple of our more inexperienced players and a couple of clutch plays from our 'stars' Killara was able to claim the third set 27-25.

The forth set was another tight one but unfortunately we were beaten 25-22, and while it was extremely disappointing for the team at the time, we could later take solace in the fact that we were the only team at the carnival to take a set from the eventual winners.

We were unfortunately defeated two sets to one by Plumpton High in the play-off for third, but that did not take away from the fact that this group of girls represented Killara High with the highest esteem and pride. They are a credit to the school and themselves.

Special mention must go to our 'Aussie reps' Nicole Laird and Maria fe Artacho del Solar who provided a huge amount of leadership, encouragement and support to our players who, as mentioned did not have a great deal of experience in competition volleyball. Also, a big thank you to Ms Johnstone who provided support and knowledge for the girls at the carnival.

#### Year 11 Student Tour of Vietnam and Cambodia

In the July school vacation, 19 Year 11 students and three teachers from Killara High School led by Ms Jenny Newell embarked on a tour of Vietnam and Cambodia. The academic focus of this great adventure was Studies of Religion and Society and Culture however there was a strong Social Justice and Duke of Edinburgh component to the tour as well, not to forget learning to deal with the challenge of travelling for two weeks through the hottest time of the year in countries that offer few of the comforts of home.

The tour group flew into Ho Chi Minh City and spent three days exploring the city's temples and pagodas, talking with monks and participating in Buddhist ceremonies. The students then visited the temples of the unique Cao Dai sect in Tay Ninh, near the Cambodian border before experiencing what life was like for the Viet Cong in the Cu Chi tunnels of the American-Vietnam war.

The tour group left Ho Chi Minh City by coach arriving at the Mekong Delta after a five hour trip stopping along the way for lunch and to buy drinks and pineapples from roadside stalls. Two days in the delta gave the students ample time to explore the floating markets and get to know people in the local

riverside villages. The Killara High School boys challenged the village boys to a volleyball match and were soundly thrashed! A good time was had by all and a lot of Aussie dollars were spent at the village weavers' stall.

It was then on to Phnom Penh, the capital of Cambodia, by a specially chartered speed boat up the Mekong River. The group explored Phnom Penh by cycle and the following day visited the Royal Palace and National Museum. The afternoon was a more sombre affair when the students visited the Genocide Museum and spoke to one of the survivors of the Pol Pot massacres. The entire group was visibly moved by many of the images and gruesome artefacts of the genocide.

During the tour, the students made every effort to visit as many markets as possible and two of the favourites were the night markets in Phnom Penh and Central Markets. T-shirts, jewellry, bags and paintings were popular items. One of the students picked up a real, antique Rolex watch which was an amazing find – not exactly market prices but excellent value regardless.



On day eight, the tour group started the overland trip from Phnom Penh to Siem Reap stopping midway for a picnic lunch at Kampong Thom. Here they explored three pre-Angkorian temples dating from the 7<sup>th</sup> Century. While the students ate their lunch in a forest clearing they attracted the attention of the local village children who did not have to use much persuasion to inveigle our students to buy an array of scarves and other artefacts.

The following day, the Killara High School touring group explored the vast temple and city complexes of Angkor Thom, the Bayon, Ta Prohm and of course the most famous and the best preserved of all, Angkor Wat. Some of the group decided to get out of bed at 4 a.m. this morning to be at Angkor Wat for the sunrise.

This was an amazing place and if it were not for the fact that the temperature was up in the mid 40 degrees many of us would have liked to stay longer to explore the many buildings, reliefs and statues in more detail.



The Social Justice and Duke of Edinburgh focus came into play with the community project the Killara High School students undertook in Prek Toal Village on the Tonle Sap Lake. Here they worked with the local village carpenters to construct a floating bridge and a set of shelves for the local cottage industry to display its baskets and other handicrafts.

Perhaps the greatest contribution our students were able to make was the money they brought into the community. Several months of cake stalls and a disco dance raised \$3000 which went towards buying the building materials and also medical supplies for the community and a range of school resources for the small village primary school.

The school worked with an NGO, Osmose, whose prime function is to raise environmental awareness while providing villagers with a sustainable income source. The women of the village now dry and weave water hyacinth into beautiful bags and mats and the students had lessons in how to create some simple items to take home with them.

The Tonle Sap Great Lake is the most important inland wetland in South East Asia, supporting three million people and providing the last refuge for some of Asia's most globally significant biodiversity. Many of the communities living on the lake are extremely poor and subsist on the barest essentials. Money from NGOs and private donors such as Killara High School make an enormous difference to the lives of the people. Our presence there also contributed to the local economy in many other ways. Our students all took the paddle boat tour of the village which provided a valuable insight into the life of the village. Local women were hired to cook for us and local carpenters were paid to assist us in our work.

Overnight, we stayed in village house homestays and the homeowners derived a small income for hosting us.

Overall, the tour was an amazing learning experience and much of what we have read about in textbooks has suddenly come alive. What once was put to us as themes and concepts have now become reality. Several of us have made the decision to return one day to volunteer our services working among the poorest street children we saw in the cities.

Here are some new fiction title reviews. Some of these books are replacements for books that were water damaged earlier in the year and are really worth a read.

#### Kuipers, Alice - The Worst Thing She Ever Did

All Sophie wants is to forget what happened last summer. But that's not easy when people keep asking if she's okay, and her mother locks herself behind closed doors for hours at a time. And now her best friend, Abigail, cares more about parties and boys than hanging out with Sophie.

Lost in memories of the life she once had — before that terrible day — Sophie retreats into herself. But it's only so long before she must confront the tragedy of her past so she can face the future.

#### Lovric, Michelle - The Undrowned Child

It's the beginning of the 20th century; the age of scientific progress. But for Venice the future looks bleak. A conference of scientists assembles to address the problems, among whose delegates are the parents of twelve-year-old Teodora. Within days of her arrival, she is subsumed into the secret life of Venice: a world in which salty-tongued mermaids run subversive printing presses, ghosts good and bad patrol the streets and librarians turn fluidly into cats. A battle against forces determined to destroy the city once and for all quickly ensues. Only Teo, the undrowned child,

who survived a tragic accident as a baby, can go 'between the linings' to subvert evil and restore order.

#### Laird, Elizabeth - Crusade

Two boys from opposing worlds come face to face in this thought-provoking new historical adventure from a highly acclaimed author. TWO BOYS. TWO FAITHS. ONE UNHOLY WAR . . . When Adams mother dies unconfessed, he pledges to save her soul with dust from the Holy Land. Employed as a dog-boy for the local knight, Adam grabs the chance to join the Crusade to reclaim Jerusalem. He burns with determination to strike down the infidel enemy . . .
