
featured Lionel Cole (Nat King Cole's Nephew). Our students thought this was the highlight of the weekend.

We have scheduled the Student Progress Review meeting session for Years 8 and 10 on **Tuesday 14** June – Term 2 Week 8.

We hope parents can take advantage of this opportunity to discuss with teachers their children's progress to date.

# Interview Bookings

Parents of students in Years 8 and 10 should have received an email invitation allowing them access to the computerized booking system. This enables parents to indicate their availability for a meeting and to indicate which of their child's teachers they would like to see. It is important that parents complete this process before 7:00am Monday 6 June.

Interviews between parents and the nominated teachers will then be scheduled between the hours of 3.30pm and 8.00pm taking into account parent and teacher availability.

The schedule of interviews will be open for parent access on 7 June so that parents may print out their schedule. Some limited adjustments of appointments may be possible depending on the availability of teachers. This access will close again on 11 June at midnight.

# PLEASE NOTE -

• The system does not notify you of your appointment schedule. You must log on between

7 – 11 June to download your interview appointments.

• The venue for all interviews will be the Kerrabee Centre hall. Signs around the walls of the hall will indicate course/ faculty locations and signs on tables will indicate locations of individual teachers.

• Interviews are of five minutes duration. Parents and teachers are asked to restrict their discussion to that time frame in fairness to all families seeking interviews. If teachers and/or parents feel the need to discuss matters further, another mutually convenient time should be arranged.

• Interviews must be pre-arranged. To drop in on the off chance of speaking to a teacher can prove very frustrating to those with appointments and such requests may not be able to be accommodated. Please give consideration to the needs of other parents and the staff during these evenings.

• There will be Cantonese, Korean and Mandarin translators available during the evening. Please notify the office by email at: <u>Killara-h.school@det.nsw.edu.au</u> if you require this service. You will need to indicate your child's name and the language required.

Please take advantage of these opportunities to meet with the school staff to discuss your child's progress. Year Advisers, Career Adviser, Learning & Support Teacher and a School Counsellor will also be present.

# **Assessment and Student Leave**

Please be mindful of the Department of Education's policy regarding student leave requests. Leave is discouraged during the school term and especially when it clashes with student assessment.

The Department of Education takes the following position in relation to student leave during the school term:

**14.1**. From the beginning of 2015, family holidays and travel are no longer considered under the *Exemption from School - Procedures*. Travel outside of vacation period is now counted as an absence for statistical purposes.

**14.3.** A Principal should not accept a reason for travel during school term if it is not in the best interests of the student. Educational, social and participation reasons should be specified on the application.

# **Revised Killara High School Assessment Policy Commences Operation Term 3 2016**

A revised assessment policy will commence operation at the start of Term 3, 2016.

This revision aims to prepare all students for the requirements set by the Board of Studies Teaching and Educational Standards regarding leave and Illness/Misadventure Applications.

All students and families should familiarise themselves with the requirements of this revised assessment policy.

If a student experiences illness or misadventure, they download, print must and take the Illness/Misadventure Application to the person providing the supporting evidence e.g. a doctor, on the same day of the assessment task and complete before returning school. this to The Illness/Misadventure Application is located on the Killara High School website under the heading INDEX.

This revised process aims to best equip students with the skills to manage their learning in a manner that best positions them to address BOSTES requirements. The person providing the supporting evidence must complete their section of the Illness/Misadventure Application on the same day of the assessment task.

Please read the flowchart on the next page for specific information about the steps to be addressed if a student misses any assessment.

Information about this revised assessment policy will be provided to students at Stage Assemblies, in Home Group and all students will receive a hard copy of this revised assessment policy in Week 7. The school will also email students and families a digital copy of this revised policy in Week 7. This revised assessment policy aims to uphold the key principles of honesty and fairness, and penalties will apply for students who do not fulfil all of the requirements.

All students must complete an Illness/Misadventure Application to justify their absence or lateness when this impacts their completion of an assessment.

If a student misses a test, class task or oral task and does not complete an Illness/Misadventure Application, a penalty of zero marks will be awarded. Students may submit a task (other than class tasks e.g. test, practical tasks and oral tasks) after the due date **but a penalty will apply** to any mark awarded.







# **Burning Legs at Balmoral**

Pre-race I had an interesting perspective on the Balmoral Burn. I had run in this event five years previously as part of a bet with my older brother, and then Killara High School Prefect, Matt. Postrace I had a different perspective...

It was a clear cold autumn day on 29 May, and a group of shivering Killara High School students waded through the crowd of frozen zombie-like competitors. Awaba Street Balmoral lay vacant, lined with Humpty Dumpty Foundation advertising and surreptitiously placed Fox Sport banners, its way cleared from obstructions, a golden arch spanning the top far in the distance. We were the Killara High School Prefect teams, four girls, four boys, who came to conquer the infamous four hundred and twenty metres of steep black asphalt. The girls ran first, huddling together in the ironically-named Fox Sports warm up zone. Our first runner Bri headed off, flanked left and right by other high school girls, equally determined to conquer Mt Awaba. When one person reached the top, the next would start; Ellen, Kate and finally Katarina. Throughout the race an announcer reminded the runners about the dangers of the buildup of lactic acid, but the Killara girls remained strong, each one reaching the top before collapsing on the ground from exertion. Next up were the boys, flushed from the success of our peers, we readied ourselves at the base of the street. Up we went, one at a time, legs pumping, heart beating, all the way to the top. First myself, then Jett, Toby and Angus were met by the supportive hands of the now recovered girls, each of us falling to the grass as our exhausted legs gave way.

It was a hard climb but a rewarding one. Each person walked away knowing that they had done what they came to do: support children's hospitals with the fundraising from the generous Killara High School students.

After the race I was a different person, now educated in the ways of extreme hill climbing, I felt like I had accomplished something - a rewarding experience held by only a selected few. The 2016 Killara "Head of the Hill" teams now made up eight of them. Will I be doing it again next year? Of course.
