School Development Days for 2013

Parents and students are very familiar with the scheduling of school development days into the school year. The first day of each of Terms one, two and three are pupil free days which have long been devoted to professional learning usually incorporating presentations by experts in their fields. Many members of the school community have shared in these professional presentations where they are relevant and appropriate. More recently, the last two days of Term four have been added to this calendar of pupil free days devoted to professional learning for teachers.

Many parents would be aware of the implementation of the Australian Curriculum. This national curriculum is being phased into schools commencing in 2014 with Years 7 to 10 English, Mathematics, Science and History and to provide teachers with the time required to commence work on programs, an

additional school development day has been allowed in 2013.

In many schools, this additional day will be what would have been the first day of Term two for students but because our athletics carnival is booked for that day, the arrangements are different for Killara High School.

Our additional school development day for 2013 will be on the Tuesday following the Easter break. Killara High School students are not to attend school on Tuesday 2nd April, 2013. However, all students are expected to attend the school's athletics carnival on Tuesday 30th April, 2013 which will be the first day for students in Term two.

Bus Transport Issues

Unfortunately there appear to be ongoing problems with some of the buses both in the mornings and afternoons. We are aware that the East Lindfield and Gordon buses are at times late and overfull. We understand your concern and the distress this creates for your child.

We have been in constant communication with the Violia Transdev bus company to express our dissatisfaction with the service, and have urged that additional buses be provided. The company has stated that bus numbers are based on the number of students who qualify for a pass, rather than those students who do not qualify for a pass, but buy a ticket, and also board the same buses. The numbers of students who have a pass, and those buying a ticket have increased significantly and the result is the situation we are facing.

In the afternoons staff on duty ensure that those students who have a pass, or are waiting for a pass,

board first of all. They are then followed by fare paying students.

We are also aware that not all students have received their passes yet as there has been a delay in the company's processing of these. Violia Transdev have advised that in this case, students are to tell the driver politely that they have not received their pass yet and request an interim pass from the driver. This will be issued on the spot. This pass will last for 10 school days.

We have requested that Violia Transdev address these deficiencies urgently. Currently the situation is under review.

Advice to students and parents regarding Formals (Year 10) and Socials (Year 11)

A letter distributed by email in February to Years 10 and 11 families is reproduced below.

This letter is to advise parents and students that functions commonly referred to as a Year 10 Formal and Year 11 Social are <u>not</u> school endorsed, supported or managed functions.

The Year 12 Formal at the conclusion of the Higher School Certificate, together with Ekuba held immediately prior to the HSC study vacation, are the social functions marking the conclusion of students' education at this school. No alcohol is served at these school functions.

The school focuses on Year 12 functions because this is the point of transition to post school life for nearly all students. The conclusion of four years of secondary schooling at the end of Year 10 has significantly less significance that it once held.

While 'Year 10 Formals' have been conducted and managed without incident by parents in recent years, unfortunately alcohol has been served at some pre and post Formal functions each year. This has also been the situation for Year 11 Socials.

In 2012 an expensive Year 11 Social was cancelled very early in the evening because of the behaviour of some young guests who were affected by alcohol. The termination of the event was a great disappointment to others who had paid large sums of money to prepare for and attend the function.

The consumption of alcohol by school age students is dangerous. It is irresponsible for adults to supply alcohol or condone its consumption by students under the age of 18. I acknowledge that the large majority of parents understand this and are vigilant in their supervision of pre and post Formal/ Social events. Yet, each year I receive reports of alcohol consumption by Year 10 and Year 11 students in the presence of parents/ adults at functions prior to or following the Formals and Socials. I cannot stress sufficiently that the safety and well-being of many

young people can be put at risk when alcohol is consumed.

No school staff member will be involved in the organization or supervision of Formals or Socials for students in Years 10 and 11. The name 'Killara High School' may not be used in association with any event that students or parents seek to organize for students in Years 10 and 11.

While I appreciate that Year 10 Formals and Year 11 Socials are much anticipated by some students, I ask that parents and students give consideration to matters of safety, supervision and cost when considering whether to organize, support or make non-refundable financial commitments to Formals or Socials for students in Years 10 and 11. The safety and well-being of young people must be paramount in our considerations.

Presentation for Parents

At 7pm on 14th March 2013, Dr Michael Nagel, Associate Professor in the School of Science and Education, will be presenting an extremely interesting and informative one hour session on:

Blame Their Brain: Why Our Children Do What They Do!

Have you ever wondered why your children act and behave the way they do? Have you marvelled at the stages of development you have witnessed and simultaneously felt bewildered by that very journey of growth and maturation? This presentation unlocks some of the mysteries of the development of the mind from birth through adolescence by examining the developing brain and shedding light on why children and teenagers may act the way they do. A look at neurological development also gives parents an avenue for understanding a range of

developmental inevitabilities including the importance of just saying 'no' to a toddler and the understanding of why adolescents seem to have difficulty explaining their actions when doing the 'wrong' thing or indeed why they are, at times, seemingly incapable of responsible decision making. The evening's presentation will look at those ideas with a focus on contemporary research into how your child's brain develops, how boys' and girls' brains may differ and what this might mean for parenting in the 21st century.

The session will be held in the Kerrabee Theatre. We have flown down Dr Nagel from Queensland to work with our teachers in the afternoon and our parents in the evening.

Disability Provisions for HSC 2013 students

The Board of Studies assesses applications from students with disabilities in order to provide eligible students with practical support in Board of Studies assessments and examinations. Applications may be made by students for the Higher School Certificate according to procedures determined by the Board of Studies.

The coordinators of these applications are Mrs Kim Collins, Learning and Support Teacher and Mrs Clair-Louise Schofield, Head Teacher Welfare and Student Services (relieving). Students who wish to apply for disability provisions should see Mrs Collins and Mrs Schofield who together with the School Counsellor will complete the application form with the student.

Parents are encouraged to contact Mrs Collins or Mrs Schofield with any questions regarding the process. Parents will also be provided with the part of the form to be completed by any relevant specialists. It is most important that parents carry out this request in order to support the application with statements from medical professionals.

The due date is the last day of Term 1 for preexisting conditions, except for applications based on chronic fatigue syndrome, post-viral syndrome, Ross River fever or glandular fever, which should be submitted in July of the examination year, with teacher comments and medical documentation also dated July.

No Nuts at Killara High School

A number of students at Killara High School have very high levels of sensitivity to nuts which can cause severe allergic reactions. Sometimes these reactions can be life threatening. In the interests of students' safety, the school has implemented a policy of banning all nuts on the school premises and at school events.

There are several students who are extremely allergic to any trace of nuts on people's hands, on paper, on plates and so on. While these students manage their allergies well, the risks are severe and the danger disproportionate to the convenience of having nuts at the school. The school therefore asks that **all nut products** be removed from students' lunch and recess snacks. In addition, please be

vigilant when baking cakes and cookies for class parties or for fundraising events. Such things as energy or health bars should be checked for nut components and left at home if they contain nuts or nut traces. This ban applies to all staff, students and volunteer workers at the school. The school canteen and classes involving food preparation currently apply this ban on nuts and nut products.

We thank the Killara community for its co-operation in this matter. While there is a degree of inconvenience it is a small price to pay for guaranteeing the health and safety of all of our students.

Have You Received The Schoolkids Bonus?

Do you know about the Schoolkids Bonus? It is a new cash payment to help eligible families and students with the costs of primary and secondary school studies. Around 1.2 million families have already benefitted from the first wave of payments in January 2013 – have you?

If you receive a family or income support payment, including Family Tax Benefit Part A, you could be eligible to receive \$410 a year for each primary student and \$820 a year for each secondary student, with half paid in January and half paid in July.

The Schoolkids Bonus replaces the Education Tax Refund (ETR) and is a much simpler system. You no

longer need to collect receipts and payments are made automatically so you don't have to wait months to make a claim via your tax return. Unlike the ETR you can choose how you use the payment to best support your children's education – whether it be school books, stationery, uniforms, school fees, or excursions.

Check your eligibility by visiting www.australia.gov.au/schoolkidsbonus and if you think you might have missed out on the January payment, contact Centrelink – either in person at a Centrelink-Medicare Office or by calling 132 468.

Kerr, Jordi. 'What teenagers Want'. Junior Bookseller and publisher, Issue 3, 2012.

In this article, Jordi Kerr, learning program officer for the Centre of Youth Literature, takes us behind the scenes during 2013's Centre of Youth Literature's Inky Awards, to look at the shortlisting process. Readers aged between 12 and 20 can vote for their favourite titles until 14th October. Teenagers vote on what they *want* to read, rather than what adults *think* teenagers want to read, or should read.

What do teenagers want? ... "We want books that challenge us. That make us think, and feel, and explore....We don't want things 'dumbed down'"...says 14-year-old Elizabeth, one of the judges from 2012. This and other interesting points are made in this article about teenagers and their reading choices.
