Aboriginal Studies Student Wins Prime Minister's Medal



Winning a competition is great, but it's even better when the competition is for students 2 years above you in school. **Mieke Torma** (Year 9) is studying the accelerated Senior Aboriginal Studies course. 6000 students across Australia entered the NAIDOC week writing competition. Mieke entered the Senior Student category, for Years 11 and 12 and won the Prime Minister's Medal.

Mr Dylan Williams, CEO of NAIDOC Australia (left), presented Mieke with her Medal on Thursday 6th September. This is an edited

extract of Mieke's Medal winning essay titled: Analysing the progress of Indigenous Australia, past present and future.

April 10, 1816 marks the lowest point from which all progress for Indigenous Australians can be measured. It was on this day that Governor Macquarie, the equivalent of the Prime Minister of the day, issued the most brutal orders, as recorded in his Diary:

"The officers commanding the Military Parties have been authorized to fire on them to compel them to surrender; hanging up on Trees the Bodies of such Natives as may be killed on such occasions, in order to strike the greater terror into the Survivors." 10th April 1816.

The past reveals the direction of the future – our future. Aboriginal progress can be seen through an exploration of selected historical episodes which highlight how land is integral to Australia's history and Aboriginal culture. The Proclamation and Diary of Governor Macquarie, 'An Act for the Protection and Management of the Aboriginal Natives of Victoria' highlights an ethnocentric perspective that was enshrined in law and blind to the existence of connection to Country. However, progress is evident in former Prime Minister, Paul Keating's Redfern speech, of 1992. These historical events and individuals have been fundamental to a changing and

progressive perspective, a view which is inclusive rather than alienating.

Such alienation was apparent when Governor Lachlan Macquarie revealed his plans of "clearing the Country," hence dispossessing and cutting a sacred connection with land. Their colonial viewpoint made the dehumanisation of the Aboriginal people easier. It enabled them to



justify their actions and ignore the fact that the Aboriginal people did have culture and connection to land that was dense and thriving. Macquarie's diary is further historical evidence for the belief that Aboriginal people who opposed White settlement were expendable.

It is clear that the earliest non-Aboriginal Australians simply did not understand Aboriginal culture and the significance of land, but they had no desire to understand either because European parochial views created a belief in their own supremacy. Yet despite this, Aboriginal identity and culture has survived and not merely survived but progressed through an unassailable connection to Country and culture, supported by reconciliation policies.

Progress occurred in the development of governmental policies, particularly those which promoted self-determination and empowerment during the 1970s.

Keating's Redfern speech further contributed to reconciliation when it was delivered 10th December, 1992. The speech was a landmark, a watershed and a beacon for progress. As Prime Minister, Keating represented the government and the people of Australia, forging a fresh and positive vision. Keating's goal in delivering the speech was to encourage recognition and show Aboriginal people that there was recognition for White actions. Keating stated that, if we really do want to recognise our actions, there needs to be change. Keating's speech was part of a general shift in the representation of Aboriginal people and contributed to a progressive view of land rights.

Clearly there remains a way to go before non-Aboriginal people fully appreciate Aboriginal culture and the diverse connection Aboriginal Australians have with the land. Nevertheless, it is also clear that positive change has taken place through a range of catalysts that in decades to come will continue to have repercussions, providing hope and inspiration for both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal communities. A future Australia has the potential to be a nation that, instead of positioning White culture as the epicentre, represents a range of cultures equally and respectfully. A future Australia will be a nation which sees Aboriginal people as limitless instead of limited, legitimate instead of primitive

and progressive instead of static. There will be new turning points, new voices and Aboriginal culture will continue to challenge and provoke our notion of an Australian identity.

Absent Alert Messaging to Start Term 4

From Monday 8th October 2012, Killara High School will use a Short Messaging Service (SMS) called SMS Absence Alerts to send parents/ carers notifications of absences for their children on a daily basis.

Home group rolls will be marked as usual and then scanned, generating a list of absences. This will then be used to automatically send an SMS to a parent/carer of each child on the list alerting them to the fact that their child is currently marked absent from school.

A parent will then be asked to respond by SMS to provide a reason for the absence. Each response will be coded to indicate the absence as Sick, Leave, or School Business. The absence will then be recorded as explained through this process and each message attached to the student's electronic attendance file.

If a parent believes his or her child is at school he/ she can telephone the school, at which point staff will endeavour to confirm the student's attendance at school, relay communicate this to the parent and, as necessary, adjust school records, or refer the matter to the relevant Stage Head Teacher for follow up. The use of the SMS Absent Alerts will enable the school to improve communication with parents about their children's attendance, and provide an opportunity for parents to explain the absences with a simple and immediate SMS replies.

Testing on Thursday 20th September at 10:00am

A **test message** will be sent out at 10:00am on Thursday 20th September to one parent/ carer for each student. This will be a TEST ONLY, <u>please DO</u> <u>NOT reply</u>. For the purposes of the testing could you please ensure that your child has attended homegroup on this day or has signed in through the Student Window BEFORE 10:00am. If you do not receive an SMS, please contact the school so that your child's records can be updated.

Concerns regarding your child's attendance should be directed to your child's Stage Head Teacher (HT) - Mrs Phelan HT Stage 4 (Years 7 and 8), Mr Smith Relieving HT Stage 5 (Years 9 and 10) or Mrs Lane Relieving HT Stage 6 (Years 11 and 12).

Armstrong, Judith. *War & Peace and Sonya: A Novel* In 1862, Sonya Tolstoy married the great author the world has ever known. For forty-eight years they shared their lives in a union that was passionate and combative. Sixteen years younger than her husband, Sonya bore him thirteen children and worked tirelessly as his copyist and publisher on countless drafts of his famous novels. Both were mercurial personalities, and towards the end, an exhausted Tolstoy deserted her. In this book, Armstrong tells Sonya's story – exploring the couple's devotion and ambivalence to one another, and their shared involvement in writing – showing us how real life and fiction expose each other's secrets.

Like Hilary Mantel in her Booker Prize winning novel Wolf Hall, Armstrong puts her scholarly imagination to work in a known period and a set of famous figures. At the heart of it is Anna Karenina, Leo Tolstoy's best loved heroine, seen from the anguished vision of Tolstoy's wife Sonya. [Comment by Brenda Niall].

On an icy dawn morning in Paris in January 1943, a group of 230 French women resisters were rounded up from the Gestapo detention camps and sent on a train to Auschwitz - the only train, in the four years of German occupation, to take women of the resistance to a death camp. The youngest was a schoolgirl of 15, the eldest a farmer's wife of 68. Among them teachers, bio- chemists, sales girls, secretaries, housewives and university lecturers. The women turned to one another, finding solace and strength in friendship and shared experience. They supported and cared for one another, worked together and faced the horror together. Friendship, almost as much as luck, dictated survival. Forty-nine of them came home. This new book is the story of these women - the first time it has been told. It is about who they were, how and why they joined the resistance, how they were captured by the French police and the Gestapo, their journey to Auschwitz and their daily life in the death camps - and about it was like for the survivors when they returned to France. It is ultimately a portrait of ordinary people, of bravery and endurance, and of friendship.

Put the spray away so we can all breathe a little easier



Aerosol sprays are popular and commonly used for applying lots of products, from the personal (like body sprays or deodorants) to the domestic (like cleaning sprays). However for some people with asthma their use can trigger symptoms and

may even lead to an attack.

When used, the liquid contained in these sprays is emitted into the air under high pressure, creating a fine mist which can spread quite a long way. The chemicals and strong smells in the mist, when inhaled, are what can trigger asthma symptoms and a possible attack. Because of the amount of time the spray stays in the air and the distance it can travel, even spraying some distance from the person with asthma can still lead to problems. This most often causes issues in areas like change rooms, where people are using spray deodorants etc after exercise, and even in workplaces if there is cleaning being undertaken while there are others working in the area.

We recommend you avoid using aerosol sprays whenever there are other people around - there are usually plenty of good alternatives available. We encourage schools, gyms, sports clubs etc to adopt a no-aerosol policy - keep in mind that around 1 in 10 people has asthma - it's likely in any change room there'll be someone who will be affected.

As a general rule, if you have to use aerosol sprays, make sure you're in a well-ventilated space and away from other people who may have asthma themselves. Always follow manufacturers' instructions around safe use and observe any health warnings.
