The Bare Creek Trial Run... it's on again

The challenge has once again been laid down to Killara High School for a 'mob match' in the Bare Creek Trail Run, which is a run with a 6km and 10km option through the Garigal National Park. This year, the event takes place on Sunday 27 November.

In 2014 and 2015 Killara High School has claimed the Bare Creek Trail Run Mob Match Shield over St Ives High School. The organisers have set their sights wider this year and have invited a number of other schools to get involved, so we are looking for even more teachers and students to get involved this year.

What is a MOB MATCH?

Quite simply it is a Mob of us against a Mob of them. Statistically the more competitors that one team has, then the better their chances are of winning. The way it works is that you add up the number of runners on each side then take the smallest number. For example, if St Ives High School have sixty and Killara High School have eighty then we score the first sixty from each side. It adds up to big numbers and the team with the lower score is the winner. First place counts 1 point, 2nd 2, etc. If you finish in 98th place you score 98 points. But more importantly for Killara it is their first sixty runners that score, but for St Ives it would be all of their runners who score, in this example.

So as you can see, it is not so much the team with the fastest runners, but often the bigger team numbers that is advantaged, the aim is that every runner is contributing to the team not just the elite few. This is to encourage as many as possible to enter and for everyone to feel a part of the result.

As we know, however, it is all about getting involved in a community event and having some fun with your friends from school.

2017 Year 7 BYOD Program

In response to the changing requirements of the curriculum, the rapidly shifting technological landscape, and our strong and ongoing commitment to 21st century teaching and learning excellence, Killara High School will be implementing the Year 7 Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) program in 2017. It means that each student in Year 7 will have the choice of which computing device they can bring to school each day.

The BYOD program provides opportunities for students to develop their ICT skills using familiar technology from home, while allowing families to make decisions on the most suitable equipment.

Killara High School recognises that such devices are integral to the world in which students live, and therefore should be integral in supporting their learning at school.

The BYOD program supports our school's Strategic Direction regarding developing successful learners. The 'Bring Your Own Device' program can streamline the connection between learning at school and learning at home.

Year 7 will be the first year to participate in the BYOD program which will officially begin in Week 3, Term 1 2017.

Students can bring their choice of device (laptop/tablet/windows) as long as it complies with the Device Specifications (see the BYOD section of the KHS website).

Students and parents will need to sign a user agreement which outlines student expectations and responsibilities. This will be given out at the beginning of 2017 as part of the enrolment package to students.

Killara High School has access to a small number of reconditioned laptops for loan if students do not have their own device. Contact our school principal for further information about equity matters.

Killara High School will record the Mac address of each device as a security measure.



School Stream

Killara High School has introduced a new and free school app that will enable you to receive school information instantly and directly to your smartphone. This is available now for you to download.

You are able to access whole school information, the school calendar, PAE, Sports and Year Group updates, plus reminders about excursion permission and payment notes.

How to get the School Stream app on your mobile device

- From your mobile device go to the App Store (iPhone/iPad) or Play Store (Android), search for School Stream and download the app to your phone.
- 2. Make sure you agree to push notifications
- 3. Once School Stream has finished installing, open the app, type your school name into the search then select your school. For more detailed instructions go to:

4. Are your children attending different schools? Tap the school selector, select add a school, type the school name* into the search then add. Jump between your children's schools by touching the school name/logo in the top blue bar, or switch schools from the slide-in menu.

Choose what notifications you receive

- 1. Open the School Stream app on your mobile device
- 2. From the slide-in menu, go to Settings
- 3. Under Edit/Alerts select My Schools and select your School to open the Notifications page
- 4. Within here, you can select the areas you would like to receive notifications for (e.g. Year Groups, Events, PAE, Sports etc.)
- 5. When you have finished, use the Back button to return to the Settings page, then select Done to return to your School

You can return at any time to change the notifications you receive.

Online Consent Forms

We currently send emails to all parents/carers for student excursions and consent forms, which you currently print and return to the Accounts Window.

When we email these to you from now on, within the email you will receive a link for you to access the consent forms online. It's as simple as clicking on the link provided, completing and submitting the form.

Reminder of Payments

All parents/carers will start to receive an emailed reminder of payments. This will be sent from a khs.nsw.edu.au email address. Can you please ensure that this address is added to your address book so that the email does not go directly into your junk directory. This email will contain a link to a Parent Online Payment (POP) form for online payment to be made.

Statement of Accounts

All statement of accounts will be sent via email only from Term 4 onwards. To make a payment you can either click on the link within the email which will automatically take you to the POP form with the student number already included or you can access the payment form online at: <u>www.killara-h.schools.nsw.edu.au</u> and simply click on the *Make a Payment* button on the home page.

Please Read – Important information regarding Opal Cards



What is a School or Child/Youth Opal Card?

The **School Opal card** is a free travel or discounted travel Opal card to help eligible students to get to and from school. It is only valid for approved travel on school days between your home and school with restricted hours, on the mode(s) specified in the original application.

For travel outside of School, for personal travel or if ineligible for a School Opal card, students should use a **Child/Youth Opal card**, a concession fare Opal card for customers aged 4/15 (inclusive), or customers 16 years or older who hold a NSW/ACT Senior Secondary School Concession Card. The card must have **sufficient balance** on it for the intended travel.

> Tap on and off, every time to validate your trip

At the start of each trip, tap on by placing your Opal card on an Opal card reader located at the entrance of the bus.

At the end of the trip, tap off by placing your Opal card on an Opal reader again.

Opal card holders **must always tap on and off for each trip and each transport mode** used during their journey.

If an error message displays when tapping on or off, students must take notes of the error code and contact Opal Customer Care for assistance.

No tap on and off, no bus services

Although some might have a free pass, all students must tap on and tap off, so we understand customer travel patterns and can adjust the services provided if necessary.

If students don't tap on and off, services may be withdrawn due to the lack of recorded patronage, or redirected to other schools where the demand is higher.

Any lost, stolen, faulty or damaged Opal card must be **reported online immediately**. While waiting for a replacement card, students must use a Child/Youth Opal card to travel.
