They have all demonstrated great improvement in their speaking and organisational skills and they will be a formidable team in the senior competition next year.

Primary School Debating Workshops

In recent weeks students from Killara High School have been involved in conducting debating workshops at local primary schools. Students from years 11 and 10 have visited Lindfield East, Killara and Lindfield Public Schools to provide mentoring in a range of skills needed in this popular extracurricular activity.

Primary school students practised a range of activities that helped develop their listening, speaking and note taking skills. The tasks were designed to be fun, challenging and relevant to debating. The most popular activity seemed to be "Um, Like, Um" in which students were asked to give an impromptu speech for as long as possible without using those dreaded filler words.



Students then engaged in mini debates on a range of topics including, "That everyone should play a sport"; "That pocket money should be earned"; and "That books are better than TV."

Such debates ensure that students become aware that opinions need to be based on evidence and logic, and that it is necessary to consider different aspects of a problem before reaching a conclusion.



As well as being an exciting occasion for the primary school students, it also provided a valuable opportunity for Killara High School students to gain confidence in public speaking and to develop their leadership skills. Year 11 student, **Daniel Ge** said that he was initially quite nervous taking on the role of a mentor and instructor, but that he became more comfortable as the workshop progressed.

Another student, **Elias Visontay** (**Year 11**) commented that participating in the workshops was a "memorable experience" and that it was "so rewarding to see so many children enthusiastic about learning".

School uniform and how others see us

The previous newsletter included remarks from Ms Phelan Deputy Principal about the need for students to wear the uniform with pride. A photograph of students in uniform was included. The students in the picture responded spontaneously to some confronting survey data Ms Williamson Head Teacher Stage 5 and I presented to Years 9 and 10 at an assembly recently. The survey date came from 350 primary school families. Many responses revealed less than favourable perceptions of Killara High School, its students and its teachers.

It is apparent that the way a school uniform is worn leads people in the community to make judgements about our school, its students, staff and families. In the eyes of those who are unfamiliar with our school, poorly worn uniform equals poor discipline, low student achievement, declining academic standards, ineffective teachers, inadequate leadership and an absence of school pride.

This is not the school I lead, it's not the school our students know they attend and it's not the school to which so many staff and parents are deeply committed.

We have outstanding HSC results, magnificent students, a deep reservoir of professional experience

and decades of success in public education. It is a privileged position we hold in the education firmament. The reputation of this great school that has been established and sustained over more than four decades, is ours to inherit. It is not ours to diminish.

Unfortunately, in 2011, the way our students present themselves in public, on the way to and from school, at ceremonies and representative events, at the shops, bus stops and railway stations, is affecting perceptions of quality at this school.

There is no doubt the physical amenity and difficulties created by size, have created a distorting lens through which all other aspects of the school are viewed. We mightn't be able to rid ourselves or 'sweeten' the look of 21 demountable buildings on our small site and in so doing remove the distorting lens, but we can do something about the uniform if we choose to act together – parents, students and staff.

While the old saying, 'You can't always judge a book by its cover,' may apply to our students and the way they wear their uniform, there is another equally potent observation that is relevant - 'You never get a second chance at a first impression.' The latter saying is eclipsing the former.

Feedback from the mums and dads with children at local primary schools, who are anxious about where to send their children in the secondary years, is unequivocal. If this school is to have a bright future and continue to offer the options, opportunities and social environment that have served students and families so well in the past, we need to retain or indeed strengthen the local community's confidence in this school. One way we can help with this this is through the school uniform.

The way our students wear the school uniform is letting Killara HS down, and when confronted with the very direct, critical comments from our local community, our students know they are letting themselves down. Our students are rightly proud of their achievements, their peers and (just quietly) they are proud of the school they attend. They will tell you, "We're as good as any other school in this community!" We need to work together with our students if we are to shift negative community perceptions of this school, as superficial and unfounded as they may be.



How you can help

This school's *Statement of Purpose* is explicit in its reference to shared decision-making, partnership and collective accountability. A project group comprising staff, students, uniform shop volunteers and other interested parents will be meeting to work on the issue of uniform. This may involve some updating and or redesign of the current uniform. If you have an interest in helping us with this multi-dimensional task

We will <u>all</u> have to do something about the uniform and the way it is worn. The school staff will be addressing this issue and the broader matter of school image at two staff meetings in late August and early September. Student leadership groups will also be involved in the process of consultation and decision-making. Expectations of all students regarding the wearing of the uniform will be explicit.

The school needs your support as parents in the matter of managing and improving the way our school uniform is worn. Please support the school by ensuring that your child(ren) have sufficient items of uniform and that correct footwear is worn at all times. A copy of the school's uniform code is reproduced on Page 9.

Please monitor what they wear to and from school. The appearance of students on their journeys to and from Koola Avenue, as pedestrians, or on public transport, has a strong influence on how the community views Killara High School. We may not have high quality facilities but we have high quality students. We need them, and the students themselves want, to be seen this way. Parental encouragement, positive reinforcement and persistence in the matter of uniform will be supported here at school. We need to work together.

Important notice: uniform is mandatory for excursions, sporting events and other representative duties

Parents and students are advised that all students leaving the school to participate in excursions, sporting events or attend events as representatives of the school, must wear the complete school uniform or sports uniform (unless non uniform attire is specifically stated in written advice to parents). Students who choose to wear non-uniform items or footwear in contravention of the school's clear expectations, may not depart from school with their peers. Students who cannot wear the complete sport uniform will not represent the school in sporting competitions.

Students who are not permitted to depart the school because of non compliance with the school's uniform expectations may forfeit any amounts paid for the excursion, event or competition. A student's choice to wear an item of clothing or footwear that does not comply with the school's uniform code will preclude refund of part or all of amounts paid for an excursion or activity.

A high standard of uniform reinforces a strong and positive school profile and reputation in the wider community that has been established over more than three decades. It is a profile and reputation that current Killara students are privileged to inherit. Students are actively encouraged to wear the designated uniform and to take pride in their identity as members of one of this state's outstanding comprehensive high schools for girls and boys.

As parents and families are moving towards a new school year, many will purchase new school uniform items. It is important at this time to stress the correct uniform items as listed in this information booklet.

All parents are asked to support the school's uniform policy by ensuring that their children wear the designated uniform.

<u>All</u> students are to wear the school uniform each day to school (including Thursday – Sport afternoon) and change into the sports uniform for PE classes, sport, coaching or knockout competitions.

Wearing the School Uniform

Some students attempt to interpret the designated uniform in their own interests. This results in an inconsistent uniform which, in turn, draws negative comments from parents, teachers and the wider community. Acceptable school dress is not to be a matter of individual interpretation. If parents are having difficulty with the provision of a uniform, please contact the Principal.

The school appreciates the support of the parents in ensuring that the uniform reflects the high standing of this school in the community.

- Students who do not wear the designated uniform can expect an after school detention including school service.
- Students who continue to fail to comply with the uniform code will be required to present for interview with their parents.

Students and their families choose to join the Killara High School community. Membership of this community carries with it significant expectations and responsibilities. This includes abiding by the uniform policy and code endorsed by the school community. It is a very clear expectation that students accepted for enrolment at Killara will wear the designated uniform correctly.

Should you have any concerns regarding this policy and its implementation, as outlined, it is important that you approach the school and discuss your concerns before it becomes an issue for your son or daughter.

The aim of the uniform policy at Killara High School is to support and reinforce the strong positive profile and reputation of this school in the wider community, and to foster a strong sense of student identity and pride in the school. Your support in achieving this for the benefit of all students is appreciated.

Parents are asked to note these requirements and to ensure that their sons and daughters conform and take pride in the detail of their dress.

- Correct school uniform must be worn to and from school, unless the school authorises the wearing of non-uniform for a specific purpose.
- Excessive jewellery should not be worn because of risk of injury or loss.
- Joggers (gym boots, sand shoes, etc) must not be worn to school as they are not part of the uniform.

Cooperation is especially sought in avoiding:

- Any jumper or top that is not a KHS uniform item
- Non KHS caps and beanies
- Non KHS Sport trackpants

Items that are **not appropriate** and that are **not** part of the uniform include:

- Cargo pants
- Board shorts
- Blue or black jeans
- Coloured t-shirts or t-shirts with a printed design worn beneath shirts/blouses or plain t-shirts extending beyond the short sleeves
- Brand-named or other coloured jumpers and sloppy joes
- Knee high stockings, socks with logos, other coloured socks or long socks
- Belts that are coloured and hanging down loosely
- Shoes that are not black, runners, suede shoes, boots, excessively high heels or ugh boots.
- Excessive jewellery, large looped earrings, multiple and/or large and brightly coloured bracelets, necklaces and rings.

Uniform Pass

If your child is not able to wear correct school uniform for one or more days, you will need to provide a note explaining why this is not possible and the timeframe required to overcome the problem.

Such notes are to be handed in to Home Group Teachers. Your child will then be issued with a uniform pass which can be shown to any teacher. Failure to bring such a note could result in an after-school detention.

The School Uniform

The following items of uniform, with the exception of shoes and white sports socks, are available from

the Uniform Shop. Ties and caps are also available from the School Accounts Office in A Block.

All items marked * are available from Killara High School Uniform Shop and can be worn with both, uniform and sports uniform.

Blazers

Prefects and student representatives attending formal events outside the school are required to wear school blazers. Blazers may be borrowed from the school. Students wishing to purchase blazers may purchase/order them from the Uniform Shop. Any student may purchase a blazer if they wish to.

Junior Uniform: 'Gordon' tartan dress

Senior Uniform: Years 11 and 12 only. 'Gordon' tartan skirt, white blouse with tartan

trim

Shoes: Black lace-up leather school shoes. Socks: White short anklet (above ankle).

Girl's Uniform - Winter

Skirt:* 'Gordon' tartan hipster

Trousers: * Long mid grey

Shirt: White, long sleeve with collar, worn with tie (unisex).

Tie: * Junior - 'Gordon' tartan.

Senior - Green with school crest.

Jumpers: * V-necked wool or cotton jumper, green with crest.

Poly/cotton fleecy, green with navy collar and crest.

Shoes: Black lace-up leather school shoes.

Tights:* Black - microfibre (opaque) or cotton or

Socks: White short anklet (above ankle).

Year 12 Jersey: The wearing of a Year 12 Jersey is a privilege extended to Year 12.

It is not part of the designated uniform and may only be worn in conjunction with the correct uniform, which includes a white shirt and

tie.

Boy's Uniform

Trousers:* Long trousers, zippered mid-grey (summer or winter weight),

polyester/viscose.

Shorts (summer): Mid-grey zippered shorts (not cargo/work shorts).

Shirt (summer):* Plain white, short-sleeved with collar, worn with school tie or

Plain white, short-sleeved overshirt with collar and school crest (worn

untucked with no tie)

Shirt (winter): Plain white, long sleeved with collar, worn with school tie (unisex).

Tie: * Junior – 'Gordon' tartan.

Senior – Green with crest.

Socks: Mid-grey socks.

Shoes: Black lace-up leather school shoes.

Jumpers:* V-necked wool or cotton jumper, bottle green with crest, or
Fleecy Jumpers:* Poly/cotton fleecy, green with navy collar and crest.

Belt:* Black leather

PDHPE & Sports Uniform

The PDHPE and sports uniform is to be worn for all PDHPE classes and sporting events, and is available ONLY from KHS Uniform Shop. Grade sport uniforms are available from the school's PDHPE Department.

All students must bring their PDHPE/sport uniform and change for Sport, PDHPE, Physical Activity and Sports Science, Sport, Lifestyle and Recreation Studies and Knock Out games. Normal school uniform is to be worn to and from school by **all** students everyday. A sports bag is available from the Uniform Shop at a very low cost for this purpose.

Shirt:* Microfibre polo top with school crest (unisex)

Shorts:* Microfibre, bottle green sports shorts with school logo "K" (unisex)

Trackpants:* Bottle green, microfibre, cotton-lined (unisex)

Track Top: * Optional - Bottle green, microfibre, with crest, zippered with drawstring

waist (unisex)

Cap:* Bottle green with gold trim (unisex)

Socks: White sports socks

Safety Apparel – OH&S Regulations/Requirements

Footwear

The Department of Education & Training and OH&S regulations with regard to footwear state that proper protective footwear (that is lace-up leather shoes - black for KHS) must be worn in all specialist rooms. Soft shoes and sandals are not acceptable. Additional requirements apply in some courses.

Food Technology (Stage 5 and 6 Courses)

Food Technology students must wear an apron during practical lessons. The aprons are available from the Uniform Shop.

Industrial Technology (Stage 5 and 6 Courses)

The cost of an apron is included as part of the course contribution for this course. Students are required to wear this apron in practical classes. Students must also wear shoes with leather uppers to protect their feet from heavy, sharp or hot objects. The Killara High School Uniform shoe is satisfactory for this purpose.

Technology (Stage 4 Course)

Aprons must be worn during the practical food component in the Technology course.

Mufti-Day Dress Code

On a nominated day each term, students are not required to wear uniform to school, usually in support of a particular charity or event. On Mufti-days a dress code applies as follows:

- Thongs cannot be worn as footwear protective footwear is still required as described above.
- Singlet tops or other skimpy or immodest clothing including excessively short shorts or skirts should not be worn.
- T-shirts with offensive or inappropriate messages or logos should not be worn.

Students who do not comply with this code may be asked to return home to change into appropriate attire.
