From the Principal

An interesting aspect of the annual NSW Secondary Principals' Conference was hearing from the secretary of the Department of Education, Mark Scott.

The direction in education for the next couple of years was outlined and briefly discussed in questions. There was a clear focus on the mandate for change to keep pace with the future of work. Mr Scott reminded us that today's kindergartners will enter the workforce, most probably, in the mid-2030s. Given current retirement trends, they will leave full-time work in the mid-2070s, perhaps later.

The numbers pose a challenge to all schools. All career paths encounter opportunities and obstacles, but it would appear that now, more than ever, our young people will work in fields that don't vet exist.

The growth of the smart phone in a decade is an interesting case. Author Tom Friedman in Thank You For Being Late argues that we are being outpaced by technology, the market and climate change. He tells us that 2007, the iPhone, Android and Kindle year, was the year that software began 'eating the world'. There are currently three billion smart phones being used across the globe. Before 2007 an 'app' meant little to us. Today, apps lock our houses remotely, track our fitness, pay for goods and so much more. 'Ummo' will coach you in public speaking, reminding you when you say 'um' or 'er', for example. Are we far away from services and brand names that provide customised, actionable insights throughout the day? What follows that? How do these innovations affect peoples' lives - and their jobs?

It is interesting to note that if you compared a lawyer's office in 1850 with the 1950 version, the differences would be largely cosmetic. Could we say the same about workplaces spanning 1917 to 2017? Watson, the IBM cognitive computer with natural language processing abilities, is employed at a law firm in New York. Our students will work in different ways, and in different fields. We are immersed in a technological revolution; one to rival the Industrial Revolution. If we are to educate our students so as to position them for career success, satisfaction and longevity, we must educate them to be flexible learners. The beginning of their careers will look quite different to the end.

Freidman has good news for us: humans are highly adaptive. The ATM, for example, actually created more full-time teller jobs in banks, because the technology allowed banks to increase the number of branches. While jobs will change, the provision of services will be more complete, and improve the quality of our lives. The proposed new style questions in the HSC focus strongly on developing students' ability to apply content rather than to recall facts, and to analyse global impacts – thus improving their ability to thrive in the post-Google world.
