Open Boys' Cricket Northern Districts T20 Cup

On Wednesday 25 October, Killara High School Open Boys' cricket team played Redfield College in the Northern Districts T20 cup.

Redfield College won the toss and elected to field. Killara was happy with the decision with Ehsen Shaikh and Jim Tulip making a positive start before Ehsen was given out LBW for 11 runs. Sam Odgers (52) was the next at the crease, producing arguably the best innings of his cricket career at Killara.

After an injury to a Redfield fieldsman midway through the Killara innings the game was reduced to 18 overs. It was wonderful to see the sporting gesture initiated by Captain Adam Cavenor as the player was clapped from the ground as he made his way to the ambulance.

With a strong base all batsman played unselfishly, going for as many runs as possible in the reduced-over game. Killara finished at 6/123.

Redfield made a solid start but were pegged back with some tight bowling from Nathan Cavenor (1/14) and Josh Pacque (1/13). At 2/80 in the 12th over Redfield needed just 44 for victory from 8 overs. Wickets to Ehsen (1/19) and Sam (1/13) gave Killara the ascendancy. Redfield needed 18 runs off the last over. Ned Tulip (1/6) went for 3 runs and claimed the 6th wicket.

Redfield played with heart, falling short of victory by 14 runs. The bowler of the day went to Jack Nisbit from Redfield College with 3/13. It was a good victory for Killara High School and now we are into the Quarter Finals where we face Epping Boys High School.

KSP Mathematics Workshop



Gifted and Talented Mathematics students from Lindfield Primary and Roseville Primary worked with Killara High School Year 8 students and Mathematics staff investigating transversable networks. This allowed them to develop strategies in spatial visualisation and introduced topology. Students were divided into groups of 6, each of which had a Killara High Year 8 student as a mentor. They worked on a series of problems collaboratively.

A transversable network is one in which an Euler Path can be constructed, i.e. it can be traced over without going over the same edge twice. The famous Konigsberg Bridge problem was used to introduce students to the concepts involved.
