Higher School Certificate and Stage 5 Course Information Meetings for Parents of Years 8 and 10 Students

The time for Year 8 and Year 10 course selections for 2013 is upon us.

Information sessions for parents of students in Year 8 and 10 will be held on:

Tuesday 5th June 2012 in the Kerrabee Theatre Year 8 at 6pm and Year 10 at 6.45pm

In order to provide students and parents with comprehensive information to assist in making decisions about programs of study for Year 9 and Year 11 2013, special booklets are being prepared and will be distributed to students in Week 6, prior to the information evening.

These booklets contain a wealth of general information about Higher School Certificate and Stage 5 course requirements as well as a range of programs of study and details about all subjects on offer to students. Killara High School is able to offer students a very broad range of courses for both the Higher School Certificate and Stage 5.

The meetings on Tuesday 5th June will provide parents and students with further details about NSW Board of Studies requirements for the awards of the

Record of School Achievement and Higher School Certificate in 2014. All faculties will have representatives available at the evening meeting to provide additional information about courses and answers to questions you might have.

Students are asked to choose their courses carefully in consultation with parents and teachers. Year 8 students choose three electives to study in Year 9 and Year 10 students choose 10 units (most subjects are equal to 2 units) in addition to the compulsory 2 units of English. Students are always advised to make their choices based on their interests and talents.

For Year 10, all students will be interviewed by their Year Advisers and the Careers Adviser prior to finalising their course selections for their senior program of study. Killara High School provides a rigorous consultation process to ensure all students make choices that will best suit their individual needs.

While most of the school enjoyed a day off on the school development day at the beginning of this term, the Prefects were already back at school and commencing an intense two day public speaking course. The Program we participated in was run by 'Toastmasters', an internationally recognised non-profit organisation that specialises in leadership and speaking training.

Over two days our tutors had us presenting numerous impromptu speeches, and one prepared speech which we had to write overnight. While at first we were all shocked at having to stand up and speak for a minute on a topic as obscure as "The day I got lost in a supermarket", we got the hang of it very quickly.

With our tutor advising us not to let truth get in the way of a good speech, we were soon listening to a recount of the time someone single handedly fought off hundreds of alligators, or about the time someone

else got stuck in their supermarket's freezer overnight. But don't worry too much! Apparently, spending a night with as much ice-cream as one can eat isn't *entirely* bad!

One of the things we found most interesting was that in receiving a message from someone speaking only 7% of the information we receive comes from the actual words being said. Another 23% comes from voice. It's body language, however, that we rely on most to communicate, with hand gestures and physicality delivering 70% of the message. This did however give us a bit of reassurance when it came to writing our prepared speeches. Having one night for a five minute speech was a bit daunting, but with only 7% of our message coming from what we were going to say anyway, it took a bit of pressure off!

As it turned out we really didn't need to be worried, as we all managed to come up with some pretty interesting speeches! Especially memorable ones for

me included Alice Webb's discussion of Pokémon, and how the concept of "Ketchum all" applies to real life, and Jeremy McNamara's recount of his overseas adventures.

Over the two days we all learnt a lot about public speaking and how to address an audience, but I think the best aspect of the two days was learning more about each other. There's nothing quite like giving someone five minutes to talk about absolutely

anything, to find out some interesting stories, fun facts and absolutely hilarious anecdotes you've never heard before!

All in all it was a very worthwhile experience and we encourage all leadership groups to take up the opportunity to complete future Toastmasters' courses.
