Regular School Attendance and Requests for Long Term Leave

Regular school attendance is critical to the development and education of children. There is a significant impact on the student, the school and the community when a student does not attend school regularly. In addition attendance at school is compulsory for all students between the ages of 6 and 17 years.

All students who are enrolled at school, regardless of their age, are expected to attend at all times when instruction is provided. The greatest educational opportunities are maximised through regular student attendance.

Students with regular attendance:

- 1. Obtain the **continuity in their education** that is desirable and necessary for them to succeed and achieve.
- 2. Develop **vital concepts** and form **building blocks** in their education for future learning and are more confident and have the ability to achieve in their school work.
- 3. Acquire **more skills** and have **greater quality of choice** for educational/vocational options and to make decisions in later life situations.
- 4. Develop **social networks** and are more likely to interact appropriately with their peers.
- 5. Learn in a **safe**, **healthy and protective** environment that provides a positive school experience.

PISA 2012

Programme for International Student Assessment

PISA is coming to our school!

Our school has been chosen to represent Australia for the OECD Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) which is taking place between **30th July and 7th September 2012**. A random sample of 15-year-old students will be part of a once in a lifetime opportunity to represent Australia in education!

PISA is an international assessment, occurring every three years, which measures skills in mathematics, science, reading, problem solving and financial literacy at a point when students have almost finished their compulsory schooling. PISA helps to inform policy makers involved with education on how well schools are succeeding in helping students to acquire the skills and knowledge they will need to meet challenges beyond school.

Since the first PISA assessment in 2000, the survey has continued to raise interest amongst educators and policy-makers world-wide. In 2012, Australia will be one of almost 70 countries participating in PISA. More than 800 schools and over 15 000 students will represent our country in this important project.

PISA is part of the National Assessment Program in Australia. Participation in these sample assessments is an obligation for government schools under the National Education Agreement between the Commonwealth and the States and Territories, and an obligation for non-government schools under Commonwealth schools funding legislation and funding agreements for 2009-2012.

What will PISA mean for our school?

Twenty-five students who are randomly selected from our school will be sampled to complete a twohour paper-based assessment consisting of mathematics, science, financial literacy and reading questions. These students will also be asked to complete a questionnaire.

After the paper-based assessment and questionnaire, a sub-sample of 20 students who participated in the paper-based assessment will also participate in a computer-based assessment of problem solving, mathematical literacy and reading literacy.

KILLARA HIGH VISION GENERATION GROUP

During the holidays, on July 4th, Claire Birks (Year 12) and I met with our local Member of Parliament Paul Fletcher as the members of the Killara High Vision Generation Group. Vision Generation is World Vision's youth movement, aimed at young people who want to get involved in global issues such as poverty and modern day slavery. We met with Mr Fletcher to discuss our concerns about how much the government gives in international aid and outlined important statistics to back up our message.

Some of these statistics include:

- <u>8.1 million children</u> died in the last year due to preventable diseases
 That is, 1 child dies every 4 seconds
- <u>350,000 women</u> die annually due to child birth complications, <u>99%</u> of whom were in the developing world.
- It is estimated that <u>27 million people are living in slavery</u> right now.
 - Roughly 50% of this is in the Asian Pacific Region and slavery does exist in Australia
- Despite all of these statistics, Australia plans to give less than 0.35% of our total GNI in the 2012-2013 budget.



We discussed what we as the Killara High Vision Generation Group had already done and what Vision groups around Australia have done in relation to two major campaigns, "Child Health Now" which is about improving child and maternal health around the world and "Don't Trade Live" which is about human trafficking and slavery. We also talked about what the Australia government could do, what everyday Australians could do and specifically what he could do around his office.

Here are some things everyone could do:

- <u>Buy "fairtrade" products.</u> These are products that are certified to have been made from workers who were paid fairly and not exploited. Look for the symbol
 - This could include chocolate, tea, coffee, clothes and even sports equipment.
- Show your support by participating in events and campaigns with the SJC **FAIRTRADE** and the Vision Generation group at Killara High. (For instance, 40 Hour Famine)
 - Take it a step further and join one of these groups. SJC requires to be elected in, but the Vision Generation Group is open to anyone without obligations.
- Tell your respective local Member of Parliament that you care about this issue so they can hopefully pass it on to the rest of parliament. They are obligated to talk to you if you arrange a meeting (which is what we did). This can be done in person or writing a letter
- Donate to an organisation that helps fight these issues. Research before you donate though so you can make sure your money is really making a difference
- <u>Be aware of these issues!!!</u> The first step to solving the problem is to understand the problem. Good things to search up include "Child Health Now resources", "Don't Trade Lives resources" and there are informative videos on youtube.

The experience talking to our MP Mr Fletcher for the first time was very rewarding. We had planned the meeting a lot in advance and it everything went better than expected. We hope to have more meetings in the future to voice our opinion on these issues and urge everyone to do the same.

Hosseini, Khalid. *The Kite Runner graphic novel* This is a beautifully illustrated, four-colour graphic adaptation of the novel The Kite Runner.
