When the Deputy Director-General came to KHS

25th August was a busy day for Killara High School. It was the day that Mr Greg Prior, Deputy Director-General, Public Schools, NSW Department of Education and Communities, chose to tour the school along with his colleague Ms Jane Simmons, Regional Director, Northern Sydney to see one of NSW's leading public schools in action.



School captains **Victoria Durand** and **Stephen Mackay** and Senior Prefects **Will Longman** and **Jessica Young** took charge as the group made their way around the school. They paused a while to listen to the music ensemble practising, chatted with Year 12, Year 10 and Year 8 students in classrooms and took a look inside the library and a lab.

As DDG, Mr Prior oversees 2400 public schools, with thousands of students and teachers in ten regions of NSW. He visits schools regularly to get a feel of the school and receive feedback from students and teachers.

So what is special about our school? "Killara High has a fine reputation as a public school, not just for its academic results but also the attitude of the students and care shown by teachers," pointed out Mr Prior. Besides academics, students have a wide range of extra-curricular activities to pursue, in creative and performing arts and sports, which helps to make Killara High the school of choice for students of all abilities and talents.

"We are very proud of Killara High School," said Ms Jane Simmons, emphasising the benefits of strong links with parents and the community, and the relentless focus on high expectations in academics as well as in extra-curricular activities.

Mr Prior asked a class of Year 12 students what they liked about the school. Students mentioned positive attitude of fellow students and the caring and respect they receive from teachers who are highly committed individuals, ready and willing to help them at any time. Mr Prior reminded them that, though Year 12 was an important milestone that deserved the best effort possible, a less than favourable mark is not the end of the world. There are many other pathways to achieving one's dream, he said, pointing out that his own son did not finish Year 12, but followed his passion to study snakes, and is now working on a PhD.

IWBs training and thank you to the P&C

This means that the majority of rooms in the school now have IWB's installed. The Student HSC PIN and UAC PIN – What's the Difference?



All HSC students have now received an HSC PIN to log in to <u>Students Online</u> and also to retrieve their results online or by SMS on 14th December.

The Board of Studies issued all HSC students with their HSC PIN on a handy card (see accompanying image) attached to a letter in April this year.

Students Online (<u>studentsonline.bos.nsw.edu.au</u>) is a website designed specifically for HSC students, with information, tips and tools to assist them in their study throughout the year.

There is also a personal account section called '<u>My</u> <u>Details</u>', which students log into with their HSC PIN and Student Number. 'My Details' is where they can check their personal HSC status including:

Get Wise, Question Everything

For some students in Years 10 to 12, "chewing the cud" during the lunch break has more to do with the brain than the stomach. That is, if they are headed for the informal Philosophy Club that English teacher, Saurabh Bhattacharya (Mr B for short), runs at Killara High.



Philosophy is described in Wikipedia as a study of general and fundamental problems especially those connected with existence, knowledge, values, reason, mind, and language. Philosophy is distinguished from other ways of addressing such problems by its critical, generally systematic approach and its reliance on rational argument. The aim of the free thinking Club, which meets every Monday and Tuesday at 1.10 pm, is to foster a desire among students to closely, logically and critically, examine all that is happening around them.

The Club's motto would probably be something from Plato's dialogue *Apologia*, in which Greek philosopher Socrates is quoted as saying 'the unexamined life is not worth living', says Mr B. "In a world where information overload is the norm and where one can Google anything and accept it as the only truth, it is imperative for young adults to approach every single aspect of their lives with a strong critical awareness and a consistent desire for knowledge. The Club attempts to inculcate in its attendees this critical awareness through open dialogue on diverse issues, ranging from the deeply metaphysical to something taken from yesterday's headlines. Each session, though, is deliberately inquiring. It is often the case that at the end of a session, students walk out with more questions than answers, but it is my firm belief that true knowledge is achieved only by a mind constantly wrestling with questions," explains Mr B.

Some students are analytical, some artistic and others subjective thinkers, but they all present a point of view. An educated mind must be capable of considering and discussing multiple or opposing thoughts, without necessarily believing in them.

Since its inception in Term Two, the Club has gained a steady popularity among Killara High's students. At present, about 15-20 students attend the sessions. It is not a mandatory class: students are welcome to drop in and out at their pleasure, but when they are in the Club they must engage in philosophical discussions. The topics students have engaged in so far include:

The meaning of justice. What is freedom? Is it ethical to download movies and music? Can there be a universal good? Is time travel logically possible? Is there free will? Where does the mind reside?

The word 'philosophy' comes from the Greek 'philosophia' which literally means 'love of wisdom'. And that can only be a good thing. **Gouri Umashankar, Public Relations**
