# Year 7 Swim and Survive Program

On 28 November - 1 December, during Week 8, Year 7 students participated in the annual Swim and Survive Program at Lane Cove Aquatic Leisure Centre. The weather was perfect all week, and students participated exceptionally well within their assigned Level groups. Swim and Survive is part of the Stage 4 PDHPE course, and similarly to the Year 9 program, it provides students with the opportunity to develop confidence in a water environment, and refine their skills in aquatics, rescue techniques, resuscitation and first aid.

We had 32 students obtain a Bronze Star Award, 21 students achieve a Level 7 Award, 43 get a Level 6 Award, 70 students achieve a Level 5 Award, 63 students were awarded a Level 4, 23 students got a Level 3 Award, and 7 students obtained either a Level 1 or 2 Award. Thank you to the 39 teachers and SLSO staff members who assisted with the program, and congratulations to all students who obtained an award.

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## NS5 Cricket Gala Day 2017

It's official! The 2017 cricket Gala Day was a raging success. In previous years it has just been St Ives, but this year, St Ives, Chatswood and Turramurra all turned up to play against the two Killara teams. The competition involved three time slots, with Killara Green taking on St Ives at Koola Oval and Killara Gold playing Chatswood at Saiala Oval at 8:30am.

### Killara Gold v Chatswood

Noah Conver captained Killara Gold to a strong victory in their first game. The boys put on 2/176 in the allocated 20 overs. After losing an early wicket, Bailey Robertson (32 ret not out) and Jim Tulip (37 ret not out) dominated the Chatswood attack. However, the highlight of the innings was the 53 not out by Daniel Cornofsky. Daniel cleared the fence six times, several well into the Saiala bush. Will Gerstl, Noah Conver and Blair Watson then put on another 20 runs at the end to complete an imposing total. In response Chatswood struggled to 9/46 from their 20 overs. Noah (2-6), Blair (2-2) and Eran Liyanage (2-4) claimed two wicket each, with Eran gaining two further wickets on a free hit. Ned Tulip (1-6), Bailey and Ewan Davies also got wickets. The fielding effort was outstanding. Brilliant catches to James Akayan, Blair and Josh Pacque.

### Killara Green v St Ives

Killara Green had a good win against St Ives. St Ives batted first reaching 7/95 from 20 overs. The wickets were shared around with Ajani Carre leading the way with 2 and Ayaan Ashar, Adit Kaushik, Mark Castrisos, Asher Klass and Ishaan Marathe all claiming wickets. Rana Alva was responsible for 3 brilliant catches, including two sharp catches at slip, with Ayaan taking the other.

In the batting innings there were good contributions from all batsman but none better than Adam Cavenor who was retired on 42. Adam opened the batting with Rana (14 ret not out), the pair putting on 63 runs from the first 8 overs. Nathan Cavenor (11) and Toby Laybutt (10 not out) saw the team across the line in the 18<sup>th</sup> over.



### Killara Gold v St Ives

In game 2 Killara Gold also played St Ives. St Ives batted first. Jim Tulip and Josh Pacque opened the bowling and after 4 overs St Ives were 2-8 thanks to a direct hit run-out to Josh and a wicket to Jim caught by Bailey behind the stumps. There was a steady flow of wickets with a number of catches taken, 4 by Bailey, 2 by Daniel and 1 from Noah. Harry Woog bagged 3/5 and was the leading bowler closely followed by James Akayan with 2/13. Alex Bhomer and Angus Ferguson also got wickets. Ned took the final wicket. St Ives 11/91 of 18.2 overs.

In the batting innings Noah and Ned got the team off to a solid start with a 20 run partnership. Ned (33 retired) and Josh (27) then set about destroying the St Ives attack to have the team 2-69 off 10 overs. A mini collapse saw Killara slump to 4/74 in the 12<sup>th</sup> over, but strong contributions from Eran (10) and Alex (13) seeing us pass the St Ives score in the 16<sup>th</sup> over.

#### <u>Killara Green v Turramurra</u>

Unfortunately, this game was abandoned after heavy rain and hail descended on Saiala Oval.

# ONLINE RECORD BOOK ACTION REQUIRED

The Online Record is going offline on 11 December 2017 and is being upgraded. While it is offline, data will be transferred from the current system to the new system. Participants will not be able to log into the system while it is offline and should log their hours on paper. NextGen is going live: 4 January 2018.

Once the transition is complete, ORB Next Gen will send out emails to all users requesting

them to update their passwords (they won't have access to the system until they do this). Current ORB passwords will not transfer.

What you need to do:

Log on before the 11 December and make a note of your progress for each section so you can check everything has been transferred. Record your hours on paper during the transition period Check your emails after 4 January 2018 to update your password

## Vietnam and Cambodia 2017

In the September holidays 2017, 30 Year 11 students and four teachers embarked on an overseas trip to Vietnam and Cambodia. This was an immersive opportunity to reflect not only on ourselves as people, but on the experiences of others, by learning and gaining an understanding about the different cultures and societies within Vietnam and Cambodia. It provided a unique opportunity for learning, despite being a 10 hour flight away from any classroom we knew.

Despite our relatively short time in Vietnam, we left with not only incredible experiences and memories, but also a new understanding of the parallels and divergence between Vietnamese and



Australian culture. Arriving in Vietnam was a culture shock to most of the people on the trip; nothing looked or sounded familiar, but as we explored the city and met people from the country, all the divisions began to melt away. Our wonderful guide Thoi, spent the trip teaching us about the culture and language of the Vietnamese people, through anecdotes and recounts of history, both modern and ancient.

We spent two days on the stunning Ha Long Bay, cruising around and appreciating the sights of nature, as we were all without phone signal and outside communication. The majority of our time in Vietnam was spent in the sweet little city of Hoi An, which had beautiful night markets, and plenty of great food! We travelled through temples and museums, gaining masses of knowledge, both as students but also as people who were doing their first international trip away without their family. The whole trip encompassed masses of fascinating history and culture of Vietnam, and we as students were allowed the chance to learn continuously throughout the trip. Next, we moved onto Cambodia. For each and every one of us, visiting was inspiring and insightful to say the least. We visited various historical sites and temples from the Khmer Empire, with the largest



being the famous Angkor Wat, dating back 900 years and still remaining the largest religious site in the world. We were also given the opportunity to help less fortunate children living in the rural areas of Cambodia by building them proper schooling facilities such as a kitchen and solar panels, providing electricity to which they previously did not have access.

However, the more recent confronting and painful past of Cambodia must not be forgotten. On our visit it was evident the country was still healing from the atrocities of Pol Pot and the Khmer Rouge. Our tour guide nicknamed 'Mister T' was a victim as a 13 year old child to the Khmer Rouge, as are most Cambodians alive today over the age of 40. Escaping the labour camp to visit his family, he was captured and almost killed by the camp leader. However, Mister T was lucky, he was given a second chance to live, something 3 million Cambodians during the genocide never had. A visit to a high school transformed into the notorious torture facility named S-21 by the Khmer Rouge and the Cheung Ek killing fields was eerie and extremely confronting.

As confronting as Cambodia's recent past may be, the Cambodian people as a nation are extremely resilient and brave; fighting for a fairer and more just future through education for their future generations.
