Politics of War Study

On Monday 23rd July Year 8 GATS class participated in a video conference with Dr James Curran. Dr Curran is a historian who lectures at Sydney University and is an expert on the politics of war. The video conference commenced at 12:30pm and concluded at 1:30pm.



The main focus point of the conference was to explore the changes in the political outlook during the time leading up to, during and after WW2. Dr. Curran and the class explored the reasons why Australia's relationship with Britain changed and conversely, our ties with the United States were strengthened.



Our class got a sense of the pre-World War II context, particularly debates over isolationism, appeasement and the concerns – voiced by many in Canberra in the mid-1930s – over whether Britain could come to Australia's defence.



We were allowed to ask questions throughout the conference and Frank Wang asked this question: "What do you think will be the nature of Australia's relationship with Great Britain, China and the United States of America in the near future ?" Dr. Curran replied by saying that we are probably going to move closer to the US. No one will ever know for sure what the future holds.

The class prepared for this video conference by completing some research on the home front in Wartime Sydney from 1939-1945. In this study we analysed why war was declared and the strategies used by the government within propaganda posters. **Sam Van Vliet, Year 8 GATS Class**

explicitly and providing students with tools and skills to foster active participation in school life as well as improving mutual understanding and acceptance of differences for Killara High School students. Students learned about the significant differences in educational expectations in Australia and their home countries and were introduced to a great range of extracurricular activities and leadership opportunities at the school. In discussion with their mentors, students explored a variety of topics relevant to school life and learned valuable communication strategies to assist them in their communication with peers and teachers.

After the program students reported that they felt more confident talking to other students who were not in their immediate friendship group and said that they made an increased effort at speaking English.

As one student, who wanted to remain anonymous, said 'The program helped me know how to make friends with other students and how to talk to them'. Many students also felt that they were more likely to talk to their parents about what is going on at school.

As a result of the TEALS Program, students were reported to have enrolled in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme as well as in a variety of school clubs, claiming they probably would not have done so without the information and encouragement the program provided.

Many students said that they would welcome more opportunities to participate in discussions with their mentors to improve their English and to discuss matters of importance to them in a friendly and relaxed environment.

We hope that with time more students will benefit from this program and become active members in the school community as a result.

The Student HSC PIN and UAC PIN – What's the Difference?

All HSC students have now received an HSC PIN to log in to <u>Students Online</u> and also to retrieve their results online or by SMS on 19th December.



The Board of Studies issued all HSC students with their HSC PIN on a handy card (see accompanying image) attached to a letter in April this year.

Students Online (<u>studentsonline.bos.nsw.edu.au</u>) is a website designed specifically for HSC students, with information, tips and tools to assist them in their study throughout the year.

There is also a personal account section called 'My <u>Details</u>', which students log into with their HSC PIN and Student Number. 'My Details' is where they can check their personal HSC status including:

- enrolment and contact details
- personal HSC exam timetable
- assessment ranks (available after the written exams)
- HSC results (December)

Students are also able to submit or update their email address to get HSC information and to help if they lose or forget their HSC PIN. They can also register now to receive their HSC results by SMS on 14th December.

The Universities Admissions Centre (UAC) recently issued all HSC students with a UAC PIN, which they need to use when applying to study in 2013 at UAC participating institutions.
