Students and staff attended a Remembrance Day Assembly on Thursday 8th November at which Mr Whitney, representative of the Roseville RSL Sub-Branch spoke of the origin and purpose of such a ceremony. Mr Whitney served in Vietnam in 1967-8 and his three children attended Killara High School in the 1980s.

On Sunday 11th November at 11am our school captains, Alex Mura and Roxy Swart chaired a community Remembrance Day ceremony at Roseville, attended by student representatives from Ku-ring-gai area schools. Mr Mike Askey, President of the RSL Sub-Branch, reminded the 100 people attending the ceremony that intersecting streets adjacent to the Memorial Park bear the names of local servicemen (Larkin, MacLaurin and Pockley) who died in conflicts early in the 20th century. Their names are also inscribed on the park Memorial. **Daniel Brini (Year 10)** played the Last Post and Reveille and **Estelle Holden (Year 11)** delivered a poignant address on behalf of all students. Estelle's address is reproduced in this newsletter.

**Remembering Pte Cecil Edward Warne, 7543 former student of St Leonards Superior Public School**

Pte Warne's name and that of his brother Sidney are recorded on the Memorial Boards in the Kerrabee Centre that bear the names of former students of St Leonards Superior Public School who served in the Great War. This school was one of the foundation schools for North Sydney Technical High School and Killara High School.

Pte Cecil Warne followed his elder brother (who joined up in 1915) into the Australian Imperial Force when he turned 18 in 1917. Prior to this Cecil attended school until 1913. After leaving school he became an apprentice joiner for three years. He lived at home with his mother at 10 Carlow St North Sydney, which is immediately behind North Sydney Boys High School.

Once in England he was attached to School of Farriery and qualified as a

Cold Shoer before being sent to France in April as part of reinforcements for the 13th Battalion. At approximately 3.30am, as his unit was withdrawing from the line at Villers Bretonneux, he was severely wounded by a shell blast that killed another man. Pte Neal also in the 13th Battalion, reported: "He was wounded by pieces of shell all over the body, legs and arm."

He had been wounded about an hour before we took him away, we bandaged him up and everything possible was done for him.

He was conscious and able to speak to us." Other reports indicate Cecil's left leg was shattered and his left arm also damaged.

Pte Warne died of wounds that morning in the Dressing Station at Daours. He is buried in the Daours Communal Cemetery Extension, France. It is not known when his mother Amelia Warne was informed of her son's death.

By this time Mrs Warne lived at 5 Military Road Neutral Bay and it was at this address that she received a package on the 3rd February 1919 containing her son's surviving personal effects – a metal mirror, wrist watch (damaged), strap, disc, letters and photos.

Not until 1922 did she received the Memorial Plaque given to every family who lost a family member. Cecil's older brother also served in France, was wounded in 1917, but survived and returned to Australia and discharged as medically unfit in 1918.

Remembrance Day Speech

As we are gathered here today, I do not doubt that all of us have some connection to war. I myself had two grandfathers that fought at El Alamein, in Egypt, 70 years ago. Both of them were fortunate enough to return home from war; however I never had the chance to meet either of them. The only glimpses I have of their lives during the war are their humble medals, which are kept away safely, but are seldom talked about. I know that one of my grandfathers lied about his age so that he was able to enlist. And it is with great pride that I wear badges of recognition on their behalf today. When I asked my family of their personal experiences of the war it was almost impossible to uncover anything. Their voices had been silent, their stories never told, their memories, too awful to bring into the sanctity of their homes.

And on this day of peace we must acknowledge the courage of the 70 million servicemen and women who engaged in that terrible conflict 94 years ago, many of which made the ultimate sacrifice to protect our nation. We must thank those who fought for our freedom, and those who died for it, in this war and in wars since.

On the 11th of November, at 11 o'clock, 94 years ago the guns finally ceased. The war was over, and peace began. Last year, a man named Claude Choules passed away like any other in a nursing home at the admirable age of 110. The parting of Mr.

Choules was no ordinary loss. It marked the end of an era as our last fragile thread that linked us to the First World War was severed. On this day, 94 years ago Mr. Choules witnessed the Armistice and the silence. Our sole survivor and hero, has joined his brothers in arms, as the last among them.

It is a tragic irony that the purpose of war is to bring peace, that unattainable object that bargains lives. And when the "War to End All Wars" was fought with such vigour and good intent, it is almost unbearable to consider the outcome; the endless rows of pale gravestones with only a name and date to differentiate one another amidst the silence. And yet people to this day are summoned to war in pursuit of peace and to defeat the obstinate forces behind tyranny and injustice. For Australia, war is a responsibility as well as an obligation, and a cruel one at that.

We remember and respect our veterans for their bravery and their strength. However we shall never know of the full horrors that they endured for our welfare. And it is difficult for us to comprehend the enormity of war and the devastating effect it has had on families all over the world. We can only contemplate something that words fail to explain. And in our silence we will remember them, Lest We Forget.

End of Year Arrangements for Year 10

With the end of the year fast approaching you may be wondering about what activities are taking place for Year 10. As you would know the Record of School Achievement (RoSA) is the new credential introduced by the Board of Studies for students who leave school after Year 10 and before they receive their Higher School Certificate (HSC). It gives students **A cumulative record of all academic achievement** and is designed to record and credential all of a secondary school student's academic results up until the HSC.

- While all students currently receive grades for courses they complete at the end of Year 10, this system will be extended to also capture grades for courses a student completes in Year 11.
- If a student leaves school before receiving a grade in Year 11 or 12 courses, their RoSA will record the courses they commenced.
- This measure acknowledges the fact that many students begin senior secondary study but then leave school for employment or other training opportunities before receiving their HSC.

Students Online now open for Year 10 students

Year 10 students can now activate their [Students Online](#) account. Once logged in, students can currently view their enrolment details. From Wednesday, 12th December, students will also be able to view their grades in their Stage 5 courses and download their eRecord of results.

To activate their account, students enter their school, name, and date of birth on the account activation page. The Board of Studies will then send the student an email containing a link that allows them to log in with their student number and choose their PIN.

All Year 10 students will receive an email from the Board of Studies inviting them to activate their account. Please encourage your child to do this, so that they will be able to log in to view and download their results in December.

From 10th December, schools will be able to view students' results in Schools Online.

Bushfire Awareness – How Can I Help?

Now with summer upon us it is a time to remind ourselves of the dangers of bush fires, and the steps we must all take to stay safe during those times. Killara High School is one of many DEC schools listed in a bush fire prone area. At Killara High School, we have a comprehensive Emergency Management Plan which details our response to emergency situations, such as a bushfire.

Staff and students are aware of these emergency plans, and we have regular practice evacuation and lockdown drills, so as to ensure staff and student familiarity and compliance with our procedures. These evacuation instructions are displayed in all of our classrooms.

There are some things you can do to help in the advent of a bushfire emergency situation. These are:

1. Consider that the school needs the phone line kept open for communication with emergency services

2. Consider keeping the roads clear for emergency services to attend to nearby fire
3. Stay calm and wait for advice from the school
4. Try to minimise use of mobile phone services so that peak demand on networks does not impede emergency services use of these networks.
5. Access 'Fires Near Me' App on smart phones and the RFS (Rural Fire Service) site.
6. Please ensure that all contact details for your family that are held by the school are accurate and up to date. This also includes emergency contact details. If you have moved house or your family circumstances have changed since the enrolment of your child(ren), you may need to have school records amended.
