China Study Tour

Last holidays (April 9 to 20), eight Killara High School students participated in the inaugural KHS China Study Tour, visiting Shanghai and Beijing. The students were Johnny Benstead, Scarlett Cheesman, Oliver Moelle and Jordan Vink from Year 11, Ellie



Krust, Imogen Dixon-Smithers and Joel Tan from Year 10 and Hannah Krust from Year 9. Also attending were Mr Christopher Charles (School Education Director) and Mrs Janet Benstead, both of whom I thank for their involvement in this initiative.

The highlight of our visit to Shanghai was the four days we spent at our newly established sister school, East China Model High School. There, we signed the sister school agreement on which occasion two of our senior students, Johnny Benstead and Scarlett Cheesman, gave speeches in Chinese. Staff and students at the school made us very welcome having prepared many activities for our students including language, martial arts, tea ceremony and calligraphy lessons. Our students experienced an authentic school day, attending early morning

exercises, Maths, Economics, Computer Studies and English classes. This experience has given our students an invaluable insight into life for Chinese secondary students and it is wonderful to see the connections that have been forged between KHS and ECMHS students.



After visiting some of Shanghai's landmarks such as the Yu Garden, The Bund and the Jade Buddha Temple we caught a high speed train to Beijing where we saw a dazzling acrobatic show. An unusual and memorable event for both students and teachers alike was a chilly 4am start to see the flag raising ceremony in Tiananmen Square. We stood and waited, with hundreds of others, for the anthem and flag raising by members of the PLA, in one of the largest public squares in the world, scene of many historical events. Our visits to the Forbidden City, The Temple of Heaven and The Great Wall of China put students' previous study of Chinese history and culture into perspective.

Our Killara HS students are to be commended on being outstanding representatives of their families and their school. Our students approached all situations with enthusiasm, consideration for others and above all a great sense of adventure and fun. We look forward to students and staff from East China Model High School visiting us later this year and to our next opportunity to visit China.

Student Drivers Agreement – Years 11 and 12

This form sets out expectations for Year 11 and 12 students who may drive to school as outlined below. These conditions are in place for the interests of promoting student safety and respect for our local community. Students are required to return the completed form to the Student Services Window in A Block. Additional copies are available at the Student Services Window.

<u>School Conditions for Student use of Private</u> <u>Motor Vehicles:</u>

- 1. Students who drive a vehicle to or from school, do so at their own risk.
- 2. Student drivers are expected to conform to the road rules at all times and to ensure that no

- more passengers are carried than are provided for by fitted seat belts.
- 3. No student may travel as a passenger in a car driven by another student to or from school activities without written parental consent.
- 4. Student drivers will not charge passengers a fare as this may invalidate insurance policies.
- 5. Student drivers and other students will not access or drive their vehicles during school hours.
- Student drivers will be considerate of the interests of residents neighbouring Killara High School and uphold the Code of Conduct when accessing their vehicle.

Technology and Teenagers

How and why teenagers use technology

It sometimes seems like teenage lives revolve around their phones and technology. From the internet and social media, to phones, apps, games, television and other types of tech, it's easy to wonder whether it's all too much. Young people use the internet and social media to:

- connect, comment and discuss things with others, through social networking, emailing and online messaging
- find, create or share interesting photos, videos and articles
- join or follow interest groups
- play online games
- learn more about topics that interest them
- as a study tool for school.

Benefits of using the internet

Young people love going online for very good reason. Some of the well documented benefits include:

- learning more and educating themselves
- maintaining and developing supportive relationships
- forming their identities (through selfexpression, learning, and talking)
- promoting a sense of belonging and selfesteem, through staying connected with friends and being involved in diverse communities.

Research shows that the things that help young people have a positive experience online are:

- having a good understanding of the internet and how online media work (including things like privacy settings)
- having the skills to critically understand, analyse and create content that adds value for themselves and others.

If young people understand what it means to be a good 'digital citizen', you have every reason to trust them with managing their own internet use, just as you trust them to act responsibly when they're at school and out with friends.

Risks for teenagers on the internet

Potential risks online are closely related to issues young people can experience at school, at home and in the community. It's important to remember that - just as teenagers need to have good boundaries and rules for offline behaviour, and the guidance and morals to make good decisions - they also need these things to protect them online.

Some risks associated with being online are:

- Cyberbullying when people use technology to embarrass, harass or bully someone. This can include posting mean or untrue things, making fake online profiles intended to embarrass people, sharing embarrassing photos and more.
- Trolling when people deliberately try to start arguments or try to upset people on the internet, often causing a lot of distress.
- Isolation spending too much time using technology and the internet means that young people don't spend time with family and friends, creating barriers and making them feel isolated.
- Inappropriate material teenagers posting inappropriate pictures or content online, or sharing them with friends, creating a risk of humiliation for themselves or others.
- Inappropriate relationships strangers or others trying to form inappropriate relationships with young people.

Being aware of these risks is the first step in helping your teenager manage them.

How much time are young people spending on screens?

A 2011-12 study by the Australian Bureau of Statistics showed that 5-17 year olds spend, on average, just over two hours per day in screen-based activity, compared to 1.5 hours per day on physical activity. Just under half of 2-17 year olds had access to at least one type of screen (TV, computer, phone etc) in their bedrooms. For 15-17 year olds, this figure goes up to 75%.

More recent statistics on teenage internet use (2014-15) show that:

- Teenagers 15-17 years spend an average of 18 hours per week online (just over two hours per day).
- Teenagers 15-17 years old are most likely to use the internet for social networking (91 per cent), entertainment (73 per cent) and formal education activities (73 per cent)

What is a healthy limit to set for my teenager?

Two hours used to be the golden rule for the amount of screen time young people should be allowed per day. That's now being revised because it just isn't realistic in the modern world where technology is used for education and social networking, as well as entertainment. It's more important to set limits on *recreational* screen time, and to focus on the quality of what your children are doing on their devices.

Ask questions like:

- Where is my child looking for information?
 How do they know it's good quality?
- What kind of games and apps is my child using?
- Are they almost always using their screen time for distraction or procrastination?

These are the sorts of questions that help you find the line between healthy and unhealthy use of technology for your family.

It's all about balance

All of us, especially young people, need to learn how to exercise moderation in the things we spend time on. Having fun and staying connected to our friends and family is important. Some teenagers will do this by spending a lot of time connecting with their friends on social media, or hanging out with other 'gamers' when playing multi-player games online. That's ok!

But it's important to support them to balance that with face-to-face time with people, and to make sure they leave enough time in their week for physical exercise, learning, and other types of play.



Higher School Certificate and Stage 5 Course Information Meeting For Parents of Years 8 and 10 Students

The time for Year 8 and Year 10 course selections for 2016 is upon us.

Information sessions for parents of students in Year 8 and 10 will be held on:

Tuesday 31 May 2016 in the Kerrabee Theatre Year 8 at 6.00pm and Year 10 at 6.40pm

In order to provide students and parents with comprehensive information to assist in making decisions about programs of study for Year 9 and Year 11 2017, special booklets are being prepared and will be distributed to students prior to the information evening.

These booklets contain a wealth of general information about Higher School Certificate and Stage 5 course requirements as well as a range of programs of study and details about all subjects on offer to students. Killara High School is able to offer students a very broad range of courses for both the Higher School Certificate and Stage 5.

The meetings on Tuesday 31 May will provide parents and students with further details about NSW Board of Studies requirement for the awards of the Record of School Achievement and Higher School Certificate.

All faculties will have representatives available at the evening meeting to provide additional information about courses and answers to questions you might have.

Students are asked to choose their courses carefully in consultation with parents and teachers. Year 8 students choose three electives to study in Year 9. Year 10 students choose 10 units (most subjects are equal to 2 units) in addition to the compulsory 2 units of English. Students are always advised to make their choices based on their interests and talents.

For Year 10, all students will be interviewed by their Year Advisers prior to finalising their course selections for their senior program of study on June 21 and 22 June 2016. Killara High School provides a supportive consultation process to ensure all students make choices that will best suit their individual needs.

Both Year 8 and Year 10 students will be required to return their selection forms before the end of Term 2.


From the Library
