

From the Principal

The 2017 Higher School Certificate again saw Killara High School students achieving outstanding results overall, with many particularly remarkable individual performances.

Our Dux is Vivienne Kung, who gained an ATAR of 99.95, the maximum possible. Vivienne will study actuarial studies at UNSW, where she has been awarded the prestigious Co-op Scholarship.

An additional seven students, to the best of our knowledge, also received an ATAR above 99.0: Katya Buryak, Coco Chua, Olivia Gao, Kimberly Lin, Parand Tajziehchi, Pius Yun and Leon Zhang.

Eight students were among the state's highest All Round Achievers with band six (the highest band) or equivalent in ten or more units of study. These students were Katya Buryak, Olivia Charles, Coco Chua, Seshan Komonen, Vivienne Kung, Jack Savage, Parand Tajziehchi, and Leon Zhang.

Three students earned places on the merit lists, meaning that they achieved results placing them in the top ten results in NSW. Elizabeth Parsons came first in the state in Aboriginal Studies, Leon Zhang placed tenth in Physics and Yifan Jia fourth in Mathematics. Both Elizabeth and Yifan were accelerated students.

Overall 246 band six results were awarded to the cohort of 286 Killara High School students.

Of the 41 HSC courses studied at Killara High School last year, 29 had a course mean above the state average. Eleven courses had a course mean of more than 5% above state average.

Fifty four students, or 23% of the cohort, received an ATAR (Australian Tertiary Achievement Rank) of 90 or above. This information represents the best of our knowledge, as ATARs are not provided directly to schools.

Killara High School placed 78th out of all secondary schools in NSW. This is a testament to the commitment and talent of our Year 12 students, and their expert teachers.

To my mind, however, the most important fact is this – that the vast majority of our students gained a place in the tertiary course that they most desired.

I congratulate Year 12 2017 on their admirable achievements. We are very proud of them, and the fine example they have set.

Year 12 Community and Family Studies: Life as a Parent or Carer!

Year 12 Community and Family Studies students have had a busy start to the year as they became first time 'parents and carers' to a 'baby' for 2 weeks.

'Dr Clough' delivered the new 'babies' in the nursery to the very excited students who have been eagerly waiting for this life changing activity for a number of months.

We are currently studying the exciting topic 'Parenting and Caring', and are developing an understanding of the types of parents and carers and how to best prepare for the role of a parent or carer in order to optimise the wellbeing of a dependent. We have learnt about biological parents, and watched a birth and learnt about IVF and artificial insemination. We are now learning about the legislation, social/community beliefs and attitudes and technological changes social parents face. We are delving into the world of adoption, and studying what is involved in fostering, step parenting and surrogacy. All of which have resulted in fantastic discussions about the implications of each. Mrs Clough, having had 2 children of her own with disabilities, will give the students a real-life journey of what it is like to be a carer: the joys, the struggles, the ups and downs life can throw at you while inspiring resilience in our students.

The 'student parents' have been given a 3kg 'sand baby' to care for. They had to name their child, and learn how to carry out all the necessary tasks; nappy changing, dressing, managing a pram, while juggling their school bags, school life and the general public's reactions. A diary is kept; some students have boys, some have girls and some lucky ones have twins.

The students have soon learnt that caring for something other than themselves takes effort (even if it isn't real), and that the life of a parent or carer is not an easy one. The younger students have enjoyed seeing the school filled with prams and CAFS really offers those students interested in psychology, social work, counselling, doctors/paramedics, nursing, teaching and childcare a real journey through life situations.

The students have done a great job of being 'parents' and have become very attached to their babies, yet most were very relieved to finish the task; and not wanting to rush into parenting any time soon.

Assessment Tasks

Killara High School has a process in place to support all students who experience illness or misadventure in relation to assessment tasks. It is important that all students and families familiarise themselves with the illness/misadventure process. See the flow chart below. For more information see the KHS Assessment Policy at <http://www.killara-h.schools.nsw.edu.au/our-school/rules-policies/assessment-policy>

If you are in Year 11 or Year 12 and are absent due to illness or misadventure on the day an assessment task is scheduled or due, follow and complete this process within 5 school days of the due date of the assessment task. This process is mandatory for Year 11 and Year 12 students.



If you are in Stage 4 or 5 and are absent due to illness or misadventure on the day an assessment task is scheduled or due, you must provide the school with documentary evidence from a medical professional, or from your parents/carers. This must explain the specific reason for the absence. Stage 4 and 5 students only need to complete Page 45 of the Illness/Misadventure Application process. Pages 46 and 47 are only required for Stage 6 students.

Assessment and Student Leave

Please be mindful of the Department of Education's policy regarding student leave requests. Leave is discouraged during the school term and especially when it clashes with student assessment. There are no provisions for student discretionary leave in relation to formal assessment tasks, unless this applies within the illness/misadventure process.

The Department of Education takes the following position in relation to student leave during the school term:

14.1. From the beginning of 2015, family holidays and travel are no longer considered under [the Exemption from School - Procedures](#). Travel outside of vacation period is now counted as an absence for statistical purposes.

14.3. A Principal should not accept a reason for travel during school term if it is not in the best interests of the student. Educational, social and participation reasons should be specified on the application.

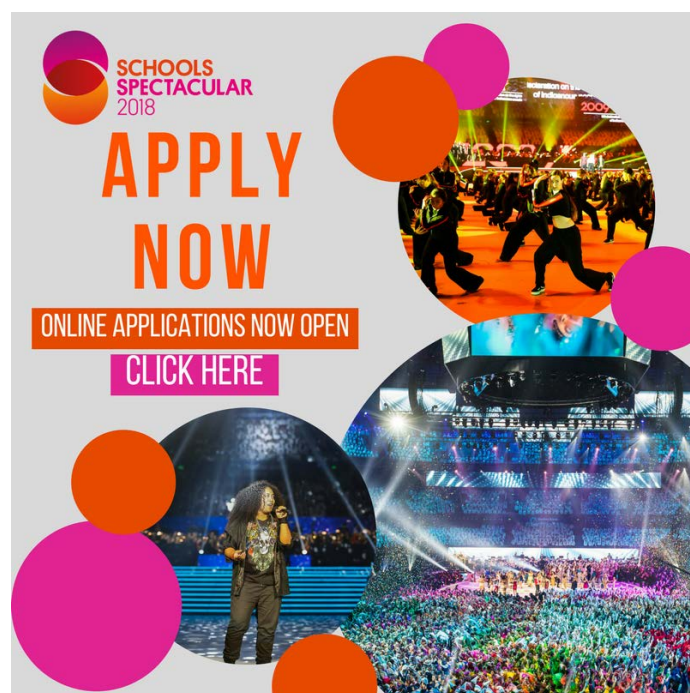

Peer Support Program

What is the Peer Support Program?

The Peer Support Program provides a fun and engaging environment for young people to address social issues. Modules are designed to equip them with skills to deal proactively with life experiences. The Peer Support Program promotes wellbeing, which encourages positive relationships, connectedness and a sense of responsibility.

Modules focus on:

- Transition
- Resilience

Week 3, Term 1

During this week students will be involved in the Peer Support Program. Each week, groups of 8-10 students will meet with 2 Peer Leaders and work through a range of activities that focus on resilience. Meeting in small groups allows meaningful connections to form, assisting students with the transition to secondary school. Over a period of 8 weeks students will acknowledge their strengths and achievements, identify people who support them and learn how to view challenges as opportunity for growth.

Week 4, Term 1

During this week students explore the idea that how they view themselves and their challenges, can affect the outcomes of these situations. Students discuss helpful ways to view challenges.

They consider keeping things in perspective, separating emotions and ascertaining facts to accurately identify the problem to be addressed.

Your child may, at times, feel overwhelmed by the expectations of secondary school. Encourage them to make a list or write a plan to help identify smaller tasks to make a large workload more manageable. It is important they feel supported while being encouraged to independently prioritise their responsibilities.

Week 4, Term 1

Understanding how influential our thoughts are in responding to challenges is crucial. This week students recognise the choice to respond with open or limiting thoughts.

A difficult or new situation may require hard work, perseverance, courage or support from others. Open thoughts allow us to make the most of any situation feeling optimistic about the possible outcomes.

Limiting thoughts still allow us to work through challenges. However, they prevent us from stretching our abilities and exploring positive outcomes to bring about change.
