

From the Principal



This is a series of drawings of a Western Tiger Swallowtail butterfly, drawn by a first grade student called Austin. You can see the process here: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=hqh1MRWZjms</u>

Austin knew that the goal was an accurate, coloured, scientific illustration, but he was six, without sophisticated art and fine motor skills, and without much understanding of what a scientific illustration was.

The photograph on this page shows his six attempts. Clearly, in the end, he nailed it. But what is interesting to us is how he got there. After each draft, a student critique group gave him feedback – kind, helpful and specific – and he raced off to make another attempt.

There's a couple of points worth making here. We shouldn't underestimate the power of peer feedback, when it is given kindly and constructively. But the real lesson is the value of persistence. If Austin's first or second draft had been accepted as the finished product, he would never have known that he had this ability within him. Tom Sherrington, a British educator, describes it perfectly: *The final draft was always within him. It just needed to find a way out.*

On another note about feedback, we thank our community for completing the survey about our website. It has provided a clear message that while the site is useful, it needs some revision. We are taking your views on board and look forward to unveiling a more useful and accessible site next term.

I wish everyone a safe, happy and relaxing vacation. I hope all students find some time to recharge for a busy Term 3.


After morning tea students then investigated 'Polynominoes' developing strategies in spatial visualisation and geometric reasoning

Students were divided into groups, each of which had a Killara High Year 10 student as a mentor. They worked on a series of problems collaboratively.






A **tetromino** is a shape formed by four squares joined edge to edge in various combinations – can you find all 5?

Student Leadership Groups (SLG) at Killara High School

Participation in student leadership opportunities is highly encouraged at Killara High School. To support this, a structure exists to cater for student interests and talents and to provide many leadership and participation opportunities for students while bringing the leadership groups together. Please see below an overview of the Student Leadership Framework for more information. Nominations for student leadership positions are now open. Students in Years 7-11 have been emailed the relevant nomination forms and are encouraged to submit their completed nomination form to the respective Student Leadership Coordinator by **22 July 2016**. Subsequent to the formation of ballot papers, online elections by students will open from **25-26 August 2016**.

There are six leadership groups within the school with the potential for more as the need arises. The peek group is an overarching council with representatives from the other 5 groups called the **SENIOR LEADERSHIP COUNCIL** (SLC).

This structure caters for student interests and talents and provides many leadership and participation opportunities for students while bringing the leadership groups together.

Other leadership groups are -

Arts Council (AC) – Year representatives elected by peers following nomination– providing a voice for students in the arts and will actively plan and organize and promote drama, music and dance events during the year

Prefects – Elected by Year 12 following nomination – The 'face(s)' of the school – representing and promoting the values, achievements and ethos of Killara High School both within the school and the wider community

Social Justice Committee (SJC) – Year representatives elected by peers following nomination – the social conscience and awareness raising leadership

group. The group is centred on the principle of doing something for others.

Sports Council (SC) – Year representatives elected by peers following nomination – providing a voice for students interested in sports and will actively plan and organise sports events during the year to promote fitness and a healthy lifestyle.

Student Representative Council (SRC) – Year representatives elected by peers following nomination – promoting the interests and rights of students, working to engender pride and commitment and 'school spirit'.

Representatives from each of these groups sit on the SLC:



The SLC meets twice each term.

The Leaders of the SLC are the school Captains.

The **School Captains** are elected from Year 11 members of any Leadership group within the school. The selection takes place by nomination and subsequent interview of all nominees by a panel comprising Principal, Year Adviser and Captains of previous year to produce a short list of no more than 6 students. Nominees will be required to present a 2 minute presentation of why they have the capacity to be a school captain and how they would approach and undertake the role. Election of the school captains will be by vote of the Year 11 students from all leadership groups and associated staff plus year advisers and executive staff responsible for the year including the Principal.

Killara High School Student Leadership Groups



Notes:

- 1. Nominations need to be seconded by teacher and endorsed by member of school executive and must include a student photo. Students must give an outline of their reasons for wishing to be part of a particular student leadership group and an overview of leadership capacities or school spirit that they have demonstrated. They must acknowledge and sign off on responsibilities associated with particular leadership group and acceptance of nomination. Students in Year 11 may only nominate for ONE student leadership group. Students who have been placed on Level 3 or 4 in the calendar year of nomination are not eligible to nominate. Students who have been placed on Level 1 or 2 in the calendar year of nomination will have their nomination the leadership reviewed by group coordinator.
- 2. Completed nominations for each leadership group are to be submitted to the teacher coordinator of the group in person by the nominee. Nominations need to be submitted by the due date for consideration. Each teacher coordinator reviews the completed nomination and makes a determination of the sufficiency of the evidence or examples of leadership capacity or school spirit. The teacher coordinator then forwards the successful nominations to the Student Leadership Coordinator who prepares the ballot paper. Election of student leaders is via online ballot, emailed to Killara High School students via the Department of Education email.
- 3. Senior Prefects are elected by Prefects and associated staff (Principal, Year Advisers, Deputy Principals and Prefect coordinator)
- 4. Students can only be in one Leadership Group other than the SLC.

- Membership of a SLG is for one year from beginning of Week 8 Term 3 to Week 2 of Term 3 in following year.
- 6. Members of all SLGs will participate in a Student Leadership Induction Conference held at the beginning of term of office each year.
- 7. Eligibility criteria will apply to membership of all SLGs
- Voting for student leadership positions is by corresponding year group and staff. Voting takes place via online ballot in Week 6 of Term 3.
- Nomination and selection process for position of school captain and executive members of student leadership groups takes place during term 3.
- 10. The formation of Leadership groups commences in Week 10 Term 2
- The Student Leadership Coordinator emails students regarding the nomination process. The nomination process is outlined in the Newsletter on the website and to parents via email.
- The leadership structure/opportunities and procedures are explained to all students.
- Nomination forms are issued for all student leadership groups via email.
- Nominations close last Friday of 22 July 2016


