Learning, Literacy and Reading for Pleasure

One of the school's development priorities for 2012-14 is quality teaching and learning with a focus on literacy. Ms Liz Diprose, Deputy Principal, is currently conducting a series of workshops for groups of staff across all Key Learning Areas. She will also be working with Dr Jen Scott Curwood from the University of Sydney. Both Liz and Dr Curwood will be working in classrooms with teachers and students with a view to embedding fresh teaching and learning practices and assessment strategies.

One of the ways we thought might extend student, staff and families' awareness of and interest in matters of literacy beyond the classroom and formal curriculum is to include an occasional article on what individual members of staff are reading for pleasure and interest. Ms Josie Tomlinson, one of our English teachers has volunteered to compile this 'occasional series' of articles and I've offered to start this ball rolling so to speak. Here's my plug for reading that I can't resist including. More than twenty five years ago a little paperback called *The Read-Aloud Handbook* by Jim Trelease, was my inspiration to share my world of reading with my own children and those I taught. Having a home (and a classroom) filled with reading matter (including ebooks) is a very significant advantage to children in their years at school. Adults modelling reading or actively listening to children's reading are powerful signals for children and young people. You can't start too early, but enough from the 'didactic principal'.

Here's what I've been reading in my spare time recently and I think they are terrific reads. I'm no scientist but I'm fascinated by a great 'detective work' in non-fiction and discoveries in science are just that! If you're a bit curious about the intersection of physics, history and a race against time, try *The Making of the Atomic Bomb* by Richard Rhodes. Another small book on dramatic and world changing scientific discovery is *The Double Helix: A Personal Account of the Discovery of the Structure of DNA* by James Watson. I've no doubt your science teachers will have their favourite books too. I recently overheard a science teacher sitting on a bus respond to a non-scientist's query, "Anything interesting in that magazine?" referring to the Scientific American journal. He replied, "I read all the articles. I find them all fascinating".

A stack of biographies and histories stands at my bedside with *Stalingrad*, *Truman*, *Long Walk to Freedom*, *John Adams*, *Pozieres* and *Helmet for My Pillow* among them. *A Time of Gifts* and *Between the Woods and the Water* by Patrick Lee Fermor, the account of an 18 year old's walk across Europe in the 1930s, are two of the most beautifully written books I've read. As for fiction my imagining of this nation's conflicted beginnings has been set alight by Kate Grenville's *The Secret River*, and my family always buys me the latest Michael Connelly detective thriller for my birthday. My favourite? It's hard to go past *To Kill a Mockingbird*, with *So Much to Tell You* by John Marsden, a close second.

Empowering Local Schools/ Local Schools Local Decisions

Over the last week or so there have been many media reports about greater autonomy in the management of schools being extended to principals. There are two inter-related initiatives involved. The first is the Commonwealth Government's Empowering Local Schools (ELS) program. The second is the State Government's report on the consultation process related to a discussion paper released in August 2011 entitled Local Schools Local Decisions (LSLD).

Killara HS, following consultation with the P&C Executive and staff, submitted an Expression of Interest for inclusion in a state-wide 230 school trial of the ELS program. This EOI was submitted as part of a partnership proposal between the five secondary schools in this network: Killara HS, Chatswood HS, Ku ring gai Creative Arts HS, St Ives HS and Turramurra HS.

The five principals have been meeting over the past 12 months to discuss ways we might collaborate and therefore extend curriculum opportunities and share expertise across the five schools. We share common challenges in one of the most competitive education markets in the nation. The submission of EOIs by each school is based on our shared belief that the quality of services we can provide to our local communities and the profile of public secondary education services on the North Shore are more likely to be enhanced if we collaborate rather than compete with each other. An extract from Killara HS's EOI appears below.

Rationale

This EOI is submitted in collaboration secondary schools in the Northern Sydney Region Shore Network (NSSSP) comprising Chatswood, Killara, Ku-ring-gai, St Ives, and Turramurra High Schools. While individual schools in NSSSP could operate very successfully with greater autonomy, there are potentially larger benefits to public education if these schools operate in concert and in a mutually supportive way. Not least is the provision of coordinated, high quality educational services for more students, the arrest of the 'enrolment pool' diminution and its expansion, and more effective application of teaching expertise and experience across schools.

Our 20 plus respective local primary schools will also be beneficiaries of a strong local secondary sector through improved retention from Stage 3 into and through Stage 4.

There are very significant opportunities for cooperative endeavours in the provision of services, curriculum patterns that meet more students' needs, particularly in low candidature courses, and in the development and promulgation of a unified public secondary education service within the proposed NSSSP.

Each school in this network shares a common challenge – restoring the faith of our respective 'heartland' communities in each local public high school which can translate to sustained <u>local</u> public education enrolments into Stages 3 and 4.

The Empowering Local Schools initiative provides an opportunity to 'think differently' about how we provide high quality secondary education services in the North Shore Network. Each school 'going its own way', as implied in a conventional EOI, may only serve to replicate the status quo where a diminishing enrolment pool is distributed unevenly across the local schools and which is de facto subsidised through enrolments from outside the network. The last 40 years has seen a culture of isolation and sometimes competition affecting local secondary schools. In 2012 the five principals are 'on the same page'. We see strength through collaboration, sharing of expertise and economies of scale benefits for some facets of operations, not least in curriculum management and the development of administration systems and high quality services to students and families.

Submission of the EOI was required by Friday 9th March 2012. The schools had fewer than ten days to prepare EOIs and conduct mandatory consultations with staff and the communities of each school, and secure their (conditional) agreement prior to submission. Below is the relevant section from the EOI that deals with consultation.

STAFF & COMMUNITY COMMITMENT

(Limit 200 words)

The P&C Executive is strong in its support of this initiative for Killara HS. This EOI has been provided to and discussed by the Executive team at Killara HS and provided to and discussed with staff at a meeting on Wednesday 7th March 2012.

Many staff are cautiously supportive of the EOI as presented above. Most if not all staff have reservations that arise from the absence of detail with respect to the Empowering Local Schools initiative. Nevertheless staff are willing to submit the EOI with the view to finding out more about the initiative.

Mindful of the above and the goodwill expressed by staff in their willingness to learn more about the possible opportunities that will advantage the students, the school and their own working conditions, the Principal submits this EOI in conjunction with the four partner secondary schools in the North Shore Network.

We will await the outcome of the EOI.

The LSLD report on consultation released last weekend presents a number of timelines for the implementation of changes to the way schools are managed. For example, it is proposed that between now and 2015 local schools' management of the total state education budget will move from its current level of less than 10% to more than 70%. There are very significant implications for the management of resources, staffing, procurement, accountability and decision making at the school level.

Clearly, the proposed shift to local school decision making and management of resources will generate a range of views. Some aspects of the proposed change will be contested. Be assured our focus is upon maximising benefits to our students as well as the promulgation of quality public education services available to all children and young people, regardless of postcode.

Please note -

- The venue for all interviews will be the Kerrabee Centre hall. Signs around the walls of the hall will indicate course/ faculty locations and signs on tables will indicate locations of individual teachers.

Record of School Achievement (RoSA) to replace School Certificate

Legislation is to be introduced to create the Record of School Achievement (RoSA), a credential for students leaving school prior to receiving their HSC. Fully implemented, the RoSA will:

- Be a record of the full range of student achievements right up to the day they do their HSC or leave school
- Provide an electronic record of achievements that students can use at any time
- Use assessment by teachers in schools, moderated by the Board of Studies NSW to ensure reliability and fairness of grades
- Provide the capacity to record vocational courses and students' vocational experiences as well as citizenship and leadership achievements such as First Aid courses, community languages courses and Duke of Edinburgh awards
- Offer on-line literacy and numeracy tests, with particular emphasis on work readiness that students will be able to undertake twice a year from next year.

In a media release dated 16th February 2012, the NSW Minister for Education, the Hon. Adrian Piccoli MP, announced, "The RoSA will be available electronically and as a verifiable hard copy on demand with the most up-to date information on a student's achievements, across all subjects and a range of extra-curricular activities.

"The Board of Studies NSW has consulted widely with the teaching and broader community to ensure the RoSA balances the need to encourage students to stay at school for their HSC, while still offering a meaningful credential to those who choose to leave earlier."

Mr Piccoli said the formal RoSA credential would be awarded to eligible students who choose to leave school prior to receiving their HSC, while still allowing students to view and download a transcript of their achievements when applying for jobs or further education or training.

Connecting to Country (and rain!) in Aboriginal Studies



It rained. The wind tears across the exposed plateaus of West Head on the best days, but when it carries driving rain it really stings!

On Friday of week 6, our intrepid Preliminary HSC Aboriginal Studies students braved this awful weather and headed off to West Head and the Basin to explore some important Aboriginal sites in Kuring-gai Chase National Park. Connecting to Country through real people and experiences is crucial in this course, so the rain wasn't going to stop us!

We examined the carvings with the assistance of Dave Lardner, Aboriginal Programs DEC Hornsby, and David Smith, Principal Gibberagong EEC. Students examined the connection between carvings here and those throughout Guringai country and asked many questions, including how they were created and the meaning of carvings. David Smith was careful to point that much of the cultural

meaning of these carvings has been lost and that he did not want to guess, or "interpret" carvings. Rather, students were encouraged to look through the forms and engravings and consider how they relate to Dreaming Tracks, Song Lines, Law and Ancestors.



Red Hand Cave was the next stop, where some traditional bush tucker "Sarsaparilla vine" was sampled (to mixed reception). The students kept smiling throughout the day and earned themselves a stop-off at Terry Hills on the way back to school for a hot chocolate!

The 2012 Premier's Reading Challenge Is On!

Registration for schools and students wishing to participate in the 2012 Challenge opened on 5th March via the Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC) website: www.premiersreadingchallenge.nsw.edu.au.

- **Students** log on using their DEC username and password. On their first logon for 2012, students record their previous school, if applicable.
- **A school** is automatically registered when a student starts an online reading record.
- Students are encouraged to complete their own online records at school, at home and the local library. Parents can assist students to enter books read.

The 2012 Challenge will see the addition of an online fundraising program to be known as **Book Bonus**. Book Bonus will provide an opportunity for students to raise sponsorship funds based on the number of books they read as part of the Challenge. Fifty per cent of funds raised will be returned to the student's school in the form of Dymocks' vouchers.

The remaining funds will be used to support initiatives such as *Book Bank*, a program established by Dymock's Children's Charities, to provide books to schools in disadvantaged communities.

They are confined in a detention centre for asylum seeks, and forced to prove their refugee status. As days drag into weeks and months, Gulnessa is determined to stay strong. She must keep her family together, and fight for her friend Abdul – with whom she has secretly fallen in love. She cannot give up hope for a second chance at life, and the opportunity to build a future in a new land.

Heller, Joseph. Catch-22.

Set in the closing months of World War II in an American bomber squadron off the coast of Italy, this is the story of a bombardier named Yossarian who is frantic and furious because thousands of people he has never even met keep trying to kill him. (Joseph Heller's hilarious and tragic satire on military madness was adapted into a film in 1970.)

Park, Linda Sue. A Single Shard.

Tree-ear has a dream. He has watched the master potter Min take a lump of clay and shape it into a thing of beauty. For Tree-ear the transformation is a miracle. Someday he wants to perform such a miracle himself. But you cannot just walk up to a master potter and ask him to teach you his craft, especially if you're an orphan like Tree-ear. First he must prove he is worthy of Min's time and teachings. So he asks the honourable master is he can work for him, without pay, for the privilege of being near such talent. If Tree-ear takes it one hill, one valley, one day at a time, maybe he'll be able to make his dream come true. Winner of the Newbery Medal.

Monk, Scott. The Crush.

Matthew Cassidy is an up-an-coming league star. The talent scouts are circling him, his school team has reached the finals for the first time ever, as he's determined to play professional one day. Not bad for a down-to-earth guy who lives with his mum above a fish and chip shop on the poor side of town! But despite being team captain, a natural at the game and popular with his mates, Matt really wants one thing in life – a dad. All his friends have one, so why can't he? Meanwhile, Matt is facing another dilemma – a crush. Blue-eyed Kelly Sinclair has caught his heart and won't let go. Drop-dead gorgeous, but, shy, she's everything he has dreamed about. But she already has a boyfriend – a guy who hates Matt's guts and will do anything to destroy his career!

Rai, Dipika. Someone Else's Garden.

Mamta, born low-caste and female in rural India against a backdrop of poverty and prejudice, is destined to be some man's property. Her father says that bringing her up is only 'tending someone else's garden' until a husband is found for her. Eventually saved from becoming one of the nameless and faceless millions of rejected humanity, Mamta survives but at a terrible cost. Lyrically told, this powerful story of a woman's struggle to find acceptance compels us to question: is life random? Or do we have a destiny?

Turow, Scott. The Dive from Clausen's Pier Carries Bell was born and raised in Wisconsin. She's had the same best friend, the same good relationship with her mother, the same boyfriend for as long as anyone can remember. She is already quietly bored with Mike when there is a tragic accident at Clausen's Reservoir. Everyone thinks they know what Carrie will – and ought to do. But Carrie is caught in a maze of moral dilemma and is forced to question everything she thought she knew about herself. It is a moment of terrifying confusion, but also of mesmerising possibility.
