Social Justice Committee (SJC) - Stewart House Excursion

Last Friday Will Savage, Fin Geraghty, Harsh Budhwar, Miles Jennings, Indira Courtness, Liz Parsons, Jeremy Segal, Milly Raffle, Elissa Zhang, Zaalia Herbert, Alice Nguyen and Elizabeth Dwyer were invited to teach primary school students about the values and traits of a good leader and join them on a great excursion to Stewart House. The day was organised by Ms Chloe Williams, SJC coordinator.

The group met the primary school students in the morning. The schools were Lindfield, Roseville, Killara, Lindfield East and Gordon East Public Schools. The children were split into three groups, each focusing on one aspect of leadership. Miles, Will, Fin and Harsh taught communication and confidence. Liz, Indira, Elissa and Zaalia taught what makes a good leader. Jeremy, Milly, Alice and Elizabeth taught team building skills.



The group used a wide range of games and activities such as talking for a minute without stuttering or saying 'like' or 'um' and solving moral problems and games. These activities taught the primary school children valuable lessons about leadership. This was a great experience for both the primary school students and the Killara group. Everyone left feeling they had learnt something.

After we finished the leadership activities, we hopped on a bus, and drove out to Stewart House.

Stewart House is a school and house for students with troubled family lives or who might need some time away from home. Many of the students who go to Stewart House say it was a life-changing experience and was like a holiday.

When we arrived there we were taken on a tour of the school first. All the Stewart House students were split into six different groups based on their age. While at Stewart House, students in these age groups go on excursions such as Vivid, sports games, visit the Harbour Bridge and the beach. They also participate in extra-curricular activities such as yoga and jewellery making.

The students are also able to receive high five points. High five points are a type of reward system where you are given points for being good and participating. At the end of the 12 day camp, they get to spend their high five points on prizes such as footballs and board games (expensive prizes), and things such as soft toys (cheaper prizes). We thought this was a great idea seeing as many of the children may not have things like this at home.

There were many great facilities at Stewart House that would allow the children to have a lot of fun with all the other students. Some examples of the facilities at Stewart House are the basketball court, mini trampolines, games room and best of all, a mini movie cinema! These facilities are great for the students as really helps them enjoy their experience and bond with each other as some of them could be quite home sick or worried. The students also got to try many new foods that they had never tried before, due to money constraints.

Students' enjoy a lovely ocean view from their cabins. They also write on a whiteboard about their emotional state so the teachers can know how they are going, without having to ask them. This makes it easy to share their feelings quietly, as some children feel that 12 days away from home is a long time, and it makes them homesick or they find it hard to settle in. There were lots of games to have fun with in their spare time and books that they could take home for free. The children can also watch television or just wander around the place with their friends.

This is a great experience for the children who attend Stewart House as many of them have never seen the sea, a theatre or a city. This is a great break from their stressful home life, and nearly every child who attends Stewart House says they have a great time.

If people want to make a donation that would be absolutely incredible. Stewart House is an awesome place that really empowers children who are having a rough time, or that just really deserve better. Going there and hearing some of the children's stories was so touching and it really is a worthwhile charity and cause.

Donating some loose change means that 90 children per fortnight can have the time of their lives, having new experiences, seeing new things, learning a great deal, trying new food and making new friends. Stewart House provides children with a break from their often hard lives. So Come on Mate! Donate!

Killara High School Assessment Policy June 2016 Addendum

Mobile telephones, smart watches and any other electronic devices

The Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards NSW (BOSTES) published an updated requirement for all schools in relation to mobile telephones, smart watches and any other electronic devices on 6 June 2016. Killara High School has now included this into the school's assessment policy. Students are not permitted to take mobile telephones or other electronic devices into the examination room.

At Killara High School, these devices must be switched off and placed in the locked crates located in the foyer of the Kerrabee Centre. This must be done before entering any examination scheduled in the hall.

Students should leave these devices in their school bag and place their school bag into the provided crate. If students don't bring their school bag to the examination, they must write their full name on a piece of paper and wrap this around their device using a rubber band before placing it into the locked crate. Students must have their device labeled, switched off and ready to place into the crate before entering the examination. Students are to use their own paper and rubber band to label their device.

Students will be allowed to collect their device once the crate is unlocked at the conclusion of the examination, not earlier.

For examinations scheduled within classrooms, students must switch off their mobile telephone, smart watches and any other electronic device and leave these in their school bag at the front of the classroom.

Students who are found with a mobile telephone or electronic device during an examination will have breached the examination rules and penalties can include loss of examination marks.

Stage 6 Student Requirements


Students in Years 11 and 12 must download, print and complete the Illness/Misadventure Application on the same dav as the missed task. The Illness/Misadventure Application can be printed from the Killara High School website by clicking on INDEX Illness/Misadventure and then selectina the Application file. This needs to be taken to the relevant professional authority to complete all relevant sections of the application on the same day of the missed assessment task. The application consists of three pages and can be found on pages 45, 46 and 47 of the KHS Assessment Policy.

Stage 4 and 5 Student Requirements

If you are in Stage 4 or 5 and are absent due to illness or misadventure on the day an assessment task is scheduled or due, you must provide the school with documentary evidence from a medical professional or from your parents/carers. This must explain the specific reason for the absence. Stage 4 and 5 students only need to complete page 45 of the Illness/Misadventure Application process. Pages 46 and 47 are only required for Stage 6 students. The Illness/Misadventure Application can be printed from the Killara High School website by clicking on INDEX and then selecting the Illness/Misadventure Application file.

If you are in Year 11 or Year 12 and are absent due to illness or misadventure on the day an assessment task is scheduled or due, follow and complete this process within 5 school days of the due date of the assessment task. This process is mandatory for Year 11 and Year 12 students.



If you are in Stage 4 or 5 and are absent due to illness or misadventure on the day an assessment task is scheduled or due, you must provide the school with documentary evidence from a medical professional or from your parents/carers. This must explain the specific reason for the absence. Stage 4 and 5 students only need to complete page 45 of the Illness/Misadventure Application process. Pages 46 and 47 are only required for Stage 6 students. Print the Illness/Misadventure Application from the Killara High School website by clicking on INDEX and then selecting the Illness/Misadventure Application file.

New fiction in detail:

Anderson, Laurie Halse. <u>Catalyst: this was never</u> <u>the plan</u>

Kate Malone: straight-A student, perfect daughter and girlfriend. She can handle anything. But then things fall apart....and maybe that's exactly what Kate needs.

Brabon, Katherine. *<u>The memory artist</u>*

Pasha Ivanov is a child of the Freeze, born in Moscow during Brezhnev's repressive rule over the Soviet Union. As a small child, Pasha sat at the kitchen table night after night as his parents and their friends gathered to preserve the memory of terrifying Stalinist violence, and to expose the continued harassment of dissidents. When Gorbachov promises glasnost, openness, Pasha, an eager twenty-four-year old, longs to create art and to carry on the work of those who came before him. He writes; falls in love. Yet that hope, too, fragments and by 1999 Pasha lives a solitary life in St Petersburg. Until a phone call in the middle of the night acts as a summons both to Moscow and memory. Through recollections and to observations, Pasha walks through the landscapes of history, from concrete tower suburbs, to a summerhouse during Russia's white night

summers, to haunting former prison camps in the Arctic north. Pascha' search to find meaning leads him to assemble a fractured story of Russia' traumatic past.

De Fombelle, Timothee. The book of pearl

Joshua Pearl comes from a world that we no longer believe in – a world of fairy-tale. He knows that his great love is waiting for him in that distant place, but is he trapped in our time. As his memories begin to fade, he discovers strange objects; tiny fragments from a tale that has already been told. Can Joshua remember the past in his own story before his love is love for ever?

Gale, Amily. *The other side of summer*

Summer is trying to recover from a tragedy, but it seems impossible when her family is falling apart around her. Having an extraordinary best friend like Mal helps a little, but Summer's secret source of happiness is a link to the past: one very special guitar. Now her dad's plan to save them is turning Summer's life upside down again. The next thing she knows, they've moved to the other side of the world. In Australia, Summer makes an unlikely friend, who seems to be magically connected to her guitar. Is this for real? Has a mysterious boy been sent to help Summer? Or could it be the other way around?

Griffin, M. A. Lifers

Preston is drawn to investigate, exploring the city in the hunt for his missing friend. Deep in the bowels of a secret scientific institute, he discovers a sinister machine, used to banish criminal teenagers for their offences. Captured and condemned to the cavernous dimension, Preston is determined to scape – but this is no ordinary jail.

Jonsberg, Barry. Game theory

Jamie is a sixteen-year-old maths whiz. Summerlee, his older sister, is in the grip of a wild phase. Tensions at home run high. When Summerlee wins a 7.5 million-dollar lottery, she cuts all ties with her family. And when their younger sister Phoebe is kidnapped for a ransom, the family faces a crisis almost too painful to bear. James thinks he can use game theory – the strategy of predicting an opponent's actions – to get Phoebe back. But can he outfox the kidnapper? Or is he putting lives at risk?

Lewis, Gill. Gorilla down

Deep in the heart of the African jungle, a baby gorilla is captured by a group of rebel soldiers. Imara and Bobo are two children also imprisoned in the rebels' camp. When they learn that the gorilla is destined to be sold into captivity, they swear to return it to the wild before it's too late. But the consequences of getting caught are too terrible to think about. Will the bond between the gorilla and the children give them the courage they need to escape?

Muchamore, Robert. <u>Maximum security (Cherub</u> series)

Over the years, Cherub has put plenty of criminals behind bars. Now, for the first time ever, they've got to break one out. Under American law, kids convicted of serious crimes can be sentenced as adults. Two hundred and eighty of these child criminals live in the sun baked desert prison of Arizona Max. In one of the most daring Cherub missions ever, James Adams has to go undercover inside Arizona Max, befriend an inmate and then bust him out. Cherub kids are trained professionals, working in everyday situations. Their essential advantage: adults never suspect that children are spying on them.

Perez, Ashley Hope. Out of darkness

"This is East Texas, and there's lines. Lines you cross, lines you don't cross. That clear?"

New London, Texas, 1937. Naomi Vargas and Wash Fuller know about the lines in East Texas as well as anyone. They know the signs that mark them. They know the people who enforce them. But sometimes the attraction between two people is so powerful it breaks through even the most entrenched colour lines. And the consequences can be explosive. Set in the 1937 New London school explosion - the worst school disaster in American history – this is a novel about segregation, love, family, and the forces that destroy people.

Despite the suspicion and hostility emanating from their fibro shack, Sam reverts to his childhood habit of following Minty around and is soon surfing with Minty to cut through the static fuzz in his head. But as the days slowly meld into one another, and ghosts from the past reappear, Sam has to make the ultimate decision ... will he sink or will he swim?
