In Memoriam: Lance Corporal George Hurley and Lance Corporal William Hurley

ANZAC Day 2012 marks 97 years since the landings at Gallipoli on 25th April 1915. For decades following the Great War 1914-1918 the Sydney Morning Herald *In Memoriam* column carried notices remembering the loss of fathers, husbands, sons, and brothers. The Australian War Memorial Roll of Honour records 61 520 deaths resulting from service in the AIF during the Great War. The impact on families was lasting as was the scarring of Australian society. Bill Gamage wrote a seminal work on the influence of the Great War on Australia. It is aptly entitled *The Broken Years*.



Extract from page 11, *Sydney Morning Herald* 29th August 1931. Thirteen years after the end of the Great War the paper still dedicated a section of the *In Memoriam* column to those who had been killed 'On Active Service'. This paper was found during

renovations of a house in Bent Street, Lindfield, in 1950. The new owner of the house had served in the 9th Field Ambulance with Fred Woodham. The paper has been preserved for the last 62 years for this reason.

Nearly 100 years later we don't have to look too far to find evidence of Great War loss in the history of this school. On the Memorial Boards in the Kerrabee Centre that list the former students of St Leonards Superior School (Greenwoods), one of Killara's foundation schools, are two names: George Hurley and William Henry Hurley. George, resident of Nisbett Street, North Sydney, enlisted in August 1915 at the age of 22 and was wounded in the head at Pozieres on the Western Front on 27th July 1916. He was evacuated to England where he convalesced through September and October. His mother Anne Hurley, a widow living in North Sydney, received a notice from the Army in August indicating George had been wounded but the wounds were not considered life threatening. There was no further correspondence about his condition until after his death on 16th October 1916. A week later George's younger brother William enlisted in the AIF. He was aged 21 years and seven months. He survived the horrific Battle of Passchendaele with the 18th Battalion through September and October 1917 and then, during one of the last battles in which the Australians were involved on the Western Front, William was severely wounded by a shell blast on 31st August 1918. William's right leg was amputated in effort to save his life but he died at 8.45am the following morning in the care of Australian Medical Corp staff.

ANZAC Day commemorations raise our awareness of the cost in human life that the Great War and other conflicts brought (and continue to bring) to Australian families and our society. The distance of time shields us from the grief that we can barely imagine Mrs Hurley endured for the rest of her life. Of her three sons, two perished on the Western Front. A widow for twenty years when William died, she was of humble means (like most others of her generation) and was never able to visit her sons' graves on the other side of the world. One is buried in Norwich, England the other in the Suzanne Communal Cemetery in the Somme Valley, Northern France. We remember these men and former students with whom we are linked through educational heritage, and we reflect on the lingering grief and sadness that burdened this mother and thousands of others who shared such lifelong emotional burdens. **Mark Carter, Principal**

It wasn't all fun and games, practicing at a local high school and another last-minute (and rather quiet) rehearsal in the dining hall of the hotel we stayed in. Congratulations to all band members for the fantastic results!

Kirk, Connie Ann. Sylvia Plath: A Biography

The research for this biography of this poet's life utilizes the latest updated scholarship, including new information released in the unabridged journals published in 2000 and the newly accessible Ted Hughes archives. Kirk also provides new insights and perspectives from original interview material with a Plath contemporary who knew her personally. There is also an extensive bibliography of biographical and critical sources provided.

Mawdsley, Evan. World War II: A New History

This is a magisterial new global history of World War II. Beginning in 1937 with the outbreak of the Sino-Japanese War, Evan Mawdsley shows how the origins of World War II lay in a conflict between the old international order and the new, and then traces the globalisation of the conflict as it swept through Asia, Europe and the Middle East. His primary focus is on the war's military and strategic history, though he also examines the political, economic, ideological and cultural factors which influenced the course of events. The war's consequences are examined too, in terms not only of the defeat of the Axis but also of the break-up of colonial empires and the beginning of the Cold War. Includes short stories of the key figures events and battles that shaped the war.
