Young Endeavour* Voyage 9/14 Sail to Adventure on the *Young Endeavour

Sea spray and howling wind, the plunging and rolling of waves. It was 3.00am and we were drenched and aching with our freezing fingers coiled tight around the sodden ropes of the Jib furling lines. Just as we began hauling in on this line, our ship, the enigmatic *Young Endeavour*, pitched over the top of the 4 metre swell and our stomachs leapt into our throats. The bow went under and once again an enormous cascade of water drenched our entire watch. Holding onto the line for dear life, my best mate of just four days turned round to look at me, and in the light of the deck lamps cracked a perfect smile. I caught his eye and grinned back - this is what it was to live.

The *Young Endeavour* is a youth training sailing ship that has delivered one of the most magnificent experiences of my young life. For ten days that felt like a millennia, 24 16 to 23 year-olds sailed her from tropical Cairns to the Great Barrier Reef haven of Hamilton Island. During those days we formed life-long friendships, learnt the ways of tall ship sailing, braved weather, sang songs, climbed masts,

composed poems, slept odd hours, cleaned heads and worked with one of the most professional groups of adults many of us had ever encountered. In short, it was an incredible journey, eye opening and enjoyable, liberating and breath taking. If you have the inclination for adventure, the *Young Endeavour* is surely where you'll find it.
