# **Keeping Abreast of the Public Debate on the Future of Education and Schooling**

With the release of My School data and the Report on School Funding prepared by Mr Gonski there has been considerable public debate about education and how to achieve quality schooling opportunities for more young people in the decades ahead of us.

While far from perfect Killara High School is doing well relative to most other schools in this state and the nation. The children enrolled at Killara are thus advantaged. The opportunities before young people at Killara are not easily matched, and to their credit our students take advantage of these opportunities, generously supported by parents and families with the means to do so.

While we may appreciate the quality of our students' work that is brought forth by many dedicated and hard-working staff and the application of the students themselves, the school is not complacent. This year we are dedicating significant resources to the development of literacy skills across all Key Learning Areas with the English faculty taking the lead in this. The P&C has allocated more than \$40 000 this year to assist the school in this strategic goal. Ms Diprose will be reporting on initiatives to date at the next P&C meeting and articles will appear in this newsletter as well.

Additionally the school has allocated resources to address the needs of a group of Stage 6 students who are not seeking an ATAR at the end of Year 12 but who wish to remain at school to gain a Higher School Certificate. Work Studies has been added to the curriculum pattern for these students and Mr Travis Williams has been engaged for several hours per week to provide mentoring and after hours tutorial support to a number of students in Years 11 and 12. Success and a sense of achievement at school are critical to maximizing students' post school options. There are many more paths to that sense of success, engagement and achievement than an ATAR and offer of prestigious course places at university. Ms Colleen Clarke, Ms Fiona Massey and Ms Rosemary Brown have been instrumental in ensuring that <u>all</u> students have opportunities to experience success at this school.

Daily as we splash along rain soaked paths to demountable classrooms populating our Jubilee oval, or jostle for parking somewhere near the school or struggle to get a seat on a bus, we encounter frustrating aspects of life at Killara. But let's remember that they are relatively 'good' problems that challenge us. A letter to the editor in the Sydney Morning Herald on Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> February reminds readers that there are whole communities that would probably willingly trade places. The correspondent reflecting on the My School data released to the public this week, wrote:

As I expected, my old primary school, Dubbo West Public, achieved results that placed it in the lowest 0.5 per cent. Along with the Brewarrinas, the Bourkes, the Daretons, the Coonambles, the Walgetts, Warrens and Wilcannias, Dubbo West Primary has trundled along at the bottom of the pile for at least the past 60 years, when I enrolled there. Sixty years is a long time to hold your breath thinking something might change for the better.

The common link between all these locations is large Aboriginal populations and entrenched disadvantage.

If 60 years of school education has not alleviated the problems confronted by these Australians then it is high time that some new educational approaches were tried - in earnest. Or are they going to continue to be fobbed off with bureaucratic activities like the Gonski Review that deals only with school-based funding inequality? If we fail to adopt some other approaches to education in these communities, my old primary school will be at the bottom of the pile for another 60 years.

The letter's heading "Schools' real need is for fresh thinking" summed it up. Quite aside from the perennial private vs public school funding debate, we should avoid replicating the status quo wherein students attending schools like Killara HS (and our private school neighbours) continue to benefit, while young people growing up in less advantaged areas of the state miss out on the same opportunities. For example, if you are a young person in Menindee or Brewarrina, the uninterrupted access to experienced HSC teachers and the 'corporate knowledge' in staffrooms and classrooms that we tend to take for granted at Killara, just doesn't exist. As Dr Lyndsay Connors observed recently, children and young people usually get 'one shot' at school education. If the opportunities aren't equal then we must all accept responsibility for some 'fresh thinking'.

## Vale Mervyn Riddle OAM 1922-2012 former Principal Beaumont Rd PS

Mr Mervyn Desmond Riddle OAM passed away on the 30<sup>th</sup> January 2012. Mr Riddle was a regular guest of Killara High School and will be remembered by many students and staff of Killara as the Roseville RSL Sub-Branch representative at our ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day ceremonies each year. Mr Riddle joined the 21<sup>st</sup> Australian Field Company when he turned 21. He trained on the Atherton Tableland in 1944 and in 1945 took part in the 7<sup>th</sup> Division landings against the Japanese at Balikpapan, Borneo. He was demobilised in August 1946 and returned to his teaching career that had been interrupted by his war service.

More than a few parents and grandparents of current students will also remember Mr Riddle as the Principal of Beaumont Road Public School in the early 1970s. When health permitted Mr Riddle attended the annual awards ceremonies at

Beaumont Road PS as a special guest presenting an award for sporting achievement.

Mr Riddle served the community throughout his career as teacher and principal in public schools, his work as secretary of the Roseville RSL Sub-Branch for many decades and his service to the Roseville Lodge. Mr Riddle was a long serving member of the Legacy Club of Chatswood and acted as a Legatee for many war widows and their dependents. He is remembered fondly by many as a kind, generous gentleman with as much spring in his step as he could muster and a ready smile. Mr Riddle took great joy in his associations with local schools and the young people who welcomed him each year.

## **Duke of Edinburgh's Award Practice Expedition**

## Getting to and from Killara High School by Bus

Getting to and from school can be a concern for many parents and carers, particularly those with children in Year 7 and others new to the school. Many of the children eligible for a free Travel Pass have already received their passes, however some students are still waiting for their passes and these will be issued promptly upon receipt from the relevant bus company. Students who have applied for a term Travel Pass should receive their passes by mail at their home addresses. A condition of travel on Shorelink Buses is that students comply with the Code of Conduct (see pages 13 and 14).

Unfortunately some bus services are crowded. Students need to catch the correct bus rather than an alternate bus service. . Students should be ready to board buses with their passes visible. Year 7 passengers are to board the bus first. Students wishing to pay for bus travel will need to wait until all students with passes board the bus. It may be the

case that there is insufficient room on the bus for paying students. For this reason students should consider using the regular 556 bus service between East Killara and Lindfield Station (please see next pages for bus services).

#### Year 12 Students

Students with classes scheduled to start at 7:30am are advised to catch the 556 Shorelink bus from Lindfield Station which leaves at 6:48am.

There are teachers on duty to assist students leaving school in the afternoon. Student should seek assistance from these teachers if they are unable to board a bus or miss a bus. If for any reason a student cannot board a bus or has missed a bus, he or she should report to Reception where other arrangements will be made for their safe travel home. The safety and wellbeing of our students is a priority.

## **Code of Conduct on Shorelink Buses**

- Behave safely at all times.
- Respect the needs and comfort of other passengers.
- Behave appropriately at all times
- · Protect bus property and report any vandalism.
- Follow the driver's instructions regarding safety on the bus
- No smoking on the bus at ANY time.
- No eating or drinking on the bus (except with permission from the driver).
- Keep arms, legs and other body parts inside the bus.
- Only attract the driver's attention in the case of an emergency.

## **The Vaccination Schedule for 2012**

Vaccinations will be conducted for Years 7 and 10 in 2012. Students will be issued with permission forms one week prior to vaccination and will be asked to return them prior to the date for administration and organisation. No vaccination is permitted without a permission form signed by parents/carers.

A card will be returned to students to be kept with personal records. The school does not maintain a register of student vaccinations.

The dates for vaccination are determined by Northern Region Area Health and the school does not have any flexibility in the delivery of vaccinations.

Some vaccinations have multiple doses, and must be timed appropriately so if the sequence is not maintained then it may be necessary to go to a GP for the course to be concluded.
