# **TEALS Program**

(Program to assist with the Transition of Students with English as an Additional Language into Killara High School)



In order to promote the integration of **IEC** students who are entering into an English high school system for the first time, Killara High School is running a semester based peer support program assist with this transition.

Now in its third year, the program has evolved into a student centred

workshop, which provides new students with tools and skills to foster active participation in Australian school life as well as improving mutual understanding and acceptance of differences for Killara High School students. New students learn about the significant differences in educational expectations in Australia and their home countries and are introduced to a great range of extracurricular activities and leadership opportunities at the school.

This term new students were also encouraged to accompany their mentors to clubs and/or leadership committees in the school. During the workshop, students explored a variety of topics relevant to school life and learned valuable



communication

strategies to assist them in their communication with peers and teachers.

This semester the TEALS program was presented by our competent Year 11 student, **Kieran Pain** and **Kieren Young**. I commend these students on their initiative, responsibility and leadership skills. A big thank you also goes to all of our mentors who have given up their time in service to other students of the school. The mentors this term were: **Annie Li, Lucy Gamaroff, Erika Moelle, Laura Morison, Christina Kim, Sasha Ahrens, Evangelia Lackerdis, Jordana Kasler, Christina Ly, Afreedi Jafar, Patrik Kertesz, Charlie Chen, Brian Noh and Matthew Vallance.** 

In their evaluation students reported that they welcomed the opportunity to participate in discussions with their mentors, which helped to improve their English and to discuss matters of importance to them in a friendly and relaxed environment. They felt more informed about the school's extracurricular activities and leadership groups and in turn felt more connected to the school community.

Most made an increased effort to speak English with each workshop. We hope that with time, more students will benefit from this program and become active members in the school community as a result.

### **Interview Bookings**

On 21<sup>st</sup> March, parents of students in Years 7 and 11 received an email invitation allowing them access to the computerized booking system. This enabled parents to indicate their availability for a meeting and to indicate which of their child's teachers they would like to see. This access has now closed.

Interviews between parents and the nominated teachers are being scheduled between the hours of 3.30pm and 8.00pm taking into account parent and teacher availability.

The schedule of interviews will be open for parent access on 4<sup>th</sup> April so that parents may print out their schedule. Some limited adjustments of appointments may be possible depending on the availability of teachers. This access will close again on 8<sup>th</sup> April at 3pm.

The system does not notify you of your appointment schedule. You must log on between 4<sup>th</sup>
 - 8<sup>th</sup> April to download your interview appointments.

- The venue for all interviews will be the Kerrabee Centre hall. Signs around the walls of the hall will indicate course/ faculty locations and signs on tables will indicate locations of individual teachers.
- Interviews are of five minutes duration. Parents and teachers are asked to restrict their discussion to that time in fairness to all families seeking interviews. If teachers and/or parents feel the need to discuss matters further, another mutually convenient time should be arranged.
- Interviews must be prearranged. To drop in on the off chance of speaking to a teacher can prove very frustrating to those with appointments and such requests may not be able to be accommodated. Please give consideration to the needs of other parents and the staff during these evenings.

Please take advantage of these opportunities to meet with the school staff to discuss your child's progress. Year Advisers, a School Counsellor, Careers Adviser and the Learning and Support Teacher will also be present. A translation service can also be made available through the school. Please notify the office by email (Killarah.school@det.nsw.edu.au) if you require this service. You will need to indicate language required and approximate times of interviews.

In the gold medal match he beat a 35 year old Paralympian who has been playing for 20 years and trains for hours every day.

# **Attention Parents: A Worrying Trend**

Teachers have been alerted to the dangers of a social networking site which has become very popular with teens and tweens. This site has attracted much press attention of late both in the US and UK, and was the subject of discussion when the Youth Police Liaison Officer visited a Stage 4 assembly recently.

It has been suggested that parents would be wise to acquaint themselves with this site which the British Prime Minister went so far as to describe as "vile".

The site is called Ask.fm and is set up in a question and answer format which proves popular with this age group. In an article titled "10 Frightening Facts about Ask.fm That Parents Should Know" by Shannan Younger in *Tween Us*, the following points are made:

- Only those 13 years or older are allowed to use this service
- No one monitors the content of this website, which allows for anonymous contributions
- The website is increasingly being used as a means to communicate abusive, bullying and sexualised content.
- According to the Daily Mail the site has been linked to numerous suicides around the world
- Users cannot increase privacy settings
- Ask.fm is integrated with Facebook and twitter so the reach of postings is enormous.

These are just a few extracts from the article which is easily accessible using the title and the website *Tween Us.* Teachers are aware that some students have utilised this site and have been asked to avoid using such sites as they can be dangerous and detrimental to the mental health of young people.

In the absence of better controls it is wise for parents to monitor the social networking in which our young people are involved in the interest of their safety.

### What is the Correct Winter Uniform for Term 2?

Term 2 marks the beginning of the part of the school year when students are required to wear "WINTER" Uniform.

**Year 12 Jersey:** The wearing of a Year 12 Jersey is a privilege extended to Year 12. It is not part of the designated uniform and may only be worn in conjunction with correct uniform, which includes a white shirt and tie for boys and the senior shirt girls.

**Note**: The sloppy joe is being phased out and is no longer available through the Uniform Shop.

### Fiction:

Atkinson, Kate Life after Life

On a cold and snowy night in 1910, Ursula Todd is born, the third child of a wealthy English banker and his wife. Sadly, she dies before she can draw her first breath. On that same cold and snowy night, Ursula Todd is born, lets out a lusty wail, and embarks upon a life that will be, to say the least, unusual. For as she grows, she also dies, repeatedly, in any number of ways. Clearly history (and Kate Atkinson) have plans for her: In Ursula rests nothing less than the fate of civilization. [F ATK]

### Baker, Jo The Picture Book

Set against the rolling backdrop of a century of British history from WWI to the 'War on Terror', this is an intimate family portrait captured in snapshots. First there is William, the factory lad who loses his life in Gallipoli, then his son Billy, a champion cyclist who survives the D-Day Landings on a military bicycle, followed by his crippled son Will who becomes an Oxford academic in the 1960s, and finally his daughter Billie, an artist in contemporary London. Just as the names - William, Billy, Will, Billie - echo down through the family, so too the legacy of choices made, chances lost, and secrets kept. The Picture Book is a beautifully crafted story about parents and children, about fate and repetition, and about the possibility of breaking free. [F BAK]

Fielding, Helen **Bridget Jones: Mad About the Boy** 

This is Bridget a decade and a half later. Widowed, 51-year-old, cheeky single mother of two small children, attempting to write a screenplay and still struggling with how she fits into the world—a tech savvy world. Forlorn, without her rock Mark Darcy. [F FIE]

### Miller, Alex, Coal Creek

The new novel from Australia's highly acclaimed literary treasure is an extraordinarily powerful exploration of tragedy, betrayal, the true nature of friendship and the beauty of lasting love. Bobby Blue is caught between loyalty to his only friend, Ben Tobin, and his boss, Daniel Collins, the new Constable at Mount Hay. 'Ben was not a big man but he was strong and quick as a snake. He had his own breed of pony that was just like him, stocky and reliable on their feet.' Bobby understands the people and the ways of Mount Hay; Collins studies the country as an archaeologist might, bringing his coastal values to the hinterland. Bobby says, 'I do not think Daniel would have understood Ben in a million years.' Increasingly bewildered and goaded to action by his wife, Constable Collins takes up his shotgun and his Webley pistol to deal with Ben. Bobby's love for Collins' wilful young daughter Irie is exposed, leading to tragic consequences for them all. [F MIL]


