Remembrance Day Assembly				

At our Remembrance Day assembly held on Thursday 10th November, Prefect Jeremy McNamara (Year 11) delivered the following speech:

"Remembrance Day is a time to reflect on those who have given their lives in war and, indeed, those serving in wars today.

Tomorrow marks the 93rd anniversary of the signing of the Armistice, signifying the official end of World War One. It was at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month that troops on both sides ceased their shooting and put down their weapons. It was the symbolic end to more than four years of continuous fighting with up to 13 million people having died and over 70 million having been mobilised to take part in the war to end all wars.

Across the following years, Remembrance Day attained a special significance. After World War Two this day was adapted to commemorate not just the ending of a war, but to be a time to remember those who had fallen in all wars and those who had suffered for it.

Remembrance Day has a particular meaning to me. When I was a young child my family and I were living in Singapore and we attended an ANZAC Day Dawn Service at the memorial in Kranji. This was a very solemn and humble occasion for my family. My greatgrandfather had served in World War Two and was taken as a prisoner of war in Singapore. He had died as a POW, and his grave was here, in the very place where we were commemorating the ANZAC spirit.

As I listened to and watched the service, I couldn't help but think of the sacrifices made by those who believed in a future free of tyranny, on behalf of young people like me. And I looked around at the faces of people, young and old, Australians, New Zealanders, South Africans, English, Turks and Japanese, drawn together for that commemoration, it dawned on me that while the loss of so many lives was a product of war, so too is a commemoration like today, and the bringing together of people to remember and offer thanks.

That day, with its special significance for my family, changed how I think about the importance of commemorating and remembering the past. I've grown up with a feeling of connection to services like the one we hold here today. This is truly a day for Remembrance- of sacrifice, of loss and mourning, but also of duty and a higher call.

Although Remembrance Day commemorates the moment when the guns on the Western Front fell silent, and enemy and ally alike put down their weapons, it also offers the chance to remember all the fallen and those who have given their lives for their service to their country. Although these men and women are gone, they will never truly leave us as long as we continue to remember their sacrifice. Mock Trial Wrap

A birthday at the races ended in Court last week with an 18 year old man charged with breaching a Police move on direction given under legislation only 24 hours old. At least, this was Mock Trial scenario faced by Killara High School in the state Semi-finals of the NSW Law Society Mock Trial Competition. The team, comprised of Neha Mulay, Harrison Schaap, Natalie Udler, Alice Webb, Brian Yoon and Nick Yuen, has been in the knockout competition since March this year.



The Mock Trial Competition pits two schools against each other in a fictional legal case, complete with barristers, a solicitor and witness evidence. Alice Webb, Barrister, said "The most difficult aspect is thinking on your feet when the Judge is firing questions at you about the case or a point of law." Teamwork is crucial in these situations. "We have a really great team and I often turn to the advice of Nick and Neha when I'm getting grilled!", she said.

The team is coached by prominent retired Judge, David Patten. Mr Patten has given up countless hours to assist the team sharing his experience in legal procedure, court room etiquette and the finer points of legal reasoning.



An 8 - 1 win-loss record would be the envy of any team in any competition. From 250 initial teams across NSW, the Killara team advanced through to the final four following a series of impressive and gripping victories.

Harrison Schaap said, "in one round, we won by a single point. It was a tie breaker and when the judge was handing down the decision it was the most nervewracking thing ever!" Winning in tight situations is one of the marks of an excellent team, and defeating excellent opposition is another. Opponents defeated along the way included James Ruse High, Baulkham Hills, Roseville College and Barker College.

Unfortunately, the opposition in the semi-final, John Paul College, Coffs Harbour, was too strong, with Killara going down by 6 points. The Grand Final will be held in the first week of December.

Student Diary Survey Results

Late last term students were encouraged to participate in a survey relating to the use of the USB Memory Stick in comparison to the traditional paper diary. In 2011 students in Years 10 and 11 were issued with the USB Memory Stick loaded with a diary function whereas all other students were issued with a traditional diary. The USB was issued to complement to use of the DER Laptops. Some interesting results of the survey include:

- Over 75% of respondents would prefer a conventional paper diary
- Over 80% of respondents think it is important that they are provided with a tool for organisation

A sample of comments about the positive aspects of the USB Memory Stick:

• It was easy to carry round files and folder

Virtual Excursion - Year 8 Gifted and Talented Class

Seeing a real lung specimen might send shivers down the spine for some people, however the Year 8 Gifted and Talented class certainly enjoyed the virtual excursion to the University of NSW Faculty of Medicine - Museum of Human Disease.

On the 14th October, we went on a journey to experience and learn about respiratory diseases, especially emphysema with our presenter Nadiya Brell, a second year medical student who is learning to be a specialist in the field of respiratory diseases, and also a lecturer at the Museum of Human Disease, a part of the Faculty of Medicine.


The lecture was primarily based around Nadiya performing a voiceover, around several slides with information. She frequently paused for questions and to ask for our opinions. She also helped us differentiate between the diseased and healthy parts of a real lung specimen. We attained a lot of new information, such as the anatomy of the respiratory system (after all, we do need to understand the basics before treading into the deep end), processes of emphysema and tuberculosis, what we can learn from its action in patients, differentiating the stages of the diseases, auscultation and listening to the differences between healthy and diseased lungs, causes, preventions, symptoms, and finally who and how this disease impacts people.

After the lecture, the whole class had pages full of interesting facts about this particular disease. We also heard what doctors hear when they use a stethoscope, and we differentiated between the sounds made by a healthy and unhealthy lung.

So to sum it all up, what have we really learnt? Personally, it was that smoking does absolutely dreadful things to you. The recordings of wheezing and coughing lungs, as well as more disturbing graphics like holes, blackness and rash like patterns made me certain that I will never start smoking.

Life cut short: Dealing with Youth Suicide in the Community It's a tough topic, but one parents and communities

It's a tough topic, but one parents and communities must face up to – youth suicide.

Ku-ring-gai Council Youth Services and the Ku-ring-gai Youth Development Service (KYDS) will host a free parent forum focusing on the causes and effects of youth suicide on

Guest speakers: Dr Michael Dudley AM and Sarah Maxwell from Suicide Prevention Australia (SPA) will talk about the impact of youth suicide on young people, their parents and the larger community.

The aim of the forum is to give parents insight into youth suicide, its triggers, how Australian communities are dealing with it and what more can be done. Parents can discuss their experiences with other local families, ask questions and get advice from the expert speakers.

About the speakers

Dr Dudley has been chairperson of SPA since 2001 and works as a psychiatrist at Prince of Wales and Sydney Children's Hospitals. He has extensive experience working with young people, indigenous communities and refugees at risk of self harm and suicide. He is also a lecturer at the University of NSW and recently received an Australian Medal for his contribution to suicide prevention and youth mental health.

Ms Maxwell holds a Masters in Social Development and a Graduate Certificate in Suicide Prevention Studies. She is currently the Research and Policy Development Coodinator at SPA, and is responsible for researching and responding to suicide prevention issues in Australia and around the world.
