

Davidson Shield Cricket

On a cold and overcast Monday Killara headed to Lofberg Oval at West Pymble to take on Homebush Boys High School, one of the gun sides of the competition in the third round. The Davidson Shield is a 40 over a side competition played between state high schools in Term 1 and 4 of each year.

Captain Jono Bank won the toss and elected to bat on the artificial wicket. The early bowling was nothing special, but accurate enough to knock over James Andreou for 1 and Liam Campbell for 0 within the first 4 overs. Both boys were clearly rusty with minimal cricket being played by either over the past few years. Thongprata Thongyai (Tap) looked solid at number 4 but was unfortunately run out for 1. Sam Odgers (5) put together 17 runs with Jono before smashing one to short mid-wicket. Ehsen Shiek (4) hit a couple of nice drives before being bowled as we were closing in on drinks. Matthew Lee made a solid start to his innings and at drinks (20 overs) Killara was 5/65. Mathew and Jono continued from where they had left off and when Matthew was out at 41 they had amassed a 100 run partnership. Jono had passed 50 by this stage and was finally out in the 38th over for 62. James Timo-Louie (8 not out) and Sean Bhomer (3) scraped together a few valuable runs at the end with Matt Palombo (0 not out) facing just 1 ball. All up 8/168 and something to defend.

Northern Districts Cup T20 Comp

With the council unable to provide Killara High school with a turf wicket in any of the 6 years that I have been organising knockout cricket, it was off to the western edge of Koola Park to play a T20, bowling from one end.

Kieren Young was elected to Captain the side. He made his first good decision when he won the toss and decided to have a bowl. Nick Druce (2 wickets) and James Andreou (2 wickets) opened the bowling and had immediate success with Turramurra 1/1 and 2/9 in the 2nd over. There were a few solid partnerships from Turramurra but from the 11th over there was a steady flow of wickets falling. Kieren Young was on a hat trick at one stage finishing with 3 wickets, while Ehsen Shiek and Sam Odgers chipped in with a wicket each. There were two really important catches from Sean Bhomer and Nick Druce to dismiss key batsman. Matt Palombo, Tap Thongyai and Kieren Young also took catches. Turramurra finished all out in the 20th over for 114. (sorry if I missed anyone - the scorebook is a little sketchy).

Despite playing with only 10 fielders the Killara spirit was alive and well as Ehsen snared one of the openers for 2 runs, caught behind by keeper Matthew. Homebush 1/2 after the first over. A sneaky 2nd wicket partnership of 71 was finally broken when James Timo-Louie claimed another caught behind. When Sam was brought into the attack 2 wickets fell and at 4/133 in the 24th there was still some hope for the team. A few missed changes on run-outs, dropped catches and some costly misfields let Homebush off the hook as they cruised to victory in the 28th over, 5/169.

It was a gutsy effort from a predominantly U15 squad of only 10 players and to compete with a high quality opposition. Clearly had some of the Year 10 and 11 boys who were selected to play turned up on the day as anticipated, it could have been a different story.

High praise must go to Jono who batted patiently for 37 overs and captained with passion and spirit. Similarly Matt Lee was outstanding, scoring 41, keeping for 40 overs with 2 catches and combining for a 100 run stand with Jono.

Nick Druce then combined with Jono for a further 20 runs before fatigue took its toll on Jono. In a tense final 3 overs needing 16 off 18 balls, Nick and Ehsen saw Killara home with 4 balls to spare.

Also playing in the T20 were Matthew Lee who kept very well, letting through just a few byes, and James Timo-Louie who was one of the best in the field. It was a great team effort, which will need to be repeated against Asquith Boys High School in the next round.



Killara Student on Chilean Adventure – An Update

Well the year is flying past with many experiences with a new culture and a great family. I have met many new people, tried lots of new things and visited many beautiful places. It honestly has been the best year of my life!

In September, my family and I went to a ski field in the Andes called Corralco. It's a really small place but the quality of snow



and the lack of people definitely made up for that. I booted up and strapped on my snowboard before leaving on the painfully slow lift as my family faded away into the distance. I had an awesome four hours in perfect snow with no people. The highest lift finally opened in the afternoon and I nearly got to the top of it when a huge gust of wind pushed me off the t-bar track which caused me to stack. The snow up the top was blissful and really perfect shin deep powder. I was high enough to have a beautiful view over the top of the surrounding Andean mountains. I also saw a fox padding through the snow a little distance from me. Altogether it was an awesome day in a beautiful place.

Also, in September,

we celebrated Chile's National Day, known locally as "The Eighteenth" with a 4 day long weekend. It was quite weird as it

didn't start on the 18th, but on the night of the 17th. The night before is when the celebrating happens with all holidays in Chile, and the 18th is no exception. Cata, my host sister, arrived from Osorno and we went to the house of her boyfriend's parents to eat anticuchos and empanadas, and to dance as well. The family of Eduardo is rather pro at the typical Chilean dances, La Quecha. The 18th itself was spent making a small mountain of empanadas that took us 4 days of a 100% empanada diet to finish. In the afternoon, we set out for the local ramadas (it's basically just a massive local party with food and foosball) on La Isla Teja. The atmosphere was great with lots of music. The next day, we were lucky enough to ride on an historic steam train. During the time of Pinochet, all the train lines were privatised and eventually were abandoned, so train travel in Chile is a novelty. The train ride was really beautiful and the train itself unique. It was a really old steam train, and once in a while a cloud of crushed coal would float over the carriages, fly into the windows, and blinding every one including the musicians who were entertaining us. We had three stops in smaller towns until finally arriving at Antilhue where we stopped for lunch as the train turned around.

With the 18th finally over, school restarted with a vengeance. It's not too bad now, I can complete my work and in some of it I get a rather high mark. Best classes are definitely, maths, sport, and language (pretty much English, but in Spanish) plus the bass guitar is going well. Spring has started now, so we've got the lovely super unpredictable super sunny one minute pouring rain the next. Valdivia is the rainiest place in Chile. We had one lovely day where pretty much the majority of the streets were flooded and all the water mains burst, leaving the poor cyclists to peddle through knee high water. I have finally finished all the Harry Potter books in Spanish (SPOILER: Hodor dies) which were an enjoyable read, and I have now

moved on the Lord of the Rings, which I hope to finish before I leave in January. I am still rowing on the river after school almost every day.



In November, my whole year (40 students) went on a class trip to Los Angeles (Chile not California) for 7 days. We had an awesome time and saw lots of places. We stayed in cabins near a beautiful waterfall, Salto del Laja and visited the city of Conception (where the huge earthquake happened in 2010). The whole trip cost \$94 because the Chilean government picks up 60% of the cost. Well, that's it for now. Hope everyone enjoys the formal, and see you next year.




