Optimism, commitment courtesy and goodwill

If there is a distinguishing feature of this school it is the optimism, courtesy and goodwill that prevail in nearly all interactions between staff students and parents. Since late January my colleagues have been most grateful for the patience and understanding shown by students given the disruption to routines and amenities available to them. The staff, too, has been very accommodating in making do with less than ideal conditions for work and teaching.

The work on drainage will end eventually. It will rectify shortcomings evident for nearly a decade. The short term inconvenience will bring long term improvement.

When this work has been completed the school and P&C will be investing funds in a number of improvements to facilities that have been temporarily postponed until the site is cleared of contractor compounds, trenches and materials.

Some areas of artificial grass will be laid, additional seating installed and pathways to the House established.

Future grounds working bees will focus on restoration of gardens disturbed by the recent drainage work.

In spite of the limitations in the physical amenity our students and staff have shown commitment to the educational tasks at hand and their goodwill and sincerity are deeply appreciated.

To spend time with students at Killara is to be reminded of their quality, their intelligence, sense of responsibility, their happiness and an abundant generosity of spirit.

On two recent occasions staff has accompanied students away from the school on physically demanding outdoor learning opportunities. On both, the resilience of students and their capacities to rise to challenges and demonstrate a wonderful maturity, has been clearly evident.

With students like this and the many talented, hard working staff providing professional services and a deep sense of care, and with so many parents providing extensive support for more than their own children, 2011 promises much. We are all indeed fortunate to be part of the Killara High School community and our good fortune affords us the opportunity to reflect and consider how we might contribute to more advantaged lives for those who, through circumstances beyond their own control find themselves in need of help.

DEAS Gold Qualifying Expedition - Mt Jagungal, Snowy Mountains

Very, very bright and early on 2nd February our last Duke of Ed journey began. We all crawled out of bed to meet Dr Carter at 5:30am(!) and loaded the bus ready for the seven hour drive south.



On arrival at the track head, in the Jagungal Wilderness Area, Snowy Mountains, we began our four day hike through some very challenging terrain and some less than exciting weather. Following the Tumut River towards our first campsite, we got a real taste of the Snowy Mountains and how the scenery is spectacularly different to the Wild Dog Mountains and the Colo river areas where we had hiked before. That night, we received our first of many significant downpours and the river beside us rose but half a metre. Unfortunately Emily, Jess, and Annalise's tent flooded, and Emily's sleeping bag ended up being used as a dam.

The next day was sunny and warm; we walked out of the campsite towards O'Keefe's Hut, where we would spend the next two nights. This day involved some extremely steep hills and a few river crossings. The weather stayed fine for the evening and we enjoyed a camp fire and various card games in the hut.



Again the night brought on a huge down pour, and more tents were flooded. The next day was very foggy, but not raining, so we started our trek to the

top of Mount Jagungal, unfortunately without Dr Carter and Annalise, who was feeling sick. Jagungal is one of the highest mountains in the Snowy Mountain Range and it proved to be the most challenging ascent yet. At the top we had lunch, and all felt like we were about to be blown off the mountain because of the incredible winds and cloud that was blowing past.



We returned to the hut to find that Dr Carter had called an ambulance for Annalise, who was at this stage, not getting any better. After she had left with the ambulance, a huge storm rolled in, and that night, many of us didn't sleep very much at all because of the intensity of the thunder and lightning around us.

On our final day's walk, the rain had not stopped and we were forced to take a longer route to avoid the swollen Tumut River. We walked 20km with rain falling sideways the whole time. The relief amongst the group when we reached the bus was incredible as



we were able to be dry for the first time in a couple of days. We then drove to Talbingo where we had a Chinese Buffet for dinner, and a very good night's sleep.

Mathematics Matters

CALCULATORS

All students in Years 8-12 are required to have their own scientific calculator to use in mathematics lessons. Students wishing to purchase a calculator will need to pay \$25 at the school office. They will be issued with a receipt which they need to present to the mathematics staffroom to receive their calculator.

Year 7 students will require a calculator for the National Assessment Program (NAPLAN). The NAPLAN test dates for 2011 are Tuesday 10th May to Thursday 12th May. Students will shortly receive a note about calculators and it is advised that they purchase a calculator as soon as possible as they will

need to have their own calculator for the test and be familiar with its use.

MATHEMATICS TEXTBOOKS

Unfortunately, many students failed to return their mathematics textbooks last year and consequently, several students are yet to receive them this year as we do not have sufficient to issue. Students who have not returned the textbook that was issued to them in 2010 by **Friday 11th March** will be issued with an invoice (approximately \$55) to cover the cost of replacing the textbook.

Additional Bus Services to and from Gordon

A longstanding issue has been overcrowding on the **Gordon buses**. Shorelink have been sympathetic to this issue and have now successfully gained approval from Transport NSW to run an additional service from Gordon in the morning and to Gordon in the afternoon.

The additional bus, **8082** will leave Gordon at 8.25am coming to the school. The reciprocal bus **9082** will depart from Rank 10 as soon as possible after the bell, to be followed by the normal **9004** from Rank 10 to Gordon, changing at Gordon for West Pymble. Hence, there will now be **three** buses going to and from Gordon each day.

This change does however necessitate that the **8061** from **West Killara** in the morning will now run five

minutes earlier, leaving at 7.50am and arriving at school at 8.18am to allow it time to return to Gordon to complete the additional 8082 run at 8.25am. Students on this bus have been notified. I am sure that you will understand that the inconvenience caused by this earlier bus is far outweighed by the capacity to run an additional service for students who have suffered increasing overcrowding over a period of time. Indeed, a number of students travelling to and from Gordon have had to make alternative arrangements in the past because they simply cannot fit on.

I thank management at Shorelink for their proactive work in generating a solution to this problem.

A New Non-Fiction Book in Detail:

Bruckner, Martin and Ross, Dyann. *Under Corporate Skies: A Struggle between People, Place and Profit.*

The story of a small Australian country town, Yarloop, and its struggle with its corporate neighbor, Aloca, and the West Australian government. Though it deals with a particular community, this tale could be told almost anywhere in Australia – where people live in close contact with industry – The Hunter Valley, Latrobe Valley, East Gippsland or Gladstone. The authors show us the dark side of today's development agenda – the threat to the social and environmental sustainability of towns when body corporate and governments fail to protect health and well being of communities in the shadow of heavy industry.

While all parties in the conflict are heard in this book, the voices of the least are heard - in the spheres where politics and economics meet- the local people faced with the breakdown of their town and community, their marriages and friendships, the loss of family, a sense of place and local history.

The authors argue for a form of partnership building in which industries, governments & their electorates meet as equals to create a shared vision that provides for society's material needs while it protects what matters locally: people and place.

Did You Know?.... Thirty years ago, Killara High School had some 'firsts' in the following areas:

1981 was the first time that KHS's Home Economics Department implemented 3 Unit Syllabuses in Home Science and in Textiles and Design.

1981 was the first year the Physical Education Department [now the PDHPE Faculty] became a separate Department at KHS. Year 7 KHS students were divided into three mixed boys and girls groups for PE lessons. Also the introduction of a Basic Skills Program, one period per week was introduced for all

Year 7 students. It was aimed as a link between primary and high school, with emphasis on basic movements common to many sports e.g. hand-eye, foot-eye coordination, balance and control over body movements.

In 1981, KHS School Band was formed. Karen Jones and Francie Campbell Teacher-Librarians
