Yes there are. Hunger is a hidden crisis in Australia, with over 2 million people seeking food relief at some point every year, half of which are children. In fact, the demand for food relief is rising, irrespective of national economic growth.



The face of hunger in Australia is diverse – it affects males, females, children, the elderly, single people and families, students, employed, unemployed and retired people. High-risk groups include people with disabilities, refugees and Indigenous Australians. Some of the common reasons why people find themselves seeking food relief include a lack of funds to pay rent and bills, and unexpected expenses such as car repairs or medical bills.

Yesterday, the Social Justice Committee hosted a 'Cereal Lunch' in the quad, selling pancakes and

cereal to raise money for Food Bank, Australia's largest food relief organisation.

The SJC are proud to have raised almost \$300 for the cause, and will also be donating all leftover boxes of cereal to Food Bank.

Expressions of interest are invited for the position of Examination Supervisor at Killara High School 2017

Killara High School is inviting expressions of interest for the role of Examination Supervisor for Year 12 trial examinations and Year 11 yearly examinations.

To be eligible for the role of Examination Supervisor, you must be available for duty between Tuesday 18 July to Friday 18 August.

Examination Supervisors are employed to ensure that the examinations are conducted correctly. It is very important for the school and for students that the Examination Supervisor is - and is seen to be a person of the highest ethical standards, who is able to maintain the integrity of the examinations. It is essential that the Examination Supervisor does not have close relationships with any students undertaking Year 11 or Year 12 examinations in 2017, or a relationship with the school that could be perceived as compromising the security of the examinations or the Examination Supervisor's impartiality in the conduct of the examinations. During the role, the Examination Supervisor must maintain the highest level of confidentiality at all times.

The Examination Supervisor needs to be wellorganised, show good attention to detail, and be able to manage students during an examination.

Responsibilities of Examination Supervisor

• Liaising with the Head Teacher Administration and Deputy Principal regarding preparation for the examinations.

- Conducting the examinations in accordance with school rules.
- <u>Restrictions on eligibility for employment</u>
- A person who has a child or near relative (including siblings, grandchildren, nieces, nephews or first cousins) completing Year 11 or Year 12 at Killara High School
- A person tutoring Year 11 or Year 12 students cannot be a Presiding Officer.
- As a condition of employment the Presiding Officer must obtain a Working with Children Check (WWCC) clearance

If, after reading this outline of duties, you are interested in applying for the position of Examination Supervisor at Killara High School for 2017, please submit an expression of interest that is no longer than one page to Mr Robin Chand, Deputy Principal via email at <u>robin.chand@det.nsw.edu.au</u>. The Expression of Interest should be a maximum length of one page and outline your experiences and capabilities to manage Examination Supervisor duties.

Online Ordering is now available at the Uniform Shop

The Uniform Shop has introduced *Qkr!*, (pronounced quicker) by MasterCard as an easy-to-use application for iPhones/iPads and android smart phones, to make purchasing through the Uniform Shop a breeze.

Orders can be placed and paid for online via *Qkr!*



Purchased items can be collected by students from the Uniform Shop on Tuesday or Friday mornings between 8.00am and 10.30am (this includes Recess A). When collecting their goods, students can try for size before taking the order if required.

Qkr! is a secure mobile application run by MasterCard and the Commonwealth Bank which allows fast and easy payments (Amex is not accepted). It provides you with a mechanism for paying and collecting uniform items without your child carrying large amounts of cash. There is no

fee for parents using this method of payment, nor do you need to load funds in advance.

It is as simple as this:

- 1. Go to Application Store on your iPhone or Google Play on your Android
- 2. Search for *Qkr!* by MasterCard and downloading the free application
- 3. Open the application and allowing for location services to be on
- 4. Follow the registration instructions
- Our school will appear in 'Nearby Locations' if you're within 10kms of the school, or search for our school by name
- 6. When first accessing our school you will be prompted to add a student profile for your child. This allows you to make orders for them.
- 7. Select Uniform Shop, and start purchasing.
